

ST. LOUIS BELLS TO RING FOR JOY

Celebration of Centennial to
Be Marked by Feats
of Aviation.

CURTISS AND COOK STARS

Great Deeds in Air to Be Performed
by Balloons and Aeroplanes.
1000 Mayors Guests of City
All Through Festivities.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 2.—A week's celebration of the centennial anniversary of the incorporation of St. Louis will begin tomorrow at sunrise, when the bells of 44 churches will ring in the city limits. The program of the week will include the inauguration of the program, aerobically flights, distance races between dirigible air craft, a water pageant with four vessels of the United States Navy participating, parades, festival banquets, the annual appearance of the mysterious Veiled Prophet and several public appearances by Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the Arctic explorer, will fill out the week. Preparations for the big events have been going on for months. An elaborate system of street lighting has been installed, a great court of honor erected and practically the entire city has been decorated with flags and bunting.

Curtiss and Cook Divide Honors.

Two men—Glenn H. Curtiss, aviator, and Dr. Cook, explorer—will divide the honors to be accorded to individuals. Mr. Curtiss, beginning Wednesday, will make daily flights, weather permitting, from Art Hill, Forest Park, where a great natural amphitheater is capable of accommodating scores of thousands of spectators. Dr. Cook will take a prominent part in the festivities, presided over by the Veiled Prophet, and will be tendered a public reception. The Sunday observances will be a religious and historical nature. Special services will be held in the churches, and songs of praise and thanksgiving will be sung by thousands of Sunday school children. In the afternoon, tableaux marking the places of historical interest will be unveiled. These latter will commemorate the landing of Pierre Laclède Liguette in 1764 at the building of the new municipal structures, the laying of whose cornerstones will be an important feature of the week.

Balloon Races and Pageant.

The balloon races will be started Monday. Two events are on the program, the first limited to spherical air craft of 40,000 cubic feet capacity or less, and the second to larger balloons of up to 200,000 cubic feet. Seven distance and two endurance prizes are offered for these contests. In the evening, the streets will be illuminated for the first time, and the opening band concert will be given.

Tuesday will be a period of pageantry. The United States torpedo-boat fleet, consisting of the Massachusetts, Wilkes, Tingue and Thornton, will lead a parade on the Mississippi River, in which scores of motorboats, river packets and other vessels will take part. The evening will see the veiled prophet arrive in greater pomp than has been his wont for years. The floats of his parade will be unusually elaborate, and the band with which the prophet's entourage will be one of the most brilliant functions at which he has ever presided.

Startling Aerial Feats.

Glenn H. Curtiss is scheduled to inaugurate his flights after the review of a "municipal pageant" by the Mayors of 100 American cities, who have been invited to witness the doings of the week as the guests of the city.

Thursday 300 floats, representing the industrial progress of a century, will wind through the streets.

Friday will witness a series of aeroplane contests in which some startling results are anticipated. Half a dozen inventors of the United States, many of them as yet obscure, have staked their intention to participate. The prizes of \$1000 and a gold medal and \$500 and a silver medal for the best flight will be given to the operators of the machines which make the longest flights out from and back to a starting point 200 feet in dimensions.

The street pageant this day will be a combined educational, historical and military parade, in which students, floats and state and National soldiery will appear.

Race for Dirigible Balloons.

Saturday's programme includes a race for dirigible balloons with Baldwin, Beachey and Knabenshue as the chief contestants; the release of the two score unguessed spherical balloons of 200 cubic feet capacity; a parade of 80 automobiles and the dedication of Fairground, a new public park.

As many as possible of the centennial decorations and illuminations are to be preserved until after President Taft's visit later in the month.

A formal welcome was given to the officers and men of the second division of the United States Atlantic torpedo-boat fleet today. The four torpedo-boats took part in a parade on the Mississippi River.

TAFT IN MOTION PICTURES

Film Taken at Baseball Game in Chicago Shown in Portland.

On Thursday, September 16, President Taft passed through Chicago, and was invited to a baseball game between the New Yorks and the Chicago, of the National League. He accepted, and while at the game the Essex motion picture company took a motion picture of the National Executive, which shows his reception in Chicago, his actual appearance and thorough enjoyment of the National sport.

With characteristic enterprise, the Arcade Theater, of this city, secured this great motion picture and immediately after the parade yesterday, in which President Taft was viewed and greeted by the people of the city of Portland and the State of Oregon, the management threw open the doors of the cozy theater and placed this wonderful picture on exhibition. During the day no less than 5142 people paid their actual admission into this theater and sat and applauded President Taft every time his smiling countenance appeared upon the screen.

During the day the assistant manager went to the Portland Hotel and delivered to the President's aide a camp pass to the Arcade Theater made out for himself and family and engraved upon a card of solid silver. The guards at the Portland Hotel evidently thought that Quisenberry was an anarchist holding a bomb in his

Together with the pass was a note informing the President that he might see himself in motion pictures on the screen at the theater and very cordially requesting his presence.

He has had three years' experience in directing gymnasium work and the officers of the Portland Association

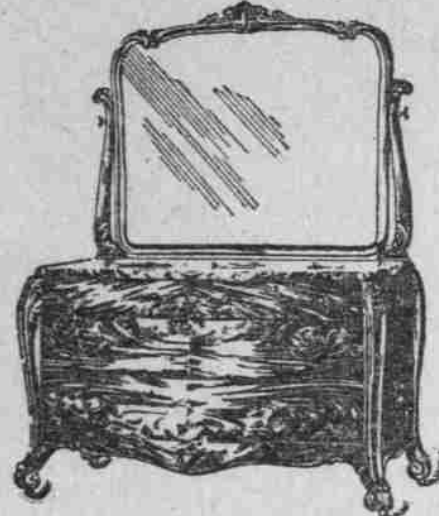

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hot. A hint of garlic and a slight touch of sugar are improvements in accord with some tastes. A similar catsup can be made by cooking the cucumbers, cut in places, not grated, and later rubbing them through a sieve. In this case the celery flavor may be derived from stalks or leaves stewed with the cucumbers.

Grape catsup is best made from wild grapes, but concord grape catsup is also good and the fruit is more generally available.

Cover 2 quarts of picked grapes with vinegar and cook slowly until soft.
