Miss Fanchon Campbell Heads Broadway Walking Club, and Every Morning, Rain or Shine, Takes Long Tramp.

MISS FANCHON CAMPBELL, the leading woman of "The Great John Ganton" company, which opens at the new Portland Theater tomorrow night for a week's run, is a most enthusiastic disciple of Edward Payson Weston, the long-distance pedestrian. Long walks are Miss Campbell's habit, and she indulges in it daily. In New York during the height of the publicity occasioned by Weston's recent remarkable transcontinental trip, Miss Campbell took an active part in the organization of the Broadway Weston Society. Many young women, ambitious to join this club, were received as charter members, but few of them survived the rigorous initiation.

The regulations provided that each member should walk four miles daily. Official pedometers were provided by the president and the readings were taken at regular intervals. All club members whose pedometers failed to indicate the necessary number of miles were promptly expelled. A scandal was caused shortly after the installation of these pedometers by the announcement that several prominent leading women had been caught cheating. It seems that some one with more ingenuity than ambition had discovered that the little machines would register quite as well by being discreetly shaken by hand as by being regularly advanced by walking. So at the professional matinee newspaper men remarked the queer fed which prevailed among a certain coterie of young women—that of violently agitating some mysterious device as they sat in the seclusion of their boxes. Finally the whole matter came out and the expulsion occurred.

The club thus being relieved of its unworthy members, became, as was its purpose, a dignified and helpful organization. Miss Campbell, it may be needless to say, was not one of the frivolous young women who were found guilty of the heinous offense of falsifying their pedometers. Her loyalty to the club and her strict adherence to the four-mile-a-day rule had the effect of advancing her rapidly in the estimation of the members, and on October 10, at an election held by postcard ballot, Miss Campbell was elected president of the Broadway Weston Society. During her stay in Portland Miss Campbell will occupy a suite at the Hotel Portland, and each morning, rain or shine, will make her four-mile tramp out on the White House road, which skirts along the banks of the beautiful Willamette.

PORTLAND MAN AS GUARD

Lieutenant Johnson Helped Protect President Taft at El Paso.

Among the thousands of United States troops gathered yesterday at El Paso, Tex., as a guard for the President of the

United States upon the occasion of his meeting the President of Mexico, there is but one officer who is an Oregonian, Lieutenant Ronald DeVore Johnson, of this city.

Mr. Johnson is attached to the Third United States Cavalry and is stationed at Fort Sam Houston, Tex. At this post are also stationed all of the second lieutenants of the name of Johnson now in the United States Army—four.

Fort Sam Houston really contains three posts, cavalry, field artillery and infantry. The entire garrison was entrained last Wednesday in 117 cars and transported to El Paso, there to be joined by the troops from Fort Clark and Fort Bliss, Tex., all in the military department of Texas, and under the command of General Myers.

Mr. Johnson has previously seen President Taft at West Point when Mr. Taft as Secretary of War visited the Military Academy and at Washington, D. C., where he received the Military Academy cadets on his inaugural day. Later Mr. Johnson barely missed meeting President Taft at the country estate near Denver, Colo., of mutual friends, the Walshes, where Mr. Johnson was entertained for the week immediately preceding the President's visit there.

NO MORE RIOTS BY JOYEUX

Conscription From Paris Apaches Will Be Kept in Order.

PARIS, Oct. 16.—(Special.)—An effort is to be made this year to prevent the

scenes of rowdism which mark the departure of conscripts for Algeria and Tunisia. These conscripts are mostly drawn from the Apache world, and usually their cronies muster in strong force at the Gare de Lyon to see them off. They create scandalous scenes, curse the army and the police, and frequently there is considerable trouble before the trains can leave the city.

This year special measures will be taken by the military authorities and the Prefecture of Police. The "Joyeux," as these conscripts are called, will be accompanied to Marseilles by a large force of non-commissioned officers and gendarmes. When the trains arrive at the port, the conscripts will be led on board the transport by officers, non-commissioned officers and corporals of the battalions of Africa specially detached for this purpose.

DEATH REVIVES OLD TALE

Strange Disappearance of Sir Arthur Curtis Recalled in London.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—(Special.)—The death of Sir Robert Maziere Brady, Bart., is announced. Sir Robert only survived his uncle, Sir Francis Brady, the Irish County Court Judge, to whose baronetcy he succeeded, 27 days. Sir Robert's death revives once more the story of the tragic disappearance of Sir Arthur Curtis on the overland trail to the Yukon, 11 years ago.

Sir Robert Brady was the husband of Lady Curtis, whom he married in 1900, after the Probate Court had granted Lady Curtis leave to presume Sir Arthur's death. Intense public interest was aroused last year by the announcement of Thomas W. Cole, an explorer and frontiersman, who declared that he had seen and conversed with Sir Arthur Curtis in the Ashcroft district, British Columbia, as recently as last October, when they discussed Sir Arthur's disappearance ten years previously. Inquiries have thus far, however, failed signally to confirm the truth of Mr. Cole's story.

Sir Robert, who was 54 years of age, was formerly Lieutenant-Colonel and Brevet-Colonel in the Royal Garrison Artillery. The Brady baronetcy was created 60 years ago, in favor of Sir Robert's grandfather, Maziere Brady, the eminent Irish lawyer, who was Irish Lord Chancellor for 15 years.

O'BRIEN MAY DON HARNESS

Irish Politician Proposes to Re-enter Field as Sinn Feiner.

DUBLIN, Oct. 16.—(Special.)—The Daily Sinn Fein announces that William O'Brien proposes to re-enter the field of Irish politics. It thinks that while not declaring himself a Sinn Feiner, Mr. O'Brien will find himself largely in sympathy with the official policy of the Sinn Fein party.

The same paper stated "on reliable authority" that a general election will take place in January next, following the resignation of the present government. Ireland will have seventh place in the new Liberal programme, which will promise "an ameliorative scheme for the government of Ireland."

MADAME JOMELLI, PRIMA DONNA, WINS WAY BY HER STRONG WILL

Beautiful, Talented and Possessing Family Prestige, Vocalist Works as if Career Were Bread-and-Butter Problem—To Be Heard Here October 28.

GIVEN a beautiful voice, a keen intellect, an attractive personality and striking stage presence, one could expect success for a prima donna. Add to this a prestige of family and friends which give entree into the most exclusive of roles, and one has a combination necessary to complete success. All of these Mme. Jomelli has at her command. She might have succeeded, many do,

with a little less of any one of these qualifications, but it was not necessary for her to do so. Still, she was not content to rest on what nature and circumstances had given her. At an early age she set about the improvement of the original talents that had fallen to her. Many artists are obliged to struggle through years of poverty and privation before success comes, and perhaps age none the worse for it. Still other real artistic material is lost to

the world because of the surroundings of those to whom it is given, and they permit themselves to live in an atmosphere of easy-going luxury which is absolutely deadening to artistic development.

A public career was never a bread-and-butter problem to her, yet her insatiable desire to merit honest recognition was so strong as to cause her to work as though her very livelihood depended on it. Social position, influence, and all extraneous influences were cast aside as worthless, and she has won her enviable position in art by sheer strength of will backed up by a most beautiful natural voice. So, having reached a high position in the vocal world, its permanence is assured, for hers is not an inflated vanity.

Mme. Jomelli is of positive intrinsic worth in the musical world. She proved that when, almost unheralded, she made her debut at the Manhattan theater, and brought the coldly critical first-night audience to its feet at the close of one of the most memorable nights which the opera in New York has ever known. Mme. Jomelli will appear in Portland October 28 in the first of the Lois Steers-Wynn Coman concerts.

STUDENTS DEFY STRIKERS

Paris Latin Quarter Goes On With Clubhouse Despite Unions.

PARIS, Oct. 16.—(Special.)—The Association of Students of the Quarter Latin, who hope shortly to have their disposal a clubhouse for which they have received a state subsidy. Unfortunately, owing to a strike among the workmen, it seemed likely that the completion of this building would have to be postponed indefinitely. The Students' Association, however, refused to submit to the despotism of the labor leaders and the General Confederation of Labor. Its president appealed to those of its members who had served their time in the artillery or engineers and succeeded in raising sufficient followers to carry on the work. Only the final touches are required, and these to all appearances the students themselves will soon succeed in finishing.

It is characteristic of the French labor movement that this action on the part of the students, which has earned general applause from the French public, is called treachery by the Syndicalists, and that the humanists applied to the students in question the name of "university blacklegs."
