John D. Fields Charges That New York Associates Covet Alaska Coal Lands.

BALLINGER IS DEFENDED

Alaska Mining Expert, Who Says He Is Familiar With Cunningham Controversy, Discusses Recent Attack on Interior Secretary.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 12.—(Special.)

Discrediting recently published charges brought against Richard A. Ballinger, Secretary of the Interior, by L. R. Glavis, former chief of the field division of the General Land Office at Portland, and charging that Henry Oxnard and his associates of New York City are the ones really interested in purchasing the Cunningham tract, involving 250 acres of Alaska coal fields, to be held at Seattle, November 12, is the gist of a story told tonight by John D. Fields, mining expert for the Interior Department, whose nine years' experience in Alaska has made him thoroughly familiar with every phase of the present controversy.

In his story, Fields pointedly says the question to be answered is "Who hired Glavis to have the suspicious mentioned in the article published in Collier's?" The question of who is running the Department of the Interior has been answered, evidently to Glavis' sorrow, says Fields. When Secretary Ballinger charged the mining expert for the Interior Department, whose nine years' experience in Alaska has made him thoroughly familiar with every phase of the present controversy.

NAPOLÉON'S FLAG IS FOUND

Great Warrior's Invention Exhibited at Paris Army Museum.

PARIS, Nov. 6.—(Special.)—Lord Archibald Campbell has presented to the Army Museum here a curious relic of Napoleon. This is the flag which the latter flew in the Isle of Elba during his captivity there. General Niox, custodian of the museum, has placed it in the room of honor, where it can now be seen. The flag, which seems to have been entirely invented by Napoleon, although some say that it was in part suggested by that of Commodore Medici, a former sovereign of the island, is a rather a strange standard. It is square, white and fringed with gold, bearing three golden bees and a diagonal scarlet stripe. The staff carries a white and scarlet scarf, having also three golden bees.

Napoleon does not seem to have used the flag he invented elsewhere than in the Isle of Elba, where he was a deposed and captive monarch. In France, although bees were always his emblem, and were embroidered on his state robes, his standard was the tricolor.

CHARGES NEWS TO GAGE

Ex-Secretary of Treasury Can't Recall Wakeman's Report of Leak.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Nov. 13.—Replying to the charge alleged to have been made in New York by ex-Ambassador Wilbur L. Wakeman that while Secretary of the Treasury he had permitted a sugar-trust agent to occupy a seat in the Treasury and "tip off" to the trust secret orders issued to the New York Appraiser's office, Loman J. Gage said today: "I am not acquainted with the charges made by Wakeman, but I am very sure, says my back, that in 1909 he informed the Treasury Department that the sugar trust was defrauding the Government. I have no recollection of any such charges."

Cannon-Aldrich programme is a matter of speculation. A great deal will depend upon how much the Democrats can benefit by such a combination. The insurgents are not Democrats; they are not advocates of Bryanism or other Frank theories proposed by Democratic leaders in recent years. They are, in the main, content to stand for such issues as were defined in the Chicago platform, but they insist upon a rigid compliance with those platform pledges in which respect they differ materially from Cannon and Aldrich.

The Democrats in Congress are not interested in the fulfillment of the Chicago platform pledges, and it is doubtful whether they will form a combination to defeat the Cannon-Aldrich programme, if such defeat means merely the substitution of an insurgent programme. To combine successfully with the Democrats, the insurgents probably will be compelled to allow the Democrats to dictate in part the line of policy to be pursued, and, whenever that is done, there will be a protest from the White House.

non, but because of his love of party, and his hostility to things Democratic. If the President should take a hand against the insurgents he unquestionably would weaken their cause. Not only would he win back to the regular organization some of the wobbly members of the insurgent force, but he would tend to discredit before the Republicans of the country the cause advocated by a combination consisting in the main of Democrats. Such a move on the part of the President would bring about untold trouble; it would incense La Follette, Cummins, Beveridge and other long-winded members of the Senate, who, by abusing the privilege of unlimited debate, could do much damage to the legislative programme approved by the Administration. The probabilities are that before the programme for the session is made up, President Taft will consult with leaders of both factions of the Republican party and endeavor to arrive upon a compromise scheme, partially acceptable to both sides, and thus avoid an open rupture in the Republican ranks, just before the Congressional election. He will plead with the insurgents to drop their fight for the time being, and with the present leaders to make some concessions to the insurgents, all in the interest of party harmony.

As a placator the President has a great reputation, but his utmost tact will have to be brought into play to handle successfully the situation about to arise. If entreaties and arguments are in vain, there will be no other course open to the President than to go down into the "big stick." It is a weapon this Administration does not care to wield, but there is general belief that it will be brought into play, and to vigorous play. If the insurgents refuse to listen to reason and insist upon wrecking the Republican organization in order to vent their spite on two men, Cannon and Aldrich.

PROF. JAMES BELIEVES

FAMOUS PSYCHOLOGIST WRITES OF HARPS BOY.

Says Phenomena Are of Poltergeist Variety and Asks More Information.

Scientists throughout the country have become interested in the phenomena which occurred recently in the Sanders' home on Marshall street and which have been accredited to Ernest Harps, the 11-year-old boy now under surveillance by five examining physicians in the home of Dr. J. Allen Gilbert.

Professor William James, head of the department of Psychology at Harvard University, is among those who have requested facts concerning the phenomena. From information already in his hands Professor James is inclined to set aside all the theories relative to "spirits," "electricity" and "earthquakes" which have been advanced.

In a recent communication to Alvin C. Goff, 622 Wasco street, Professor James says: "The phenomena which occurred in your city recently seem to me to be a very important case of 'Poltergeist' disturbance. Spirits and electricity are silly and ridiculous explanations for the phenomena if the facts are as stated in newspaper accounts. Of course it is a technical problem, and it behooves investigators to first ascertain this one particular fact: Is the boy accredited with the manifestations a perverse mystifier who does things by trickery or not? If it can be proved that he is not or that explanation by trickery is absurd, then the phenomena go on record as genuine. The English Society of Psychical Research has investigated numerous similar cases and Mr. Podmore, their chief detective, believes that a perverse mystifier is the fons et origo of them all. Personally, I am inclined to believe that this class of phenomena, however often aided by tricksters, genuinely occurs."

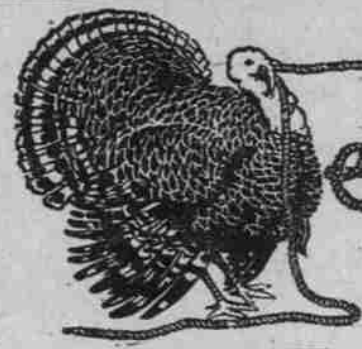
