

OUTLAW BALL NOT URGED BY WALTER

Manager of Portland Team Says Action Depends on What Others Do.

GOOD FAITH IS DOUBTED

McCredie Believes Spokane Magistrates Are Only Ones Who Would Stick in Case of Hard-fought Baseball War.

Walter H. McCredie, manager and part owner of the Portland Pacific Coast League baseball team, arrived home yesterday after having attended the meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues at Memphis, Tenn., and, aside from announcing that Pearl Casey would play second base and captain the Portland team in the Pacific Coast League, he had nothing new to offer.

That he is displeased with the treatment accorded Portland by the Pacific Coast League is evident, for he has been very vocal in his criticism of the league's action in the case of a hard-fought baseball war.

Good Team Is Promised.

As to his team next year, Walter says he will have one good one or two good ones, just as the outcome of the present situation provides.

Walter joined in a fanning bid with Pearl Casey, Ole Johnson, "Spec" Harbison, Jesse Garretty and Howard Gunn, all of whom form a portion of the colony of ballplayers who are wintering in Portland.

Walter McCredie spent a week in Cleveland and was the guest of Jim McGuire while there. During this time they talked over a number of transactions which may have bearing on Portland's chances for the pennant next season.

Players Anxious to Come West.

Charley Shields begged McCredie to buy his release from Memphis, as he would like to return to the Pacific Coast. Several other ballplayers, who have become sickened of the heat of the South, also importuned the Portland manager to get them away from that country.

Judge Too Busy to Talk.

Congressman McCredie came over from Vancouver yesterday afternoon, but aside from stating that he had not heard from Dave Duguid and also that he had been too busy straightening up his affairs before leaving for Washington to discuss baseball, he was able to offer nothing of interest to the fans.
