

TRAINS UNDER BAN

Use of Fourth Street Involved in Pending Suit.

HEARING SET FOR DEC. 1

Injunction Still Stands Preventing City From Interfering With Freight and Steam Locomotive Traffic.

The issue whether or not the Southern Pacific Company must remove freight and steam locomotive traffic from its Fourth-street line, is involved in what City Attorney Kavanaugh declares is the most important suit to be tried by his office in recent months. It will be used for hearing in the Federal Court in this city next Wednesday morning, and Mr. Kavanaugh himself will be present to represent the city. W. D. Fenton will appear for the corporation.

The Council passed an ordinance, two years ago, granting the company the right to use Fourth street for its freight and passenger service until March 1, 1905, after which date, it was stipulated, it must remove its freight and locomotives. Passenger cars were to be permitted. The company failed to secure completion of its new bridge, on a cut-off, which would enable it to route its traffic over the main line on the East Side, and continued the use of the street for all manner of trains. When the ordinance was about to take effect, the company applied for an extension of one year, but before the Council could act, the law took effect and was called to the attention of Dr. Harry Lane, who was then Mayor. He instructed City Attorney Kavanaugh to cause the arrest of General Manager O'Brien, of the Harriman lines in Oregon, which was immediately done. Following the arrest of General Manager O'Brien, the company secured a writ of injunction in the Federal Court, seeking to restrain the city from stopping the traffic over the Fourth-street line. The Council later granted an extension of time for use of this track, but the case still stood in court.

For a good many years there has been a sentiment against the operating of heavy freight trains over the street, which runs through the heart of the city. The company intends to abandon the use of the track for all save passenger purposes, and is building its lines with this purpose in view, so that it is believed in the near future it will remove by its own order the heavy trains from the Fourth-street line.

SEANCE, LIGHTED THEATER

ASK WATER METER FOR ALL
Improvement League Says Charter Guarantees Equal Rate for All.

Secretary R. D. Thomas, of the Seventh Ward Improvement League, is sending out the following resolutions to the push clubs of Portland, asking them to take action:

We, the members of the Seventh Ward League of the City of Portland, being desirous of furthering equalization among the citizens of Portland and giving our fair city and householders therein a right which has been pledged to them by our city laws under our city charter as adopted on the 22d day of January, 1900, and amendments adopted thereto on April 1, 1908, which charter and amendments guarantee every consumer within the city limits and using city water shall be placed upon a meter, and such consumer shall pay only for the water actually consumed by him; and whereas the Water Board of the City of Portland is causing to be charged a different rate than that prescribed by law and wholly contrary to the city charter and amendments thereto; now therefore be it Resolved, By the members of this league that we use every endeavor to prevail upon said Water Board of the City of Portland to install immediately the meter system as provided by our laws and the city charter and the amendments thereto to wit:

Section 227 of the charter of the City of Portland, which provides and appropriates a sufficient sum for the purchase and installation of water meters to supply the needs of consumers of Portland. And be it further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to every push club within the City of Portland.
