

PORTLAND AFTER WOOLMEN IN 1911

Strong Efforts to Be Made to Obtain Most Important Convention.

CROWDS ALWAYS ATTEND

Besides Thousand or More Delegates, Many Thousands of Visitors Are Attracted to Sessions of Wool-growers' Association.

As the opening event for the Portland convention season of 1911, it is proposed that the session of the National Wool-growers' Association shall be secured, with its thousand delegates and other thousands of visitors who always accompany the sheepmen, the exhibits of standard-bred sheep and woolen manufacturers. The Oregon Wool-growers started the movement at their recent meeting in Pendleton and a representative committee of sheepowners met with the secretary of the Commercial Club yesterday.

There were present, besides Secretary Richardson, Dr. S. W. McClure, J. N. Burgess and William Slusher, all of Pendleton. Later in the day other officers of the Commercial Club were consulted and gave enthusiastic approval of the plans thus far outlined. The representatives of the Oregon Wool-growers were assured that all necessary funds for carrying out the convention would be raised and that a delegation of business men would be sent to the forthcoming session of 1910 bearing invitations from the Mayor, the Governor and a number of the commercial organizations of Portland.

The wool-growers of the state are earnestly after the convention and have arranged for a special train of Pullmans to transport 150 members of the state association to Ogden, Utah, where the next convention will be held, January 3 and 5, 1910. The train will be made up of cars from Portland, Shaniko, Heppner, Pendleton, Baker City and Ontario. It will start from Portland January 6. Besides the stockmen, the committees from this city will be aboard.

Never Met in Northwest.

The National Wool-growers' Association has never held a meeting in the Northwest, and for that reason it is believed Portland will have a chance of successfully competing with Denver and Los Angeles, both of which places have previously entertained the association, and are now the only bidders in the field. Albuquerque, N. M., has sent out its annual invitation for the meeting to come to the home of the pioneer sheepmen of the West, but it is apparently not attracting more attention than in previous years, owing to the lack of hotel facilities in that city.

Meetings of the National Wool-growers are becoming of more importance to followers of that industry with each succeeding year, because of the attitude of the Government as to the open range, transportation to packing centers and matters of legislation. Portland's packing and stock yards interests are interesting themselves in the quest for the 1911 convention with the idea in view of encouraging shipping to this port. They believe there is no better way to make the shipper familiar with local facilities than to "show him."

1400 Delegates in 1911.

At the Salt Lake convention of 1907 were more than 1000 accredited delegates, coming from every state in the Union. At Ogden there will be more than 1200 delegates, and it is believed that when the meeting opens the following January there will be an attendance of more than 1400 delegates. With this convention is always exhibited the fancy stock of the best flocks in the states as well as the flocks of imported animals, the higher grades of which are in constant demand.

To make this feature of the convention a success, the committee will go to Ogden armed with photos of the Driving Club barns and pens, which association is adding its weight to the slogan, "Portland in 1911." It will require about \$4000 to pay the prize list for this event.

The National Wool-growers' Association is the largest association of stockmen in the world, and represents more than two hundred millions of dollars' worth of sheep on the hoof. The value of lands and other properties which the membership controls is fabulous. Its conventions are always attended by representatives of the United States Department of Agriculture, United States Senators and representatives of the manufacturers of woolen goods from all over the East. Senator Francis E. Warren, of Wyoming, has been president of the association for a number of years, but was defeated by R. Gooding, of Idaho, in 1909. George S. Walker, of Cheyenne, Wyo., is secretary.

PEOPLE'S FORUM TO OPEN

C. E. S. Wood to Speak on "Personal Liberties" Tonight.

BROOKLYN TO GET PARK

CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUND TO BE PLACED THERE.

Mayor Picks Site at Milwaukee and Powell Road—East Eleventh to Be Widened.

People living in the Brooklyn district will soon have a little park, for a children's playground. Mayor Simon, City Auditor Barbur and Councilman Rushlight yesterday morning inspected the site at Milwaukee street and Powell road, where the city owns several acres. The Mayor was greatly surprised at the appearance of the place, and expressed much pleasure to see so much ground available there for the use of the children.

"I will have that park improved at once," said the Mayor. "I am heartily in favor of having a good many small plots for the children throughout the city, and I would rather have those than many of the larger parks. I want to have that little plot arranged so that the children and their mothers may have advantage of it by next Summer. We can have it leveled off and made fine for that purpose."

The Mayor was disappointed as the old buildings, belonging to the city, used for electric lighting purposes long ago, is so badly dilapidated that it cannot be used for a gymnasium. Mayor Simon, upon first scanning it, believed it could be utilized for that purpose, but after inspecting it, the building was found too far gone to be used in that way. Someone will get it as a gift for removing it, it was decided.

Mayor Simon also inspected East Eleventh street, south of Powell road, and heard Councilman Rushlight and Auditor Barbur's explanation as to why the thoroughfare should be opened and widened. Upon his return to the City Hall, the Mayor at once signed the ordinance, authorizing this improvement.

The new city barn will occupy part of the park tract at Powell road and Milwaukee street, but there will be enough space left to make a playground for the children. The contractors for the Brooklyn sewer will be asked by the Mayor to complete their work at this

point. The contractors neglected to level down the dirt, left by them in constructing the big drain, and it will be necessary to have this done before the park is improved.

DOG HELD ON BOARD BILL

Owner of Pointer Gets Warrant for Canine Boniface.

An unpaid board bill for a female pointer dog led to the arrest of Carl Smith, a cook in the restaurant at 210 Alder street, yesterday afternoon.

Smith was taken into custody by Patrolmen Montgomery and Long upon a warrant charging him with larceny by bailer, sworn out by C. Lisicum, of 115 Dekum building. Lisicum, who owns the dog, gave it to Smith several months ago to keep. Smith sent the animal out into the country and a few days ago, when Lisicum asked for its return, Smith refused until he had been paid \$15 for board.

Lisicum refused to pay and applied to the office of the District Attorney, where he received a warrant for Smith's arrest.

GRESHAM CAN SEE COMET

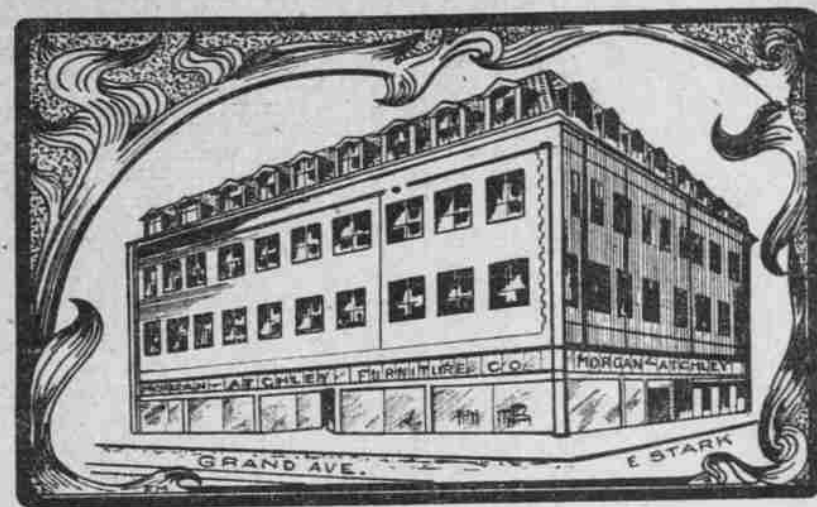
Looks Like "Luminous Body Shining Through White Cloth."

GRESHAM, Or., Nov. 27.—(Special.)—Haley's comet has been seen without the aid of a telescope for the past two mornings when not obscured by clouds. It rises about midnight and crosses the southern heavens toward the west at a high altitude, and can be seen during the "darkest hour, just before dawn."

It looks like a luminous body shining through white cloth, but its general shape cannot be distinguished. About 5 o'clock in the morning, if the sky is clear, it can be seen in the southwest a few degrees below the zenith.

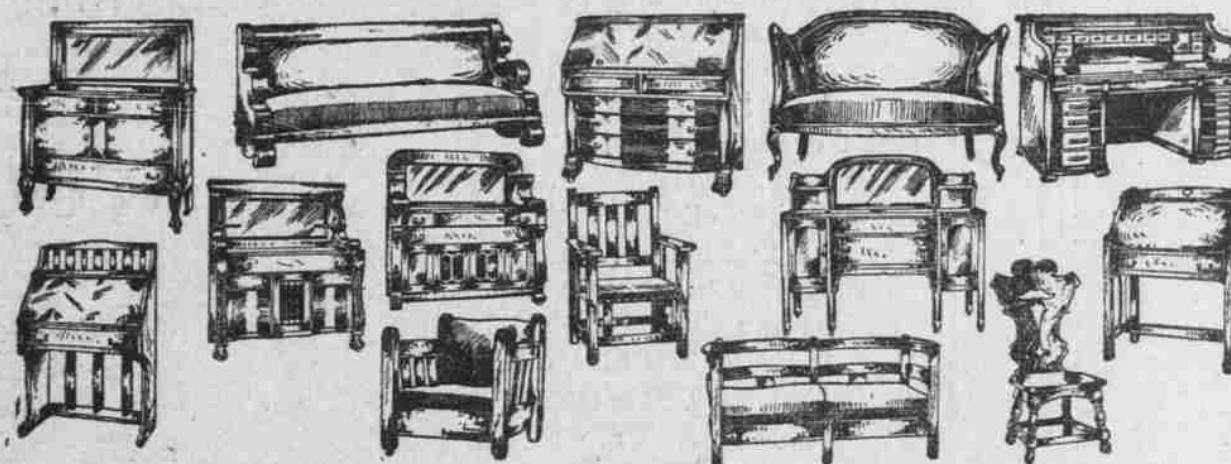
