

INCREASE IN SAY 91 LAWYERS

Brief in Support of Additions to Supreme Court Is Filed at Salem.

COOLEY CITED ON LAW POINT

State's Legislative Powers Only Limited by Specific Declarations of Constitution, Attorneys Say.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 27.—(Special.)—The names of 91 well-known members of the Oregon bar are attached to the brief filed in the office of the Clerk of the Supreme Court this afternoon in support of the validity of chapter 50 of the laws of 1909 of the State of Oregon, providing for two additional Justices of the Supreme Court.

The principal point of contention, as outlined by Judge Cooley, an eminent student of constitutional law, and quoted by the authors of the brief, is that the legislature has the authority to do anything not specifically prohibited by the constitution.

The government of the United States is one of enumerated powers. The governments of the states are possessed of all the general powers of legislation. When a law of Congress is assented to, we look in the National Constitution to see if the grant of specified powers is broad enough to embrace it; but when a state law is attacked on the same ground it is presumably valid in any case, and this presumption is a conclusive one, unless in the Constitution of the United States or of the state we are able to discover that it is prohibited.

Limitations Must Be Specified.

"We look in the Constitution of the United States for grants of legislative power, but in the constitution of the state to ascertain if any limitations have been imposed upon the complete power with which the legislative department of the state was vested in its creation. Congress can pass no laws but such as the Constitution authorizes either expressly or by clear implication, while the State Legislature has jurisdiction of all subjects on which its legislation is not prohibited."

Many authorities are quoted to the same effect. In the argument it is maintained that nowhere in Section 16 of the Oregon constitution, which provides for the election of judges in separate classes, is there any prohibition upon the power of the Legislature to increase the number of Supreme Court Justices.

A feature of the brief is the citation of the opinion of Judge Matthew P. Brady, Governor S. E. Chadwick, Judge P. P. Prim, Judge R. P. Boise, Judge J. K. Kelly, Judge E. D. Shattuck and Judge George W. C. Cady, in the question of the constitutionality of the increase in the salaries of certain state officers.

Helped Make Constitution.

These pioneers lawyers and jurists were members of the constitutional convention and all took the position in 1857 that the Legislature had the power to increase the salaries of the state officers. That language of the section of the constitution placing the salaries of the state officials at a certain figure is very similar to that which states that the Supreme Court shall consist of three members.

MAN DEAD, TEAM STANDS

OSCAR KARLSTROM, OF CROW, DIES, FALLS FROM BUGGY.

Death Overtakes Old Resident After He Drives From Eugene.

Heart Disease Cause.

EUGENE, Or., Nov. 27.—(Special.)—Oscar Karlstrom, an aged farmer residing near Crow, about 16 miles west of this city, was found dead by the roadside near the F. L. Marshall farm, four miles west of here, about 11 o'clock this morning.

Karlstrom had spent last night in the city at the residence of his mother-in-law, Mrs. A. C. Patterson, on East Eleventh street, and had started for home in his carriage about 10 o'clock this morning. It is supposed that he was stricken with heart-failure and fell from his buggy.

The reins of the horses had caught in one of the wheels of the buggy, and stopped the team by the side of the road, a short distance from where Karlstrom's body was found.

After careful examination of the body, Carson Gordon concluded there was no indication other than that Karlstrom had died from natural causes and that an inquest was unnecessary.

Karlstrom was 59 years old, and is survived by a wife, whose maiden name was Augusta Patterson, a sister, Miss Ida Patterson, principal of the Patterson school of this city.
