CHANGE IS COMING

Ballinger Plans to Reorganize
Reclamation Service.
CAMPBELL CHIEF ADVISER

T. H. Newell Is Slated to Succeed
Morris Bien as Chief Law Of-
ficer, but Final Decision
Has Not Been Made.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-
ington, Dec. 4.—Secretary Ballinger is
preparing to reorganize the Reclamation
Service along new lines. His complete
plans are not yet worked out, but it is
understood he contemplates cutting the
salaries of some of the high officials and
probably making some changes of per-
sonnel.

He has selected A. C. Campbell, of the
Department of Justice, as chief legal ad-
viser on all matters pertaining to the
Reclamation Service, and the understand-
ing is that Morris Bien, now chief law of-
ficer of the service, will retire.

Though no decision has yet been
reached, Senators who have talked with
the Secretary are of the opinion that ul-
timately Director T. H. Newell will fol-
low Mr. Bien. This, however, is seem-
ingly still unsettled.

CONGRESSMEN ARE GATHERING
National Capital City Is Mecca of
Northwest Legislators.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-
ington, Dec. 4.—Representatives Hawley
and Ellis of Oregon, are expected to ar-
rive at Washington tonight. Representa-
tive Humphrey of Utah, arrived this
morning.

Ex-Senator George Turner, of Washing-
ton, is ill at his hotel in this city, suf-
fering from a slight attack of ptomaine
poisoning. His condition is not serious.

BILL ASKS FOR \$30,000,000
Borah Seeks National Credit for
Reclamation Work.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-
ington, Dec. 4.—Senator Borah, in co-opera-
tion with Secretary Ballinger, has com-
pleted an Administration bill authorizing
the issuance of \$30,000,000 of reclamation
bonds to facilitate the irrigation work of
the Government.

Secretary of the Treasury to borrow on
the credit of the United States, as needed,
money up to the maximum of \$30,000,000,
and to issue therefor registered reclamation
bonds in denominations of \$100 dol-
lars or some multiple thereof, redeemable
in cash after 10 years and payable 20
years from issue, out of the reclamation
funds, and bearing interest semi-annually
at rate of 3 per cent. The bonds are to
be disposed of in such amounts and at
such times as may be required by the
Secretary of the Interior.

The bill will be introduced Tuesday.

CITIZENSHIP IN BALANCE
Many May Lose Right by "General
Election" Ruling.

DENVER, Colo., Dec. 4.—Hundreds of
persons in Colorado, New Mexico, Wyo-
ming and Utah may lose their citizen-
ship rights as the result of orders re-
ceived in Denver today by Theodore
Schmucker, chief of the naturalization
bureau here. The victims will include
all who have received their final cer-
tificates within 30 days of a general
election of a local nature, and who re-
sided on the strength of the granting
of the certificates.

Not until today has the full meaning
of the term "general election," em-
bodied in the naturalization law, been
properly interpreted, and the decision
now received will entail no end of
work and confusion for the local Fed-
eral officials. It may result in con-
tention in the courts. The naturaliza-
tion officers have for years been under
the impression that "general elections"
applied only to Presidential, state and
other elections carrying the most im-
portant offices.

MISS BAUER LECTURES
"Psychology of Music Study" Her
Theme in New York.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—(Special).—
Miss Emilie Frances Bauer made her
first appearance on the lecture plat-
form during the week in New York.
She gave a talk on "The Psychology
of Music Study" before the students of
one of the large musical institutions.

Miss Bauer was introduced as a
woman of recognized authority on
psychology, to which she has devoted
much study. Many noted in these cir-
cles, said after the talk that they had
never heard a subject of such weight,
importance and technicality delivered
in such an illuminated manner. The
attention of the students was riveted
and for nearly an hour Miss Bauer dis-
cussed upon her subject with ease and
with telling effect.

Colonel Dent Before Retiring Board.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Colonel John
C. Dent, of the Fifty-fourth Infantry,
now in the Philippines, was today
ordered before an Army retiring board
at Manila for examination for physical
disability. General Potts is president
of the board appointed to examine
Colonel Dent.

CULBERSON IS OUT

Texan Resigns as Chairman
of Democratic Caucus.

MONEY TO TAKE HIS PLACE
Senator Predicts Approaching Ses-
sion Will Be Long and Exacting,
and Health Will Not Permit
Him to Be Active.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—At the first
conference of the Democratic members
of the Senate in the coming session of
Congress, Senator Culberson will submit
his resignation as chairman of the Demo-
cratic caucus.

This determination on the part of the
Texan has been reached because of his
serious illness, which will probably pre-
vent him from attending the sessions of
the Senate for at least two or three
weeks.

In a letter to Senator Money signifying
his intention to resign, Senator Culber-
son says:
"As you and all my Democratic as-
sociates know, I have not been at all
well for nearly a year. Last March I
had a severe attack of the grip. With-
out taking the necessary rest from such
an attack I remained in Washington in
attendance upon the Senate throughout
the recent extra session. The result was
that I continued ill during all the session
and at its close I was much reduced
in strength and vitality. From this I
have not recovered in the comparatively
short vacation which I have been able
to take.

"The approaching session of Congress
promises to be a long, exciting and
arduous one, and in my present condition
I do not feel that I should undertake
the extra duties which will devolve upon
the chairman of our caucus. It probably
would retard or prevent my early and
full restoration to health."

Senator Culberson succeeded Senator
Blackburn as chairman of the caucus
two years ago. In discussing his probable
successor several Senators today ex-
pressed the opinion that Senator Money
of Mississippi, vice-Chairman of the
caucus, would be chosen.

PITTSBURG GIRL SUICIDE?
Dying From Poison, Says She Was
Murdered for Jewels.

PITTSBURG, Kan., Dec. 4.—After a
detailed investigation the authorities
tonight were unable to determine
whether Miss Gertrude Ingberg, the 29-
year-old girl who met a mysterious
death at her home here early today,
was murdered, or committed suicide.

"They got my diamonds and then
gave me poison," gasped the girl to her
mother, who found her dying on the
front porch of the house. Her lips
were burned with acid. The diamond
earrings were gone. Every circum-
stance pointed to murder.

But the police advance another
theory. The girl may have quarreled
with the person who gave her the dia-
monds and returned them. Then, in a
fit of remorse she may have killed her-
self and, in order to protect her fam-
ily, told the murder story. If the girl
was murdered her slayer entered the
front room, dragged her to the porch
and, after taking her diamonds, poured
acid down her throat.

Danish Princess Passes.
COPENHAGEN, Dec. 4.—Princess
Waldemar, wife of the youngest son of
the late King Christian, and, before
her marriage in 1885, Marie, Princess
of Orleans, died here today.

MOTHER IS DETECTIVE

BLOODSTAINED OAR IS CLEW TO
DEATH OF WILLIAM CORDES.

Four Under Arrest, Spite of Coro-
ner's Verdict of Death by Ac-
cidental Drowning.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 4.—For 16 months Mrs.
Anna Cordes, of 2519 Farrar street, St.
Louis, has worked to dispel the uncer-
tainty as to the manner in which her
19-year-old son William came to his death
in Pittsburg Lake, near East St. Louis,
Ill. As a result, Mrs. Regina Koeslech
and four men, all residents of this city
are under arrest.

Mrs. Cordes and her daughter Adele
took a broken and blood-stained oar as a
clew and despite a Coroner's verdict of
accidental drowning, they delved into
the circumstances of the boy's end.

Two of the passengers, Frank and
August Ruhr, are said to have been with
Cordes on the lake. Mrs. Koeslech is their
aunt. The others, Alexis Holdes and
Fred Bianchi, are suspected of having
knowledge of Cordes' death.

NO CREAM ON MILK, CHARGE
Dairymen Is Arrested, but Jury
Fails to Agree.

ROSEBURG, Or., Dec. 4.—(Special).—
J. I. Springstead, a local dairymen,
charged with selling skimmed milk,
was tried today. The jury disagreed.

This, the first case of its kind to come
up for trial here, will be tried again
Monday. The case was brought by the
state inspector, in compliance with the
pure-food law.
