STEVENSON'S REPORT IN

Fallure of the Oregon Legislature last Winter to authorize specifically the expenditure of the funds received from hunting and fishing licenses for the erection of one or more hatcheries is responsible for the accumulation of over \$30,000 in the "game protection fund" of the state. This condition is pointed out by R. O. Stevenson. State last came and Forestry Warden, who has just completed his report for the year ending December 1 last. It was the intention of Mr. Stevenson to proceed with the erection of a trout hatchery and a pheasant incubator with the funds at his disposal, but, upon appealing to Attorney-General Crawford for an opinion, he was advised to retain the fund until the Legislature provides by enactment a specific plan for spending the money, which, according to the Attorney-General, will then be immediately available.

The report of Mr. Stevenson shows that the receipts from fishing and hunting Heenses in the state for the year were \$42,031.53, which, with a balance on hand last December of \$7598.56, made a total of \$51,939.54. New Laws Satisfactory.

"In conclusion I beg to say that the greater part of the time embraced in this report is covered by the administration of this office under the code of game laws enacted at the last session of the Legislature. The operation of the new laws has been generally satisfactory from the viewpoint of the game department. It is an omen of good cheer that public regard for game law enforcement is on the uplift and that violation of these laws is not nearly so general as formerly and has not been so flagrant as oftentimes reported.

Fines Amount to \$5668.

The report shows that during the The report shows that during the 12 months there were a total of 139 arrests for various violations of the game laws. Of that number only 26 were acquitted or dismissed, the total of fines imposed being \$5568. The offenses ranged from hunting without a license to dumping sawdust in a stream. The principal charge covered in the large number of arrests was hunting and killing deer with dogs. Among the large variety of complaints successfully prosecuted were the following. Trapping heaver, fliegal fishing, having untagged deer hides, selling trout, killing grouse, yanking trout. ing having untagged deer nides, sell-ing trout, killing grouse, yanking trout, catching trout less than six inches long, shooting fish, killing ducks, selling ducks, catching salmon with grab hook, killing Chinese pheasants and killing female deer. The fines ranged from 225 to \$100. \$25 to \$100.

Mr. Stevenson's report shows a small balance in the appropriation for his department for the year. The Game Warden is allowed a Salary of \$1200 per annum and an expense allowance of \$800, with a further allowance of \$2200 for deputy hire. His expenditures for the year were as follows: Salary Game Warden, \$1100; expenses Game Warden, \$1100; expenses Game Warden, \$577.15; deputy hire, \$2199.98; total, \$3977.15, leaving an unexpended balance of \$222.85.
