

## CHICAGO BEGINS FIGHT ON SALOON

Final Test of Strength to Be  
Made at Polls on  
April 5.

## LAW & ORDER LEAGUE OUT

Only One Reform Organization An-  
nounces Stand and It Will Not  
Actively Assist Campaign  
Which Opens This Week.

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—(Special).—With the best of intentions, the battle over the existence of the saloon will be on, to continue with increasing intensity until April 5, when the final test of strength will be made at the polls.

On Monday, the Anti-Saloon League will open headquarters and from there the army of men and women who will be in the field constantly until election day will be directed in their efforts.

The general campaign committee met in the offices of the Anti-Saloon League Friday to map out the work that is before it. Action was taken looking to the harmonious co-operation of all the forces which will be engaged in the fight to abolish the saloon in Chicago.

### United Effort to Be Made.

The endeavor to secure the united effort of all the reform organizations in the fight have been successful except as to a single organization, according to information that was given out today.

The one organization that has thus far seemed lukewarm toward the campaign, is the Chicago Law & Order League, of which Arthur Burrage Farwell is the secretary in charge. In a conference between Mr. Farwell and James K. Shields, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, it was formally announced that the Farwell organization will not actively assist the campaign.

"I am personally opposed to the saloon on principle," said Mr. Farwell, "and I shall use my personal influence to further the fight that is now being waged. Nevertheless, the organization I represent does not seek to change laws nor to carry elections. Our object is only to secure a proper enforcement of the laws that now exist, and for that reason we can take no hand in this fight."

Superintendent Shields admitted that the executive committee of his organization is disappointed at the attitude of the Law and Order League, although he expressed confidence in the personal views of Mr. Farwell.

### Hints of Ill-Feeling Heard.

Despite the amicable statements given out by the heads of the two organizations, it is known that there have been hints of ill-feeling between them ever since the time two years ago when the Law and Order League first announced the policy of not officially endorsing the Anti-Saloon League movement.

Opponents of the local option proposition will make a double-headed campaign, but there will be no clashing of interests. The united societies which represent a tremendous voting population will devote a large part of their energies toward impressing upon their members the importance of going to the polls and voting. The officers believe that the polling of practically the full strength of the organization will insure them a big victory and their efforts will be directed to that end.

The battle for the liquor interests probably will be directed by an organization of the business men who believe they will be affected adversely, directly or indirectly by the adoption of the local option proposition. These include the hotel and restaurant men and others. They probably will be organized during the coming week and will have charge of much of the educational campaign.

## GOHL FACES INFORMATION

Prosecuting Attorney Charges Mur-  
der of Charles Hadberg.

ABERDEEN, Feb. 12.—Prosecuting Attorney Campbell filed an information at Montezuma yesterday accusing William Gohl, saloonier, of murdering Charles Hadberg, with the murder of Charles Hadberg on the night of December 22, last year. The information merely follows the usual form and alleges Gohl killed Hadberg with a revolver. It does not name the place where the crime was committed. It is understood that plans for Gohl's defense will be outlined at a meeting of the leaders of the union to be held at San Francisco Monday. A. M. Abel, counsel for Gohl, filed objections to the information Monday. Gohl will be arraigned Monday.

No charge has yet been placed against Alexion Dagoett, who late yesterday afternoon tried to shoot Alexander Kagauff on the streets of Montezuma, following a law suit over a debt.

## BRITISH STEAMER

ASHORE; 51 DROWNED

Dangerous Magellan Straits  
Passage Scene of Latest  
Sea Disaster.

205 ON BOARD RESCUED  
Four Score or More Persons Left on  
Wrecked Ship, Rescue Being  
Impossible—No Drinking  
Water—Tanks Burst.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Feb. 12.—The Pacific Navigation Company's steamer Lima is ashore on one of the islands in the Humboldt passage of the straits of Magellan, and probably will be a total loss. The chief pilot and 50 passengers were drowned.

ANCUD, Chile, Feb. 12.—The British steamer Strathmore has arrived here with 188 men and women and 17 of the crew of the steamer Lima, which is on the rocks in West Humboldt passage, Straits of Magellan, where the steamer went aground in a storm recently. The steamer officials report having left 88 persons aboard the Lima, their rescue being impossible. There is no drinking water, the tanks having burst.

The stranded steamer Lima is a British vessel owned in Liverpool and plies between that port and ports of South America. She was last reported as sailing from Bahia Blanca, Argentina, on January 25, and was on her way to Chile and Peruvian ports.

The Lima is 401 feet long, registering 3,100 tons, and was built in Glasgow in 1907.

The place where the steamer was wrecked probably is Humboldt Passage, located between the south shore of San Pedro Island and Chile. It is a narrow passage full of dangers and difficult of navigation. Humboldt rocks, two in number, and 85 feet high, mark the entrance to the passage.

TUG AND 32 MEN ARE SOUGHT  
Navy Department Anxiously Hunts  
for Nina on Atlantic.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Somewhere off the Atlantic Coast between Norfolk and New York the little Nina, with 32 men on board, is wallowing in the great billows with broken machinery awaiting the arrival of one of eight Government vessels now speeding to her supposed location. The tug is in command of Chief Boatswain John Croaghan.

As bad as the prospect, it is the best hope of the officials at the Navy Department tonight. The alternative is that the Nina is at the bottom of the sea with a bare chance that her crew has been rescued.

Last Sunday the Nina steamed out of Hampton Roads for Boston. Before the day was far advanced a stiff northwest wind sprang up, making what sailors call a "nasty sea."

Under ordinary conditions the tug should have arrived at the Boston Navy yard last Tuesday, but it was only yesterday that the naval officers here began to feel nervous apprehensions for her safety. As no word of her arrival reached the department today, immediate search was ordered.

From Norfolk went the swift scout cruiser Salem and the battleship Louisiana. These vessels were instructed to cruise as far as Cape May along the coast. From the New York Navy yard the collier Chilgoa started on a cruise and she will be followed soon by the tugs Apache and Pontiac.

The gunboat Cordline and the Collier Caesar left the Boston Navy yard to join in the search. Then the revenue cutter services went to the assistance of the Navy and orders were flashed to the cutters Acushnet and Gresham, at Boston and New London to take part.

The problem is what is known as a "search problem" in naval strategy. The ocean is divided into squares, a certain number being assigned to each of the searching ships.

Naval officers believe the Nina broke a shaft or dropped a propeller and was blown off shore by the northwest gale into one of the deserted spaces outside the regular "lanes" of travel.

### ONLY ONE AMERICAN IS LOST

Ill-Fated General Chanzy Carried  
San Francisco Actor.

MARSEILLES, Feb. 12.—The French transatlantic line asserts that no passengers embarked on the General Chanzy, wrecked in the Mediterranean, after the regular passenger list had been made up.

According to this list the only American on the steamer when she foundered off the coast of Minorca on Wednesday night was Leon Derenda, a vaudeville performer of San Francisco.

The woman reported as an American was Miss Elsie Herly, who was born at Epernay, France, but recently returned from a trip to the United States. It was reported yesterday that an American named Delym was on board, but no such name appears on the passenger list.

The steamship officials received nothing during the day to encourage the hope that more than one person out of the 157 on board survived.
