Enforced Idleness Caused by Rain With Last Contest This Afternoon.

THIRD ROAD TRIP BEGINS

Portland and Los Angeles Will Hurry South Following Today's Struggle—McCredie Plans Strengthening Pitching Staff.

Too much dampness prevailed on the baseball grounds yesterday afternoon and the ballplayers drawing salary from Portland and Los Angeles enjoyed a day of enforced idleness.

Third Road Trip Is Begun. This will be the third road trip taken by the Portland team, and the hopeful fans are anticipating the usual success thus far marked by the McCredie band when on the road.

Manager McCredie is strong after a new pitcher, and the man may be either of three players in view. "Red" Wright, the former star of the Oakland team, who belongs to Portland by reason of an agreement with the Cleveland American team, may yet be induced to play this season, despite the announcement of his temporary retirement.

Then McCredie had received word from Cleveland that he can have George Bolce, last year with Oakland, but in this instance the Portland club must secure the consent of the Oakland team before Bolce can be played here, for the latter's commission would not be in favor of his leaving Oakland, as it did in favor of Carson when Vernon claimed the ex-Portland pitcher. Cleveland and Portland do not stand as well at the court of Garry Hermann as do Chicago and Happy Hogan.

"Speck" Harkness May Be Caught. The other pitching possibility for Portland is "Speck" Harkness, or another man. McCredie has had his eye on him for some time. Harkness is with the Cleveland club, but has not been able to pitch any because of a sore arm, which he is returning to Portland, where he may regain his form, is talked of at the home of the "Blues."

McCredie does not want Harkness unless the tall chap is in shape, for he wants a pitcher who can jump into the game immediately and not get going with Cleveland for another twirler.

Weather permitting this afternoon, Eugene Krupp will pitch for the Beavers, while Dillon will depend upon either Andy Briswalter or George Wheeler.

POOR WORK LOSES FOR OAKS. Moser Is Off Color and Wares, at Second, Piles Up Errors.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—Moser pitched a poor game today at Recreation Park, and when he was taken out in the eighth inning, Oakland had lost its chance.

TOWNS TO BE REPRESENTED.

It is now definitely known that teams will be on hand from Baker City, Pendleton, Woodburn, Albany, Salem, Astoria, as well as six teams from Portland. Eugene will have two teams and each of the other points named, one team.

The first event, as shown by the programme, will be the state trophy race. This will be the occasion of a hard tussle for first place among the 20 companies of the Guard. Captain Johnson's company, Cottage Grove, was the champion of the state. Astoria now holds the silver cup, which must be won three times consecutively before becoming the property of any particular organization. Cottage Grove is reported to have a strong team again this year, as well as confidence that the cup will renew for another year in the Cottage Grove Armory. Company D, of Roseburg and Company B, Portland, both have hopeful designs on the same cup.

The state individual match promises to be the most spectacular and hardest fought of the lot. In that contest it will be every man for himself and the winner will bear the title of individual champion of the state. As there are a number of exceptional shots in Southern Oregon, as well as in the Willamette Valley and Portland, none is attempting to predict what section will develop the champion this year. The ranges will be 200 yards at rapid and slow fire, 600 and 1000 yards slow fire, and skirmish run.

Third Infantry Hopeful. Following that event will be the Governor's trophy match, in which the Third and Fourth Regiments of Infantry will struggle for supremacy. For several years past the Southern Oregon regiment has been getting far the better of the argument, but the personal hope of the Third Infantry remains. Each regiment will be represented by a team of eight men to be selected after the individual contest, when each regiment commander will be able to select the very best material in his command.

AUTOS USED TO EXPLORE

Machines and Aeroplanes Planned for African Trip. He figures the cost at \$225,000.

FOURTH INFANTRY RETURNS.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—The Army transport Sherman, from Manila, with the Fourth Infantry on board, arrived here today. The regiment, which has been in the islands for two years, will be sent to posts in Arkansas and Nebraska. Besides the infantry regiment, there was a large number of military and civilian cabin passengers on board the transport. Thirty members of the Sherman's crew, all in the quarantined station today before the transport was docked.

TACOMA BOXER TAKES LEAD EASILY IN MIH AT CHEHALIS.

CHEHALIS, Wash., June 11.—(Special.)—Last night at Centralla, Lee Croft, Tacoma, knocked out Billy Ross, of Centralla, in the sixth round of what was to have been a 10-round go. Croft had the best of the fighting after the third round, and it was manifest to the 400 spectators that he must win. Croft is a square clean-cut fighter, and made a fine showing last night. He had the advantage of 15 pounds in weight over Ross but the latter made a game start.

GLASS FACTORY AT BACCARA, FRANCE, HAS PRODUCED A NEW GLASS THAT WILL NOT BREAK.
