CROP GROWTH SHOWS LOWER

Department Figures Make Difference of 5.5 Against Last Year.

WASHINGTON, July 9 .- The crop growth of the United States on July 1 was lower than at any time during the last 10 years, according to crop reports of the Department of Agriculture, issued today. The report says:

"The general average condition of crop growth in the United States, July 1, was about 5.5 per cent lower than on July 13 said the bearded and long-haired prophet, 1900; 3.8 per cent lower than July 1, 1908, and 2.4 per cent lower than the 10-year average condition on July 1."

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, July 9 .- The detailed crop report of the Department of Agriculture shows the condition of Winter wheat in Oregon, at harvest this year, to have been \$8, or 8 per cent above what it was last year. This is a decline, however, of 4 per cent since June 1, last.
