

2 SPEECHES MADE BY JUDGE BURKE

Candidate for Senator From Washington Talks in Clark County.

TAFT'S CONDUCT PRAISED

West Side Man Discusses Conservation, Denounces Insurgents and Explains His Connection With the Railroads.

VANCOUVER Wash., Aug. 20.—(Special.)—Judge Thomas Burke, of Seattle, candidate for United States Senator from Washington, on the Republican ticket, delivered two addresses in Clark county today, one this afternoon at a harvest picnic at Orchards, and one in the Auditorium at Vancouver tonight.

His address was punctuated often by applause from the audience, many members of which returned to a symposium with what he said, especially on the conservation question and the necessity that the West Side should have a Senator.

Judge Burke said he believed now and always has believed that those who come into a country as pioneers are entitled to reap the fruits of their toil and of their energy in facing the hardships of a wilderness.

Same Conservation Wanted.

Judge Burke declared that he believes in conservation to the extent necessary to protect the natural resources of the state. He favors protection from forest fires, and the preservation of forests on the mountainsides, but is absolutely opposed to throwing into forest reserves land that is needed for agriculture.

Judge Burke spoke of the attitude of the insurgents in connection with the conservation policy of the Finchot brand and declared that in this attitude the insurgents are dealing a blow to Washington in behalf of the East.

Referred to the coal and the water power resources, Judge Burke said he believes laws should be enacted to prevent these great resources from falling into the hands of monopolists.

In this connection Judge Burke referred to the attitude of the insurgents, arguing that in effect they say to the people of Washington: "You are incapable of protecting yourselves, so we must permit Congress and Congress appointed bureaucrats who never have been west of the Mississippi River, to protect your interests."

Railroad Connections Explained. Dealing with his railroad association, Judge Burke showed that for the first 15 years of his life in Seattle he had to fight in the interest of his home and of the territory against the only railroad of any importance then in Washington.

PATTON PAYS BETS

Wagers That Hofer Will Win May Disqualify Candidate.

BETTOR TAKES SHORT END

Corrupt Practices Law Makes Provision Against Act Without Reference to Candidacy of Person Offending.

SALLEM, Or., Aug. 20.—(Special.)—Hal D. Patton, member of the lower house in the last Legislature and now candidate for State Senator from this county, has openly made the statement in the presence of many witnesses in the past few weeks that he has wagered a considerable sum of money at odds of 1 to 2 that E. Hofer will secure the nomination at the primary election as Republican candidate for Governor.

By section 23 of the corrupt practices act it is expressly stipulated that any candidate who, before or during any election campaign, makes any bet or wagers on anything of pecuniary value, or in any manner comes a party to any such bet or wager on any event or contingency relating to any pending election, or who provides money or any other valuable to be used by any person in betting or wagering upon the result of any impending election, shall be guilty of corrupt practice.

It is further provided in the act that anyone guilty of corrupt practice is subject to a maximum fine of \$500 and a year's imprisonment in the county jail.

BOY ADMITS KILLING

James Roberts, 18, Tells How He Slew McConnell.

SELF-DEFENSE HIS PLEA

Declares Man Whom He Slew Had Knocked Him Down During Quarrel—Red-Headed Outlaw Is Cleared.

COLIFAX, Wash., Aug. 20.—(Special.)—Sheriff Carter and deputies, after more than a month's effort, arrested James Roberts, aged 18, today and he confessed to having killed Ted McConnell at Colifax, July 1.

According to Roberts' confession, McConnell started a quarrel at the toilet in the rear of the New Castle saloon, knocking Roberts down. Roberts then shot McConnell with a .38 revolver and fled for his home eight miles north of Colifax, having jumped out the rear door of the saloon, making his escape during the excitement of sports and priching returns on Main street.

McConnell died at St. Ignatius' Hospital, stating before death that he had knocked the man down who shot him, and did not know him. Roberts has a father and five brothers, all of the very best reputation, living near Colifax. James was never quarrelsome and did not drink.

POSSE CHASE IS ON

Oregon Fugitive in Hiding; Officials in Pursuit. THOMAS HART IS ACCUSED

Assault With Dangerous Weapon Is Charge Placed Against Wilbur Man—Escape Believed Aided by Friends—Wife Fears.

ROSEBURG, Or., Aug. 20.—(Special.)—Accused of assault with a dangerous weapon, Thomas Hart, of Wilbur, is hiding in the woods somewhere in the vicinity of Oakland, and notwithstanding the fact that a posse, headed by Sheriff Fenton and Constable Singleton, has been on his track since early last night, all efforts to capture him have proved futile.

Thinking that Hart would return to his home during the night, the Sheriff kept watch nearby, but without result. This morning the officers solicited the services of several men well acquainted in the locality where Hart is supposed to be hiding and started in pursuit.

Hart is considered a dangerous character when drinking, and in addition hates Constable Singleton, with whom he has had trouble upon several occasions. It is the belief of the officers that he is armed, inasmuch as he is said to have informed several persons that he would resist arrest.
