

GREATEST EVENT OF THE SEASON

Was the Opening on Thursday Evening of the "Lotus,"
Portland's New \$50,000 Buffet and Billiard Parlors.

It seemed that all Portland was out to attend the grand and auspicious opening on Thursday night of the "Lotus" at 127 Sixth street. It was the greatest event of the season and people were amazed at the magnificence of this elaborate buffet and billiard parlors, being unequalled in the West.

All day and evening on Friday and Saturday the public was inspecting Portland's most recent and pleasurable resort. The enthusiasm that has been created is without a parallel in the history of the city.

Portland had seen the transformation of an ordinary building into the grand and gorgeous "Lotus."

Morris Nelson is the sole proprietor of the "Lotus" and it is his ideas that are embodied in this handsome \$50,000 buffet and billiard parlors. It will be a strictly first-class place, catering only to respectable men and allowing no rowdiness at any time.

It is well known that the lotus is the favorite Egyptian flower, and the entire decoration of the place has been carried out to harmonize and be suggestive of this flower.

The exterior view of the building is herewith presented in the accompanying halftone.

To appreciate thoroughly the magnificence of the place, it must be seen. It can be said that it has the most attractive exterior in the city.

The entire first floor is devoted to the buffet, which is of beautiful mahogany, and the back contains two of the largest mirrors ever shipped West, being each 18 feet 6 inches long by 6 feet 6 inches high.

On this floor are also compartments with comfortable seats, telephone booths, writing desks, lounging chairs, safety deposit vaults and strictly modern and sanitary lavatories.

On the second floor are the billiard and pool tables and all accessories to make the patrons comfortable. The tables are made of Circassian walnut, being inlaid with pearl. Opera chairs are arranged on raised platforms around the room for players and guests. Clothing lockers are at the disposition of the patrons, and private lockers for cues have not been forgotten by the proprietor.

While the Lotus will be the best of its kind, popular prices and patronage will prevail. Service and attention will be given alike to all patrons. In launching his business in Portland, the proprietor has laid down strict business rules, and proposes to follow them. It might well be said that his system will be the new order or twentieth century buffet.

The difference between this place and the average buffet will be as great as that between noon-day and midnight.

Special attention has been given to installing a ventilating system. This is known as the suction plan, and air is changed every 60 seconds by an automatic arrangement. Ventilators are placed at various places through the first and second floors, pipes to these vents leading to the rear of the building, and the impure air dispelled into the open. At the same time, the system is again filling the room with pure air. This avoids the odor usually found in buffets.

The lighting effects have been given equally as careful attention. All lights are made from beautifully stained glass. Above the writing room is placed a large various colored glass reflector, back of which are lights. This gives a splendid and easy light. In the center of the room is another such scheme, and at each compartment are smaller lights worked out in the general color and lighting scheme. The lotus flower is prominent in each light. The same lighting system is carried out in the billiard parlor, and above each table is a suspended plate glass of harmonious color.

The ice box is equipped completely with modern fixtures, and a large humidor is the only one of its kind in the city. Glassware throughout the house

is specially designed for this place, and is of the beautiful Belgian style. Silverware has also been selected in harmony with the general scheme.

Mr. Nelson formerly conducted the M. & N. buffet at Dawson, Alaska. He was in charge of that place for 10 years, and visitors to that city know of the place. It was at one time considered the best equipped and most business-like place in the Northwest. The Lotus buffet at Seattle was also built and conducted by Mr. Nelson. In making his bow to Portland Thursday evening, he extends a warm hand and good fellowship. He says his motto will be business first, last and all the time.

PRICE FOR LOGS CONTINUES GOOD

Operators Say Industry in Oregon is in Healthy Condition Now.

WORK IS DELAYED BY RAIN

Plants Prepare to Resume Activity When Weather Moderates—Report That Quotations Have Declined Is Erroneous.

Prevailing prices for logs in the Columbia River camps are satisfactory and the logging industry is in a healthy condition, according to leading operators of Portland.

R. S. Farrell, of the Pacific Logging Company, said yesterday that some of the concern's plants had been shut down on account of weather conditions, but that all would resume operation just as soon as the rainy season was over.

"The report sent out from Astoria that log prices had declined is erroneous," said Mr. Farrell. "As a matter of fact, the best-grade stuff commands a good price. Our company has sold all of its stock on hand, consisting of three rafts, and with the three grades the average price a thousand feet was in excess of \$10."

W. B. Ayer, of the Eastern & Western Lumber Company, which operates a large sawmill in Portland and a string of logging camps at Eufaula, Wash., declared that log prices were entirely satisfactory.

"If logs do not come to over \$7.50 a thousand feet, such as reported at Astoria, the sale must represent the sale of a poor lot of logs. Notwithstanding that we are operating our own camps, we have been sending out inquiries for sawlogs desired to suit special requirements, expecting to pay the market price for them."

Speaking for the Whitney Timber Company, A. B. Westall said that the output of that company's plants had been sold out entirely and that orders are on hand to handle the output until the first of the coming year.

"We are receiving good prices for our stuff: \$13 a thousand for No. 1 fir logs; \$10 for No. 2 logs, and \$7 for No. 3 logs. The first grade represents clear or flooring logs; the second, merchantable logs; and the third grade is used for common purposes. There is but a small percentage of the third grade in the output. The average price on the output we have just sold approximates \$10 a thousand feet."

the industry in Oregon has been hampered considerably. High freight rates and the uncertainty of adjustment of rates have had a serious effect on the logging and lumber industries in the state. But notwithstanding this situation, conditions generally are in good shape and I look for a vigorous renewal of activity in all the large camps at an early date."

STORM BUFFETS VESSELS

Ships Reach Puget Sound Badly Damaged.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Sailing vessels arriving on Puget Sound today bring further proof of the terrific gales that have been raging off the entrance to the Straits of Juan de Fuca and the Coast of Washington for the last ten days.

Minus several of her sails and her foremast, the schooner H. D. Hedixen, arrived here today eight days out from San Francisco, one of the smartest passages in recent months. Sailing along with a howling southwest gale, the Hedixen's sailing qualities were tried severely.

Bringing a story of the furious gales, including three days of buffeting about while efforts were made to spread new canvas in the place of that carried away by the terrific winds, the bark Albert arrived today with considerable sail mangled and her mainmast nearly shattered. The Albert narrowly escaped destruction during the gale that stripped her of her sails as the vessel floundered around in the mountainous seas.

On leaving here, the Kensington will proceed to Seattle and Tacoma to load wheat cargo. John Lambie, her master, is visiting Puget Sound for the first time since 1888, when he piloted the British ship Winthrop to these waters. The Windsor Park is well known in the early history of Puget Sound shipping.

E. V. Carter to Travel Widely.

ASHLAND, Or., Nov. 12.—E. V. Carter, for 25 years cashier of the United States National Bank of Ashland until a few weeks ago, when he resigned the position and active management of the institution, left this city Thursday accompanied by his wife for an extended trip, expecting to be absent for several months. They go first to Southern California, thence to Houston, Texas, and spend the winter with relatives, and will sail in January for a trip through the Mediterranean and to points in Egypt, the Holy Land and Southern Europe.

JEAN Takes American Flour. SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 12.—Nearly 100,000 barrels of flour were shipped from Seattle and Tacoma to the Orient during October. A feature of the month's shipments of flour from Puget Sound was the amount of breadstuffs sent to Japan, which has for many months been a poor customer for American flour. Ten thousand barrels of flour were shipped to Yokohama and 3000 barrels to Moji.

CHESTER, S. C., Nov. 12.—Five years in the penitentiary at Columbia, "without labor," was the sentence passed by Special Judge Ernest Ford today on John Black, ex-member of the State Dispensary Board, charged with conspiracy to defraud the state.

MAN HUNT SUCCESS

Alleged "Black Hand" Letter Writer Is Caught.

DOMINIC JONALI IN JAIL

Police Believe He Demanded \$1000 From Pete Bruno by Threat. That Organized Band Exists Here Is Late Theory.

Two detectives and half a dozen unofficial sleuths, secreted in various vantage points, waited until a late hour for the blackmailer who had sent a threatening letter, demanding \$1000, to Pete Bruno, proprietor of a North End resort. Early yesterday morning their efforts were rewarded by the capture of Dominic Jonali, against whom a strong circumstantial case is established in connection with the attempted crime.

In a letter received Friday morning, Bruno was ordered to deposit \$1000 in a mail box on a stairway at 104 1/2 First street that night, upon pain of death. Acting under instructions from Captain of Detectives Moore, Bruno made preparations to comply with the demand, substituting an envelope full of newspaper clippings for the money.

Detectives Coleman and Snow, with a rifle, established themselves in an office overlooking the mail box, and numerous friends of Bruno's, volunteering for the hunt, and loaded to the gunwales with artillery, planted themselves in adjacent doorways. When all were about to give up, Jonali was discovered prowling about the vicinity, and was halted and questioned.

He said that he lived in the neighborhood, but upon being released started for the North End. Bruno remembered Jonali as a man who had rushed into his place last Monday night, immediately after the killing of R. Fatini, an Italian cook, and who had taken him to task for the murder, saying "You killed him and you shall pay for it."

Jonali was overtaken and arrested on a technical charge. He denies knowledge of the communication to Bruno, but is being held on a technical charge until a full investigation can be made.

Taken in connection with the killing of Jacob Rossi in Sellwood a week ago, the attempt upon Bruno is believed by the officers to show the existence of a predatory organization in this city. Patrolman Moloney learned from Italian sources yesterday that Nicola Pontiere, who is believed to be the man who shot Rossi while resisting highway robbery, returned to his former residence in this city a few days ago, and said that he would remain away from home because he feared death from Rossi's associates. Pontiere had been practically exterminated by the officers, who believe that he was protecting himself when he shot Rossi, and was sent out for him to give himself up and aid the police in capturing Rossi's companion in the supposed hold-up. Pontiere is quoted as saying that he would do so, were it not that he would surely be killed by Rossi's friends.

Ambitious Team Would Play Easterners for Championship.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Aberdeen is football crazy and to convince supporters of the blue and gold that this city can boast of the best High School football team in the United States, efforts are being made by a number of citizens to secure a game here between the undefeated High School champion team of the East or Middle West with Aberdeen.

Troy and Rochester, two of the strongest teams in New York, as well as in the East, will meet Thanksgiving day and the winner of the game will meet the best team in Cook County, Ill. It is the desire here to secure the winner of these games for a game with Aberdeen.

The local great victories during the present season seems to be sufficient to assure the team's backers that it is the best team of its class in the United States. An effort will also be made Monday to have the several lumber companies of Aberdeen furnish lumber to build a monster grandstand large enough to hold 15,000 people.

Should M. K. Patterson, of Chicago, who has announced his intention to bring the best team in Cook County to the Coast, prove that his team is the Northwest League.

To Lincoln High, of Portland, is due considerably more credit than evidenced by the Sound press. The team, coached by the Sound press, has been champions of all teams between the Mississippi and the Atlantic. Backers in the movement are local sports, who were behind the Black Cats in the Northwest League.

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COLUMBIA IS PREMIER

University Team Lays Claim to Honors of Season.

The Columbia University preparatory team, with but one more game ahead of them and a past record unmarred by defeat, stands today as the premier eleven of the interscholastic league. Washington High School is the only league team that has succeeded in crossing Columbia's goal line this year. Columbia has been badly handicapped this season by having so many of her regular players out of the game on account of injuries. Wednesday, in their game against Washington, Malarky, Billedeau and Davis were unable to play. However, when they met Lincoln High School, a week from next Wednesday, they will go into the game with a full lineup for the first time this year.

Ketner, who was shifted to quarterback after the injury to Malarky, has been playing a wonderful game and bids fair to make a position on the all-

star team. His regular position is halfback and his offensive and defensive work is beyond criticism. His brilliant kicking practically won Wednesday's contest from Washington.

Davis, the regular right end, has been in the hospital several days, but Coach Schmitt expects to be able to use him against Lincoln. Although one of the midlegs he has no equal at end in the league, being one of last year's all-stars. In Hoffman, Columbia has found a wonderful tackle. Time and again he broke through the line Wednesday, breaking up numerous plays, and it was he who practically won the game by blocking a punt and carrying the ball over the line for a touchdown.
