OLSTOI ON NEIGHBOR'S ES- TATE.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 12.—
Special.)—The Moscow correspon-
dent of the Novoye Vremya says that
Count Tolstoy has been located in the
house of the district of Tula pro-
vince. He is on the estate of the
Princesses, well-known manufac-
turers.

ULA, Russia, Nov. 12.—Count Leo
Tolstoy's place of retirement has been
discovered, but is not known beyond
members of his own family and
close friends.

His agitation over his strange con-
duct was aggravated when the
news, in despair, twice attempted
to jump from the balcony, but
was held back.

The first news of Tolstoy's disap-
pearance came from Prince Dmitri
Dolgorukov, who says the Count left his
home several days ago, accompanied
by Makovetsky, his physician. That
doctor should be a party to the
disappearance is another inexplicable feature.

Count Tolstoy became the companion of
Count in succession to the latter's
secretary, M. Gusev, whom the
Count had influenced Tolstoy's anti-
military writings.

Count has been in ill health for
some time. He suffered frequent sink-
ings, and on October 18 was un-
conscious for hours. Later it was re-
ported that he had improved somewhat.

His writings Tolstoy has condemned
as immoral and irrational, and
expressing a perverted view of the
value of life.

He believed Tolstoy proceeded to an
estate in the government of
Tula on the west.

Prince Dmitri Dolgorukov's telegram
yesterday stated that Tolstoy left his
home on October 18. This is obviously
true, as the Count was still at his
home on October 18.

PETERSBURG, Nov. 12.—(Special.)
People who have known of the family
of Tolstoy were not surprised to
find that the Count had been driven
to die in solitude, for a family
party several years ago is de-
scribed by a guest as follows:

Knowing the Count's religion I was
sured for the greatest simplicity. I
met Tolstoy when I arrived at his
home. He was a man of about 60,
a woman near 60, I should say, a
tendency toward embonpoint, and
dressed in a simple dress of extreme
modesty and in fact, she wore
several jewels of great value. I judge
hastened down to the dinner table
at first I was amazed. The air was
filled with the perfume of cut flowers
the table was laden with silver and
glass. The company appeared to be
composed of people of fashion and gaiety
were talking of theater, opera and
festivities of the neighborhood.

The other end of the table I saw a
man, a peasant in a faded
coat, long hair and a beard trimmed
rather untrimmed, after the native
fashion. When he arose I saw that he
was barefoot, and when he grasped my
hand I found it hard and cold as if
labor. This was Tolstoy.

One of the greatest matters of differ-
ence between the couple was the origi-
nal of the Count's countenance. Tol-
stoy was a man of a stern, almost
fierce expression. The Countess, on the
other hand, was a woman of a gentle,
almost angelic expression.

The Countess once said to a friend:
My husband wants to give away all
possessions and leave us with only the
poorest of things. I have not the power
to work so hard and so many things
are necessary, that he thinks wicked in
the way he looks at things. I told him
that I alone have managed the
family affairs. Everything is done by
my hands.

One time the Countess sought to
drive Tolstoy, judged insane, and he
was taken before the commission in
law. The evidence against him was
that he wished to give all his property
to the poor, but the magistrate declared
this was no evidence of an unsound
mind. Tolstoy returned home after his
arrest and took up his life after an
interval of a few days. He was
agreed to disagree. After that she

common ground upon which they
stood. It was no doubt that the
Count was a great trial to his wife, and
had the sympathy of all her friends.

Count could not dwell with her husband,
he always insisted upon doing third
or entertainments, so she had to
alone, and he was more or less a

Hoxsey Saves Day at Balti-
more Aviation Meet.

WEATHER MARS SPORT

Official Records for Week Give
Latham Duration Prize in Addi-
tion to Sun's Reward for
Long Flights Over City.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 12.—Nothing could
well have been more unpropitious for
aviation than the weather of the early
afternoon of the closing day of the
Baltimore aviation meeting. Between
opening and closing time the wind blew
11 to 15 miles an hour, according to
the official gauge.

More than one of the flyers had ex-
pressed a determination to make
flights, but they were not permitted to
do so until nearly 5 o'clock, when Hox-
sey took a passenger-carrying Wright
aeroplane for a brief flight, which was
the last ascent of the meeting and which
saved the day's gate.

The official records of the meet were
announced tonight as follows:

hours, 53 minutes, 21 1-5 seconds;

sey (Wright), 1 hour, 21 minutes, 46 2-5
seconds; Ely (Curtiss), 7 minutes, 41-5
seconds; Willard (Curtiss), 5 minutes,
2 seconds; Radley (Bleriot), 2 minutes,
21 3-5 seconds.

Latham's time in the flight over this
city for the Sun prize is not included in
the cross-country (to Port Carroll and
return, round trip about 18 miles),
Drexel (Bleriot), 21 minutes, 45 4-5
seconds; DeLaseps (Bleriot), 25
minutes, 15 seconds; Latham (Antoinette),
28 minutes, 58 seconds.

OUTLAWS MAKE HAUL

TRIO MASKED MEN ROB PAY-
MASTER OF NEARLY \$5000.

Highwaymen Hold Up Man With
Money for Italian Laborers, De-
spite Armed Deputies.

GREAT BARRINGTON, Mass., Nov.
12.—Three masked highwaymen, armed
with rifles, secured between \$1000 and
\$5000 today through one of the most
daring holdups ever known in New
England.

The money comprised the payroll for
two camps of Italian laborers employed
by the Worcester Construction Com-
pany on the building of a Nevada elec-
tric line between Great Britain and
Egremont. It was carried by the pay-
master, a man of the name of Hines,
who was escorted by Deputy Sheriffs
Fred Truesdell and Carlton Robinson.

Paymaster Hines and his escort were
walking along the trolley line about
two miles from Great Barrington. As
they approached a densely wooded
swamp they were confronted by three
masked men who leveled rifles at them
and demanded the money.

Within half an hour a posse of 200
armed men was on its way to the scene.
The robbers are thought trapped in a
swamp.

PORK PACKER TO RECOVER

Millionaire Poisoned by Arsenic, but
Wife Is Not Blamed.

WHEELING, W. Va., Nov. 12.—John
O. Schenck, the millionaire pork packer,
who is alleged to have been poisoned
with arsenic, will recover, according
to his physician, Dr. P. L. Hupp, al-
though his recovery will be slow.

All communication with Mrs. Schenck
is forbidden, and her attorneys tonight
issued a statement denying rumors
that she had made a confession of any
wrongdoing.

DAIRYMEN HEAR WARNING SOUNDED

Commissioner Bailey Says Big
Interests Want Oleomar-
garine Law Passed.

LAW IS DECLARED INIMICAL

Passage of Proposed Legislation
Speaker Says Would Mean De-
struction of State Dairy In-
terests in Brief Time.

Warning the creamery and butter
men of the State of Oregon that the
"big interests" were already organ-
ized to force through the Legislature
a law favorable to oleomargarine, J.
W. Bailey, State Dairy and Food Com-
missioner, aroused enthusiasm in a
speech delivered at the first meeting
of the association, which was called to
order last night in the convention hall
of the Portland Commercial Club.

Mr. Bailey declared that if an oleo-
margarine law was passed permitting
the packers to sell oleomargarine in
the state he would not give five cents
for the dairy interest of Oregon.

"It will wipe you out of business. All
of you know what the oleomargarine
did a few years ago before the pas-
sage of the National measure. Today
with the high price of butter the Gov-
ernment tax on oleomargarine is a very
small matter. My advice is to get
busy."

Society's Aims Outlined.

There were just 24 butter and cream-
ery men in the hall when Paul V. Maris,
Deputy Commissioner, called the meet-
ing to order. He outlined in a brief
speech the purposes and the aims of
the society as he viewed the opportu-
nity. He believed that there were suf-
ficient problems identified with the but-
ter and creamery business which would
justify the organization of such a so-
ciety as all had in mind. There exist-
ed, he said, in the state at the present
time a State Dairymen's Association
and it was doing a splendid work for
the advancement of the dairies of the
state and the securing of a better con-
dition in the matter of sanitation.

Co-operation Is Needed.

At the present stage of the industry,
he said, the improvement of the
herds depended upon the co-operation
of the creameryman and dairymen in
the eradication of the existence of tu-
berculin. It was to be the future pol-
icy of the country in this direction
then the sooner the country got rid
of its tubercular cattle the better it
was for everyone. A fact which faces
all those engaged in the industry, he
declared, was that no provision exists
by law for compensation of the loss to
the unfortunate dairymen.

"If the killing of tubercular cattle
is solely for the benefit of the people,"
said Mr. Maris, "and of damage to the
dairymen it seems as if the cow owner
should receive pay for his loss from the
state treasury. Anyway it is a
question which can be taken up in your
meetings and discussed."

"The creamery interests of the coun-
try," continued the speaker, "have
broadened very materially in the last
10 years. This has been brought about
by means of inventions, scientific
knowledge and keen competition.

There has been a great stride since our
forefathers went out in the corner and
milked in a dirty bucket the speckled
cow. Today we have the milking ma-
chine, the separator and the cement-
floored barn. We can test the milk.
We know the number of organisms
necessary to make the milk wholesome.

I believe that the butter men can
very materially in bringing about the
proper solution of the multitude of
problems which confront the industry
today."

The appointment of M. S. Shrock,
H. Lee and D. A. McIntyre, all of Port-
land, by the chairman for the prepara-
tion of articles and by-laws for the
guidance of the society was made and
the following officers were chosen:

President, B. H. Lee, of Portland;
vice-president, B. H. Kent, of Albany;
secretary and treasurer, Paul V. Maris,
of Corvallis; executive committee,
David Giger, of Pendleton; C. H. Fraer,
of Corvallis, and Carl Abrams, of
Salem; legislative committee, H. H.
Graham, D. A. McIntyre and G. F.
Jones, all of Portland.

It was decided upon the invitation of
Carl Abrams, of Salem, to hold a
permanent meeting in Eugene, Decem-
ber 8, a day ahead of the meeting of
the State Dairymen's Association. At
this meeting a score of resolutions of
the society will be made and the var-
ious exhibits. Large prizes have already
been provided for and the indications are
that it will be well attended and much
interest manifested in the outcome.

STUDENT BODY CONTROLS

President Kerr Approves Movement
at Corvallis.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COL-
LEGE, Corvallis, Or., Nov. 12.—(Spe-
cial.)—President Kerr has expressed his
approval of the movement for student
self-control, which was inaugurated at
the recent meeting of the student body,
and with his consent a committee has
started the work of drawing up the
plans for such a government.

Although no exact system has been
decided upon, it is thought that the
main administrative powers of the stu-
dent body will rest in a committee on
student affairs. This committee will
consist of a number of members elected
at large from the student body itself
and it will have power to decide and
advise upon any dispute which may
arise from the breaking of the laws of
the student body constitution.

This system has been so successful
in other schools and colleges that the
students are more than anxious to try
it out here, and its introduction only
awaits the completion of the work of
the committee which has the plans in
charge.
