

HOPS ARE GONE

Only 1519 Bales of the Crop Left in Oregon.

COAST STOCK 6470 BALES

Smallest Quantity in Growers' Hands on This Date in Over Twenty Years—Available Supply of All Growths in United States.

The supply of new hops on the Pacific Coast has been at a low level for some time. In over 20 years as it is now. There are in growers' hands used in Oregon, Washington and California only 6470 bales of the crop of 1910. Oregon, which produced a crop of about 94,000 bales, has only 1519 bales left.

At the brewers of the United States use from 4000 to 4500 bales of hops weekly, it will be seen that there is less than two weeks' supply of hops in growers' hands in all parts of the country.

With supplies so reduced, an active market is not possible, and few sales have recently been made in the past week. McNiff Bros. have purchased 144 bales of 1910 hops, including the 24-bale crop of 1909. McNiff Bros. & Co. have purchased the 1910 crop of 135 bales of 1909 at Dallas and E. C. Heron secured 100 bales of 1909 from James & Grosvenor, of Georgia.

The market for new hops is quoted at 15 cents to 16 cents, according to quality, the latter price having been bid for a choice lot in the past few days. The crop of 1909 is quoted at 5 to 6 cents and old-olds are worth from 1 to 2 cents.

There is a moderate demand for 1911 contracts, but growers are showing no disposition to sell. Offers are being made at 21 to 24 cents for three and five-year contracts, and 12 to 15 cents for one-year contracts.

London cables quoted the English market firm, but quiet with new Pacific normal at 90 to 95 shillings.

ALL GRAIN MARKETS CLOSE QUIET.

Good Wheat Movement Expected When English Holidays Over.

The local grain market showed but little life yesterday in any department. Prices were more or less nominal. Wheat dealers expect a rather quiet market for one year as soon as the English holidays are over. Weekly foreign wheat shipments were reported by the Merchants Exchange as follows:

Market is Stronger and Association Now Asks \$1.00 per Cwt.

The Confederated Onion Growers Association, at the regular meeting yesterday, raised the 2 c. b. price of onions to \$1.00. Requests submitted for a further increase of 5 cents were refused. The association has 140 acres of onions in the ground in all sections. Since the shipping season opened about 140 cwt. have been disposed of.

The onion market is in a very firm condition and the growers look for better prices a month hence. The principal demand is from California. Seattle and Tacoma buyers from the Sound cities and British Columbia. No fear is felt of competition from Texas this year.

PRICES OF POULTRY GO HIGHER.

Chickens Sell at Top Notch with Strong Demand.

There was a very strong demand for all kinds of poultry yesterday, and the small receipts listed but a short time. Hens sold as high as 10 cents. Ducks were taken at 20 to 22 cents and geese at 15 cents. Turkeys were scarce and sold for the most part around 25 cents. The demand for chickens was better than that for turkeys.

Eggs were weak at 35 to 38 cents. Buyers held off, expecting lower prices when business opens Tuesday, as an accumulation seems certain.

The butter and cheese markets were steady and unchanged.

GOOD DEMAND FOR FANCY APPLES.

But Cheap Varieties are Too Plentiful—Oranges are Firm.

The fruit and vegetable trade was fair yesterday, considering it was the last day of the month with a holiday at hand. Parsnips and turnips were well cleaned up. There was a good demand for fancy apples, but the supply of cheap varieties was too heavy. Oranges were strong and active. Rice bananas were scarce and badly wanted.

There was a car of celery due today. The produce house will be open for half a day Monday.

"Very light receipts in all lines have characterized light week on this market. There were 171 cattle, 94 calves, 173 hogs and 1209 sheep.

"A very high range of values has applied, due largely to the fact that there was not enough on an around among the various buyers. Two lots of calves sold at \$2.25 and hogs sold at 9 cents. One small lot of lambs sold at 61c and mixed stock at 5c. Quality considered, the few steers that were sold at \$4.25 to \$4.50, and the same thing applied to cows.

"Shippers throughout the country are overlooking the best opportunity that has been offered them in not supplying the heavy increased demand for good livestock on this market."
