\$550,000 WILL BE SPENT ON SCHOOLS

City's Growth Makes Additional Structures Necessary in 1911.

LARGER LIBRARY PLANNED

Tax Budget for 1911 Provides Expenditure of \$10,000 for New Books—Administration Building Is Urgently Needed.

Plans of the Board of Education for the year 1911 include the contemplated expenditure of \$550,000 in the construction of new school buildings and additions to the structures now in use. The building committee has formulated a tentative report recommending where improvements should be made. It will be presented to the Board for action at an early meeting.

This report recommends the addition of eight rooms to the Kerns School, six rooms and an assembly hall to the Mount Tabor School, 10 rooms and an assembly hall to the Lents School, two rooms and an assembly hall to the Woodstock School, two rooms and an assembly hall to the Richmond School, a west wing of eight rooms to the Glencoe School, a four-room addition to the Montavilla School and additions to the Couch and Failing buildings.

Four-Room Building Needed.

A four-room building is recommended to be constructed somewhere between the Arleta and Lents schools, additional rooms will be added to the Sellwood School building, an entirely new eight-room structure is planned for the Rose City Park district and a new four-room building for the Fernwood district. A new four-room school is also recommended for the Kenton section of the city. A temporary structure is also contemplated to take care of the rapid growth of East and West Moreland and thus relieve the Sellwood School.

In addition to all these improvements the new Lincoln High School building, the entire cost of which will be in the neighborhood of \$500,000, will be completed and made ready for occupancy. A special election will be held sometime during the Summer or Autumn to obtain the will of the taxpayers relative to issuing \$150,000 additional bonds, the funds derived from the sale of which would, together with the money received for the \$500,000 issue of bonds already sold, insure the completion of the Lincoln building in accordance with the fireproof ordinance of the city.

Grounds to Be Purchased.

For the purchase of grounds for new school buildings the 1911 budget has provided \$150,000, but no information relative to what sites will be purchased is as yet obtainable. The Board fearing that to give advance information would precipitate an increase in property values. The general scheme of improving school grounds will be continued in the coming year, the same amount, \$50,000, having been appropriated for such purpose as in 1910.

The work of building up the school library will be continued, an additional \$10,000 having been provided for that purpose in the 1911 tax budget. During the past year the Board of Education expended \$44,000 in the purchase of real estate for school building sites, \$12,537 in the improvement of school grounds, \$101,325.22 in the erection of new buildings and about \$250,000 in the erection of additions to school buildings.

The grounds of the Brooklyn, Glencoe, Irvington, Jefferson, Kerns, Lents, Peninsula, Richmond and Stephens schools were improved. The Hudson, Lents, Mount Tabor and Woodstock buildings were erected. Additions to the Sellwood, Alameda, Homestead, Brooklyn, Clinton Kelly, Creston, Llewellyn, Peninsula, Portsmouth, Vernon and Woodlawn buildings.

There is urgent need for an administration building and also for the construction of a new trades school on the site occupied by the Alameda School building, a part of which is now used for vocational school purposes, but the Board did not include estimates for these purposes in the 1911 budget. The estimates will probably be part of the 1912 budget and it is likely that the taxpayers will also be asked to vote sufficient money that year to replace the Couch, Shattuck and Failing buildings, which are antiquated and inadequate.

CITIZEN ENFORCES LAW

Salesman Accused of Spitting Is Arrested on Warrant.

Burning with indignation, A. J. Martin, an East Side resident, went to the police station yesterday morning and swore to a complaint against John B. Crite, a salesman, charging him with spitting on the floor of a streetcar. Crite was arrested, and will have a hearing next Tuesday. The offense was committed, Martin says, on a Sunnyside streetcar, and was so flagrant that the spitter himself moved to another seat to be out of the puddle he had created.

"Citizens are lax in their duty of calling the attention of the police to such things as this," said Mr. Martin. "I myself do not like the notoriety, but such practices ought not to go unpunished. I said I had to give my testimony against Crite."

WINDOW BROKEN IN "DARE"

Game of Follow-My-Leader Takes Roisterer to Jail.

Bubbling with hilarity after a late-night banquet, J. L. Johns, of Seattle, with a party of friends, was playing a little game of "follow my leader" at Seventh and Everett streets early yesterday morning, and it came the turn of Johns to take a dare. One of the crowd bantered him to kick in a plate glass window, and he was game. As the glass crashed, Patrolman Cameron came up behind and placed him under arrest. He was fined \$10 in Municipal Court yesterday morning, and must in addition pay for the window he broke.

Y. M. C. A. CLASSES GAIN

WINTER STUDIES WILL BEGIN WITH LARGE CLASSES.

Additions Are Made to Faculty and Changes in Curriculum at Local Association.

After the most successful term in its history, the educational department of the Portland Young Men's Christian Association will open for its winter work next Tuesday. There have been several additions to the faculty, as well as new courses added. R. C. French, educational director, expects that the registration will show a material increase. In the past term 875 men and boys have registered in the educational department.

The winter term is always the most active period at the association and it is probable that not less than 400 new names will be added to the rolls. The big gain is indicated by the preliminary registration. Tomorrow will be given up entirely to enrollment and classification and the Y. M. C. A. secretaries are expecting a busy day. It is thought that the total registration may go to 1500 by the end of the year, a mark far in excess of any in the history of the association. Among the additions to the faculty is L. L. Hartley, who resigned as vice-president of the Omaha Commercial College to accept a position in the commercial division here. The Y. M. C. A. officers think themselves fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Hartley, who desired to come to Portland because his parents reside here. Growth of the boys' educational work has necessitated the addition of another instructor, and Arthur Kruse has been selected to take up that work. A course in piano tuning and repairing will be an innovation in the Y. M. C. A. educational work.

HOQUIAM'S CUT GROWING

1910 LUMBER OUTPUT EXCEEDS 1909 BY 10,000,000 FEET.

Total Cut 273,600,000 Feet, Besides Lumber, Boxes, Etc.—Wages Total \$1,497,000.

HOQUIAM, Dec. 31.—(Special.)—The cut of the lumber mills of Hoquiam for the year 1910 in board feet is approximately 273,600,000 also 137,000 doors, box-shooks and piano-sounding boards, making the total value of the year's work \$2,667,300. The cut of the mills exceeds that of 1909 by more than 10,000,000 feet. There is also a noticeable increase in the manufacturing of fir and spruce doors, out-

put of which is more than twice that of 1909.

The output consists of 27,000,000 feet of lumber, 37,000,000 pieces lath and 248,000,000 shingles. Of this vast amount more than 140,000,000 feet was shipped by water to California and foreign ports. Panama.

The manufacturing plants paid out during the year more than \$1,875,000 in wages, which does not include the vast amount paid by logging companies.

The Hoquiam Lumber & Shingle Company made the banner cut of the year, turning out 70,000,000 feet of lumber, 25,000,000 lath and 50,000,000 shingles. The National Lumber & Box Company cut 50,000,000 feet of lumber, 10,000,000 lath; Northwestern Lumber Company, 35,000,000 feet of lumber, 5,000,000 lath, 25,000,000 shingles; Gray's Harbor Lumber Company 20,000,000 feet of lumber, 6,000,000 lath; B. K. Wood Lumber Company, 20,000,000 feet of lumber and 5,000,000 lath; Eureka Cedar Lumber & Shingle Company, in two months ran, 3,000,000 feet lumber, 3,500,000 shingles; East Hoquiam Shingle Company 30,000,000 shingles, and Coats Shingle Company, 30,000,000 shingles.

JUDGE WARNS SALOONS

TAZWELL SAYS HE WILL MAKE ROUNDS IN PERSON.

Practice of Selling Liquor to Men Already Drunk Must Stop Is Dictum From Bench.

Visitation of Municipal Judge Tazwell in person upon law-breaking saloons is promised for the near future. If the police do not secure better results in preventing the sale of liquor to intoxicated men, in passing sentence yesterday morning upon John Ellis, accused of that offense, Judge Tazwell said: "There are too many

cases of drunkenness coming into this court. If the saloonkeepers obeyed the law, the number would be reduced one-half. Officer Nelson is to be commended in making this arrest. If the Police Department does not work better in bringing these saloonmen into court, I shall visit the saloons myself and shall order the arrest of those found violating the ordinance. In violating this law, the saloon men are injuring their own business and are building up prohibition sentiment."

Ellis, who runs a saloon at Sixth and Couch streets, was fined \$50. The defense attacked the complaint on the ground that it did not set forth that Ellis was a licensed saloonkeeper and appealed to the Circuit Court. Action against the practice of selling liquor to intoxicated men was inaugurated by Judge Tazwell several weeks ago, and one liquor dealer was fined \$100. An immediate falling off was noticed in the number of men arrested for being drunk, but the lesson was not sufficiently effective, in the opinion of the judge.
