

NORTH PLAINS WELCOMES PORTLAND VISITORS

Completion of First Link of United Railways' Through Line to Coast Is Celebrated by Business Men of Two Cities.

UNITED RAILWAYS TO BUILD TO COAST.

The message from John F. Stevens, read at North Plains yesterday is as follows:

"CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 2, 1911.—E. P. Shannon, 623 Railway Building, Portland, Or.—Convey to people North Plains my hearty congratulations on establishment of a railway connection, and say in short time North Plains will be very important station on through line to coast. United Railways will co-operate with city every way for mutual benefit. Now all that is needed for five thousand for North Plains in modern transportation."

In celebration of the completion of the first link of its through line to the Oregon coast, the United Railways conducted an excursion party yesterday to North Plains, the road's present terminus, 24 miles west of the city.

About 75 Portland business men joined the party, leaving the city at 10:20 o'clock and returning to Portland at 4 o'clock after a delightful trip of four and one-half hours. The excursion was under the direction of O. W. Taylor, manager of the United Railways and the Ruth Trust Company.

On the trip out the party stopped at the west end of Cornelius tunnel and made an inspection of the work being done there by the company. As the train arrived at the North Plains depot the visitors were greeted by 150 residents of the district.

Cornelius Sees Happiest Day.

"I was born just one-half mile from this station 60 years ago, and I can truthfully say that this is one of the happiest occasions in my life," said B. P. Cornelius, in speaking on behalf of the residents of the district in his address of welcome.

"This beautiful stretch of the state has been without modern transportation until now. You may well imagine the hardships we have had to suffer in getting our products to market. It has remained for James J. Hill, the West's great builder and friend, to gladden our hearts and enrich our estates by giving us this road. Formerly it re-

quired two days to make a trip to Portland; now we are only one hour out from the state's metropolis."

Speaking for the City of Portland, City Attorney Grant referred to the remarkable progress made by Portland and the state in the past decade, due chiefly to the improvement and development of railroad transportation. Other addresses were made by E. P. Shannon, assistant to John F. Stevens, head of the Hill lines in Oregon and the S. P. & S. road; Charles H. Carey, A. H. Devore, E. Zimmerman, O. W. Taylor and C. C. Chapman, manager of the publicity committee of the Portland Commercial Club.

Oregon to Make Progress.

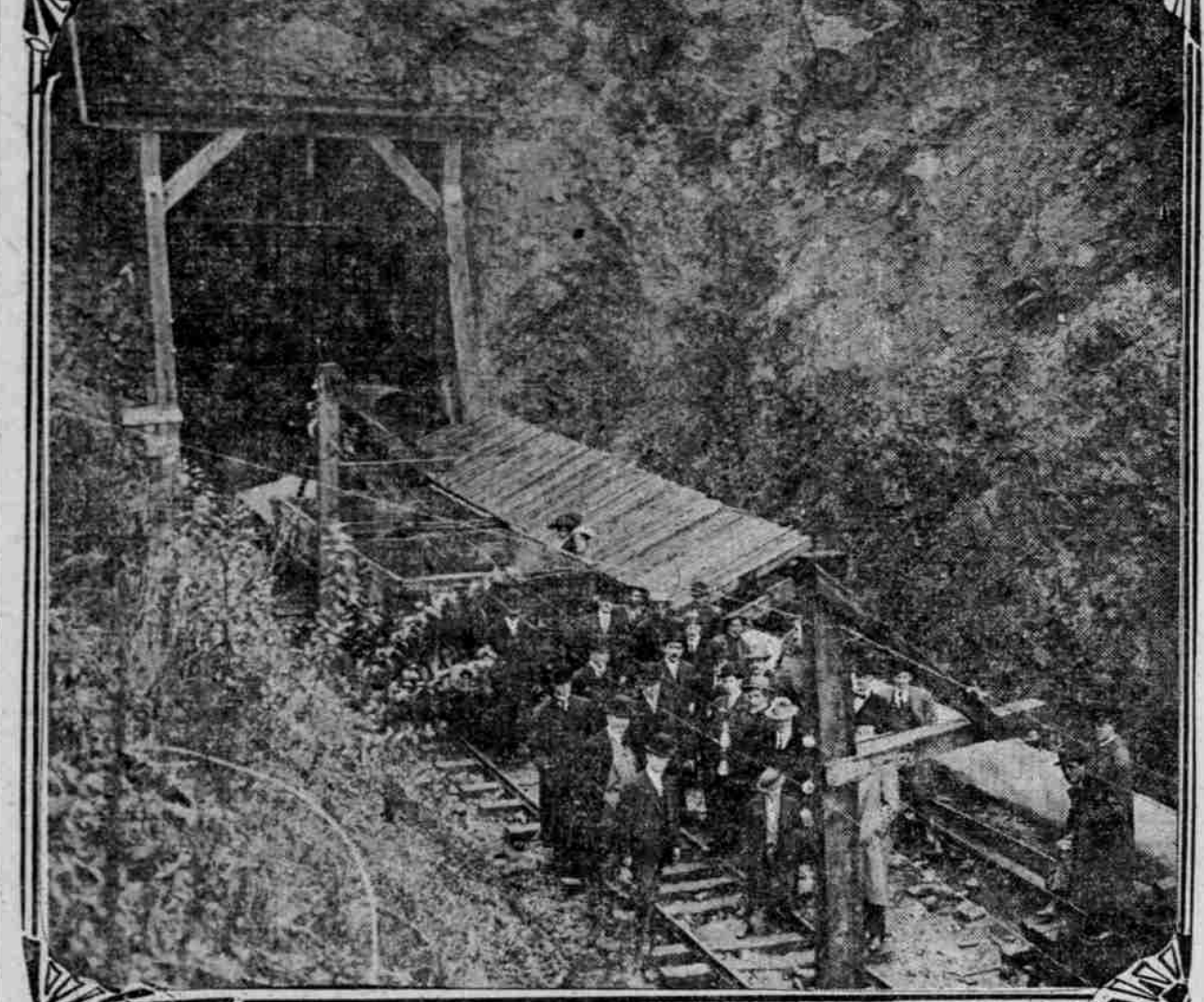
Judge Carey spoke of the important part the railroads are doing for the development of the Northwest, and especially for Oregon. He predicted that the state would make great progress within the next few years. Mr. Chapman told of the work being done by the commercial organizations of the state, and complimented the residents of North Plains for their spirit of enterprise.

In the absence of John F. Stevens Mr. Shannon congratulated the citizens upon their good fortune in receiving electric car service and rapid transportation. He read a telegram from Mr. Stevens, announcing plans of the road to build a through line to the coast.

It was announced that regular service would begin on the United Railways between Portland and North Plains on next Tuesday. Leaving Portland, two round trips will be made daily. One car will leave the city at 7:20 A. M. and one at 3:15 P. M. On the return trips the cars will arrive at Portland at 2:35 P. M. and 9:55 P. M.

3000 ACRES SOLD

Timber Will Be Marketed and Orchards Planted.

BUYERS WILL BUILD MILL

Property, Which Is Near Cottage Grove, Contains 100,000,000 Feet of Standing Fir-Lumber Market Improving.

Purchase was completed yesterday by the Saginaw Orchard & Timber Company of 2000 acres of timber lands near Cottage Grove, in Lane County, bearing approximately 100,000,000 feet of standing fir timber. The deal involved about \$100,000 and the land was purchased from various owners, about a dozen in all, most of them being the original entrymen who obtained patent from the Government.

The Saginaw Orchard & Timber Company is composed of C. C. Shay, of Portland, E. C. S. Brainerd and C. E. Brainerd, of Payette, Idaho, and Omar Hopkins, of Portland. The Idaho men are large holders of orchard lands near Payette and are interested in banking in the Gem State. The transaction was engineered by Mr. Shay.

Lumber Mill Contemplated.

The purchasing company has been incorporated and early next spring will erect and operate a mill of 100,000 feet daily capacity. The market for lumber produced in this territory after the local demand has been supplied is found in California and Nevada.

The incorporators of this company some time ago formed the Orchard Land & Timber Company with a capital of \$20,000 and bought 400 acres of timber land near Divide, Lane County. They have established a mill of 60,000 feet daily capacity and are building three miles of flume through in which lumber will be transported to the Southern Pacific Railway. This company has options on 25,000,000 more feet of timber, which is about the amount of timber it now holds.

The same men are stockholders of the Payette Timber & Milling Company, which has two mills in operation on Lewis River in Washington.

Orchards to Be Planted.

They are making all purchases with an eye to the character of the soil on which the timber stands, and as fast as the trees are logged off the land will be cleared and set to fruit. It is calculated that their land will thus be at least equally valuable after the timber is gone.

"We manufacture a large number of railroad ties," said Mr. Shay last

night, "and I have found that the general market for lumber has a close relation to the demand for ties."

"The railroads have not been buying ties for some months, and we have information that they will be in the market soon. This will affect the lumber situation very materially and I look for a distinct advance in demand and prices very soon."

Seaside to Widen Highway.

ASTORIA, Or., Jan. 7.—(Special).—A delegation, comprising Mayor Laighton and the members of the Seaside town council, appeared before the County court today and requested the Court to direct the opening of the main street in that town, which is also a county road, to its full width of 60 feet. The highway as originally laid out was 60

feet in width, but during recent years some of the owners of abutting property have encroached on the right-of-way until portions of the road or street from the Methodist church corner to the Wahanna bridge are not to exceed 40 feet wide and in some spots do not conform to the survey. Last Summer this matter was brought up and County Surveyor Parker ran the lines over, but nothing further was done. After the conference the Court decided to instruct the surveyor to set stakes designating the boundaries of the road and notify the interested property-owners to vacate the portions of the highway that have been occupied.

PARTY IS APPRECIATIVE

After spending the day in sightseeing and visiting friends in Portland, the 143 members of the Inland Empire excursion party left for California, delighted with their first day's stop.

The party is made up largely of Spokane, Walla Walla and Palouse farmers and business men. Many of the party have been members of every excursion since the special California trips were inaugurated by the Harriman system three years ago.

Greeted by a delegation of Portland business men and members of the Commercial Club at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, the visitors were taken about the city in a special train of observation cars and later were entertained at luncheon at the Hotel Portland. The hotel was made headquarters for the travelers and many remained there during the afternoon, while others called upon friends and visited places of interest.

Banquet Given at Night.

A banquet was given at the hotel at 6:30 last night, at which nearly all of the visitors and many business men were present. Representing the Portland Commercial Club at the banquet were Colonel James Jackson, R. H. Trumbull and Frank B. Riley. William McMurray, general passenger agent of the O-W-R & N. SUMMONS TO BE REQUIRED

Arrests for Misdemeanors in Chicago Can't Be by Warrant.

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—The Municipal Court judges of Chicago have demanded a change in the form of arrest for misdemeanors, and a special meeting yesterday they signed an order that in the future all arrests for minor violations of a city ordinance shall be made by summons instead of by warrant.

When this police reform is inaugurated, as it will be as soon as the necessary blanks and books are printed, the humbug of arrest by warrant for some trivial offense will be removed. It means that a majority of persons who will be arrested in the city this year will escape the embarrassment of a patrol ride.
