

STRIKE ENDED, BUT 5000 REMAIN OUT

Anger at Fever Heat When
Garment Union Officials
Admit Their Defeat.

RUSH FOR WORK IS BEGUN

Body of Workers Seeks Return at
Employers' Terms—Determined
Element to Continue War
Against Sweatshops.

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—(Special)—Chicago's five months' strike of the garment workers ended today in a mad rush of strikers to obtain employment at Employers' Association factories on the best terms they could, and in a defeat which union leaders said all along would in the long run prove a victory.

The atmosphere at union headquarters was charged with suspicion and rumors that all had not been above board in the sudden termination of the strike, while the question was unanswered why the Chicago Federation of Labor and the Women's Trade Union League were left "to hold the bag" and settle \$10,000 of debts as best they might when the strike was ended without their knowledge. It was decided to keep under cover whatever suspicions there might be and gather up the threads and to continue by other means but without intermission the fight against sweatshop conditions in Chicago.

Refusing to heed the orders that the strike was at an end, several thousand men and women denounced the union officials and asserted they would fight to the bitter end against the association houses.

Mass meetings were held in Walsh's Hall and other places on the North and Northwest Sides, and indignation at the action of union leaders in ordering them back to work, literally beaten in their every demand, was expressed.

The men and women who at one time swore on a crucifix at a meeting in Walsh's Hall that they would never return to work unless a closed shop was granted are said to have refused to return to work. They are about 5000 in number.

More rioting was feared as the result of the action of the union officials in declaring the strike off, and extra details of police were placed about various shops.

LAND FRAUD SUITS DECIDED

Government Loses Many, Including
Cases Dropped in Oregon.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Criminal procedure by the field service of the General Land Office for January resulted in the indictment of three persons for timber trespass, three for conspiracy, four for perjury, and 29 for unlawful enclosure, according to a report just published.

Convictions were reported in nine cases for trespass, seven for conspiracy, one in Missouri for conspiracy under the criminal code of that state. Three convictions for unlawful enclosures also were obtained.

The Government lost, through acquittals and dismissals in the period of 18 cases, of which 44 were the Heney cases, in Oregon, and 14 old cases where the records showed the parties were not sworn before the United States Commissioner when they testified.

Seventeen suits for timber depredations on the public domain were instituted; 14 were won, and one was dismissed.

Twenty-one suits to set aside fraudulently acquired patents were begun; 12 were won by court decrees and compromise, and nine were dismissed.

Five suits for unlawful enclosure of the public domain were filed; seven decrees have been reported, stating 7400 acres to the public domain; two were dismissed.

NEW YORK SALOON SHOT UP

Six Hawks Smash Mirrors and
Glasses With Bullets.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—Six men, all armed with heavy revolvers, entered a saloon at the three entrances to the saloon of Henry Fahn, on upper Second avenue, early today. At a signal from the leader, all six began blazing away at the mirrors and glassware. About 40 shots were fired with such excellent effect that broken glass was strewn all over the place by the time two policemen ran up, attracted by the fusillade. The bluecoats found the saloon empty except for the two bartenders, who were crouching uninjured close to the floor behind the bar. In the rear of the scene of the hostilities.

The six men fled as quickly and silently as they came. The police believe they intended to rob the place of \$4000 in the till, but were frightened away by the racket their revolvers made without accomplishing their purpose. When the fusillade began there were a dozen customers sitting in the back room playing cards and sipping their beer. They fled.

According to police belief, the men were delegates from a notorious East Side gang, the "Hawks," which has been terrorizing the neighborhood for some time past.

The "shooting up" of saloons is one of their favorite pastimes. One of the leaders of the gang known as "Big Hawk" was recently convicted of holding up a banker and is now doing a five-year sentence in Sing Sing.

INDIAN LANDS IN COURT

Validity of 4000 Conveyances Are
Taken to Highest Tribunal.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—On the outcome of suits docketed today in the Supreme Court of the United States will depend the validity of some 4000 conveyances of land by members of the Five Civilized Tribes of Oklahoma.

The Federal Government is seeking to have the conveyances set aside because of alleged violation of the restrictions on the sale of the lands which had been allotted to the Indians.

OFFICER SUES FOR TITLE
Captain Moser Says Law Gives Him
Rank of Rear-Admiral.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Proceedings in a mandamus against George von L.

Meyer, Secretary of the Navy, were instituted in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia, today, by Jefferson F. Moser, of California, a retired navy officer. Mr. Moser seeks to compel the Secretary to place his name on the official register of the navy as a Rear-Admiral on the retired list.

Instead of with the rank of Captain, retired, as he is now designated. The officer complains to the court that despite a decision of the United States Court of Claims that he is and has been since September 19, 1904, entitled to the rank and emoluments of a Rear-Admiral on the retired list. Mr. Moser refused to recognize him as of the higher grade and continues to publish him as a retired Captain.

Mr. Moser entered the naval service September 29, 1864, and on September 29, 1894, was placed on the retired list of the navy after 40 years' service with a creditable record. Under the navy personnel act, it is claimed the officer should be advanced to the grade of Rear-Admiral on his retirement.

PLEA MADE FOR SEALS

WANTON KILLING DOES NOT
ABATE IS ASSERTION.

Zoological Expert Attacks Govern-
ment's Policy in Caring for
Fur-Bearing Animals.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—An attack on the Government's policy in caring for fur seals on the Pribiloff Islands in Alaska was made today by Dr. William T. Hornaday, of the New York Zoological Gardens, and President H. A. Elliott. They spoke for the Campfire Club of America before the Senate committee on conservation of natural resources.

The speakers declared that under the act of last year, which cancelled the seal theretofore held by the North American Commercial Company, and gave control of the killing of fur seals to the Secretary of Commerce and Labor, there had been no cessation of wanton killing.

Dr. Hornaday condemned the policy of weeding out the males when they are babies, leaving only those needed for breeding purposes. He declared that the system left weaklings.

The hearing was in connection with the Nelson bill to prohibit absolutely the killing of fur seals for five years from and after May 1, 1911, except by natives for food and clothing and manufacture of boats for their own use.

The Department of Commerce and Labor, through Mr. Lemby, opposed the bill.

PAROLED CONVICTS DINE

Head of California Parole Board
Entertains Choice Party.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4.—A murderer, four highwaymen, a burglar, three forgers and two ordinary citizens, sat down last night at a banquet in a prominent hotel as the guests of Leonard Moradant, himself an ex-convict, but now at the head of the prison parole fund of the Union Rescue Mission.

It was largely through the efforts of Moradant that 12 of the guests were released from San Quentin on parole and the particular purpose of the banquet was to have them meet Frank Mufford, State parole officer. Interesting reminiscences were a feature of the gathering.

The banquet was such a success that it was decided to hold another in the near future, when all other paroled men in Los Angeles will be invited to attend. Things are about as here. Moradant believes such gatherings will serve as a moral support to former criminals who are being reclaimed.

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Smoot Aims to Save \$1,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—A saving of at least \$1,250,000 a year is the introduction of a valuation plan providing for an elastic distribution of Government documents by members of Congress to their constituents, is contemplated in the bill introduced in the Senate by Mr. Smoot, of Utah, yesterday, on behalf of the joint printing investigating committee, of which he is chairman. The bill proposes that each Senator be allowed an annual credit of \$500 and each Representative a credit of \$400 with the Government Printing Office. This plan would supersede the present quota system of distributing documents, and would allow members of Congress to use up their credit on any special field of documents in which they may be particularly interested. It is believed the valuation plan will prevent the accumulation and ultimate confiscation of Government publications.
