DR. SHAW TALKS TO MEN

CHICAGO EVANGELIST SPEAKS AT HEILIG AT 3 O'CLOCK.

With Reputation as Brilliant Orator, Large Crowd Undoubtedly Will Be Attracted to Theater.

Dr. John Balcom Shaw, the Chicago evangelist who is conducting meetings in Portland, will address a mass meeting in the Heilig Theater this afternoon at 3 o'clock. This meeting will be conducted by the Young Men's Christian Association and H. W. Stone, general secretary of the association, will preside. The doors of the theater will be opened at 2:30 o'clock and only men will be admitted.

It is expected that the theater will be packed, as Dr. Shaw has a reputation as a brilliant speaker. This gathering will take the place of the usual Sunday afternoon meeting in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium. Music will be furnished by the Y. M. C. A. chorus and there will be vocal solos by Mrs. George C. Watkins.

The first of the noon meetings addressed by Dr. Shaw will be held in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium tomorrow. Dr. Shaw will speak 15 minutes. The noon meetings are to be held each day of this week except Saturday and each day a prominent layman will preside. Dr. Shaw will continue speaking each afternoon and night at the First Presbyterian Church. He announces that he intends particularly to address the unconverted people of Portland this week.

CHANGE OF VENUE ASKED

Contractor Charges Tazwell Has Prejudice Against Him.

Charging that Municipal Judge Tazwell is prejudiced against him, Fred S. Wagner, a tile-work contractor, applied for a change of venue to the Justice Court, yesterday morning, and the application was first granted and then reopened for further consideration. Bad feeling of long standing, complicated by Judge Tazwell's recent controversy with Mayor Simon, is involved in the case.

When the proceedings to oust Tazwell were being discussed, Wagner wrote a letter to a newspaper in which he denounced Tazwell's attitude as dishonorable. Judge Tazwell said that the letter was occasioned by the fact that

Wagner had done some work for him which was unsatisfactory and had to be done a second time. Wagner was arrested about two weeks ago, after he had engaged in a fight with W. R. McDowell, a chauffeur, at Fourth and Stark streets. When the case went to trial, McDowell was exonerated and Wagner forfeited his bail. Then McDowell swore to a complaint charging Wagner with assault and battery. The defendant's affidavit was presented in court yesterday and Judge Tazwell said that he had no desire to try the case if Wagner did not trust his fairness. Later, a private prosecutor for McDowell appeared and objected to the change of venue, demanding that Wagner make a showing of the facts upon which he bases his charge.

Pneumonia Takes Bristol Lad. WHITE SALMON, Wash., Feb. 11.—(Special.)—Philip Maroney, aged 17 years, died of pneumonia today. The lad was working his way through school. He was a son of Mrs. Bert Rath, of Bristol.

ORCHESTRA IS UNIQUE

ONE-HANDED MAN GIVES CONCERT WITH STRINGS.

Violin, Guitar and Mandolin Players Attain Remarkable Proficiency by Practice.

What is probably the only stringed orchestra in the country composed of men with only one hand each, made its appearance in an initial performance at Leitz Thursday night. Every number was greeted with applause and many encores were given. A feature of the programme was the "Spanish Pandango," played as a guitar duet by William

Tienker and Bert Amend, both one-armed men. The orchestra is known as the Amend-Frank One-armed String Orchestra, and is composed of seven one-handed men, in addition to the manager, A. R. Spreadborough. The organization was formed in Portland last September and by constant practice the members have gained remarkable proficiency.

The novel feature of the orchestra is the playing of the guitar, violin and mandolin by men with only one hand each. This is considered by the manager to be one of the most difficult feats ever attempted on musical instruments. Members of the orchestra have been practicing twice a week, and it is expected they will appear frequently in public in the future.

STEVENSON FOLK BUSY

FORESTS "CONSERVED" BY BEING MADE INTO LUMBER.

Six Sawmills and Hundreds of Axmen Engaged in Turning Out Piling and Ties.

STEVENSON, Wash., Feb. 11.—(Special.)—People here are "conserving" the forests by making lumber, piling and ties for the Cello bridge and the Deschutes railroads and cordwood for the cities of the Inland Empire. Six sawmills and hundreds of axmen are busily engaged in clearing off the land. Considering that these lands are adapted to all kinds of fruits; that no

irrigation is necessary and that prices are much less than similar lands in neighboring districts, there are inducements here that are attracting attention.

Among the more recent improvements in the town are the grading and graveling of the principal streets; the installation of street lights; the construction of a brick high school building, costing, with the furniture, apparatus and grounds, about \$25,000; the closing of a contract for the erection of a flouring mill this season; the purchase of a complete outfit of street-making machinery, and the construction near the depot of an exhibit booth for the display of a collection of the fruits and farm products of this locality.

This latter was the direct work of the Board of Trade, which is active in promoting the welfare of the town and county. At a recent meeting of this organization steps were taken to secure the co-operation of the women of Stevenson. They were made honorary members and are organizing an auxiliary society with a view of giving entertainments in the way of social, amateur theatricals and excursions on the river to stimulate the public work.

The midwinter edition of the booklet issued by the Board is now being distributed throughout the East, and matter is already being compiled for the Spring edition.

The determining consideration which led to the location of a flouring mill at this point was cheap power to operate the machinery. The grain will be brought from the Inland Empire either

by rail or on steamer or both, on a milling-in-transit rate, and manufactured into flour and feed stuff and then shipped to Portland for consumption or export.

CREDITORS BRING ACTION

Bankruptcy Proceedings Started Against Vancouver Firm.

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 11.—(Special.)—Involuntary bankruptcy proceedings have been begun in the United States Court here by creditors against A. R. Rector and Charles Daly, of Vancouver, Wash. The debts are alleged to be \$887.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Feb. 11.—(Special.)—Rector & Daly are the largest contractors in Vancouver. They are in debt to the Commercial Bank of Vancouver for at least \$20,000, having given chattel mortgages and other securities. They built Reserve street for the Government, the contract price being \$18,000. They have done grading and improvement work for Vancouver running into the hundreds of thousands. It is the impression of many here that their creditors will have a hard time to prove them insolvent on February 24, when the petition is to be heard.
