Josselyn Is Pleased.

Mr. Josselyn expressed his gratification over the settlement of the long-drawn-out fender controversy. "I am free to confess," he said, "that a recent examination of the Nelson fender has given me a better impression of it than I had, and it will do the work that its inventor claims for it, we will certainly want it on all our cars at the earliest possible date."

Our objection has been not so much to the Nelson fender as to the projecting type of fender. We have felt that on account of the narrow streets and sharp curves, as well as the crowded sidewalks...

"I found," said Mr. Manchester, "that he was perfectly willing to comply with the terms of the ordinance, and that the differences between the street railway company and the fender company were really unimportant."

It will be impossible to comply with that provision of the fender ordinance which requires cars to be equipped with fenders by July 1. It is therefore likely that a new ordinance will be presented to the City Council...

For more than three years tests of fenders and wheel guards have been conducted on the testing grounds at Twenty-sixth and Upshur streets under the direction of the Mayor and City Council.

Finally, last October, the subject was settled by the passage of an ordinance adopting the Nelson air-controlled au-tomatic fender for use on all air cars.
