

STUBBS TO LEAVE RAILROAD FIELD

Veteran Traffic Man Will Retire to Home He Is Building in Ashland, O.

LIFELONG SERVICE GIVEN

Present Year Will Be Last in Active Life of Dean of Transportation Men — Youthful Fancy to Be Realized.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—(Special.)—The last year of active railroad service of John C. Stubbs, vice-president and general traffic director of the Harriman system of railroads, according to a well-authenticated report that has reached as yet only a few of Stubbs' associates among the higher officials of the Southern Pacific, the Union Pacific and the other railroads included in the Harriman system.

Stubbs has let a few of his intimate friends know that he means to retire from work, and returning to the place of his birth and boyhood, Ashland, O., next quietly on the laurels which he has won in 41 years of railroad service.

During the last several months Stubbs has made frequent visits to Ashland from his Chicago home, and occasionally has been accompanied by a friend, to whom he has confided his plans. These include the construction of a country home, of which he is the architect and designer, that is to be just such a home as his fancy long has dreamed of.

The date of his retirement has not been made known, but the new home at Ashland will be completed, it is expected, before the end of this year, and he knows that the railroad man is impatient to occupy the house which he has designed with as great care and enthusiasm as he ever put into a railroad project.

Stubbs began railroad service in 1868 and in 1871 went to the Central Pacific as freight clerk at Sacramento. In 1885 he became general traffic manager for the Southern Pacific, his headquarters being in this city. What H. H. Harriman was in railroad finance, Stubbs has been in railroad traffic. He is the authority and absolute leader in his department of railroading. Nothing has been made known as to his possible successor.

RUDKIN OPPOSES HANFORD

Judge in Spokane Decides for Government in Fraud Case.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 15.—United States District Judge Rudkin today overruled the demurrer of the defendants in the Doughton case, land fraud case, directly taking issue with United States Judge Hanford of Seattle, who decided the same points in favor of the defendants in the Dr. Edward Stracey case in Seattle.

The defendants in the Doughton case are Harry White, of Los Angeles, former Mayor of Seattle; Charles A. McKenzie, a Seattle capitalist; Donald A. McKenzie, of Washington; Raymond Brown and William J. Dunn, of Spokane, and Charles E. Doughton, of Peaslee, Wash. They were indicted by the Federal grand jury at Spokane last October, for alleged conspiracy to defraud the United States of coal lands in the Koyuk mining district of Alaska.

TAFT PLANS HIS VACATION

If Session Prolonged, He Will Spend Week-Ends at Beverly.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—If Congress remains in session through the hot weather, President Taft probably will become a pronounced week-end camper, journeying from Washington to Boston and Beverly whenever he gets an opportunity. The President hopes to get some sort of a vacation in his new cottage near Beverly if he has to take it a few days at a time.

Mrs. Taft will go to Beverly late in June, according to present plans. After Mrs. Taft and the Taft children open the cottage, the President is expected to begin his week-end trips. From here to Beverly is only a little more than 12 hours' ride and the President, by leaving Friday nights, can have two full days' vacation and still be back at his desk in the White House on Mondays.

MAUDE FAY TO WED PRINCE

American Singer Refuses to Become Morganatic Wife of Royalty.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—Miss Maude Fay, the celebrated soprano who leads at the opera-house in Munich, is to be married shortly to Prince Heinrich Luitpold, grandson of the sovereign of Bavaria. Prince Regent Luitpold. A cablegram telling of the engagement was received by the girl's family in this city yesterday.

It is reported that the royal family tried to induce Miss Fay to accept the position of a morganatic wife with the title of Baroness, but that she refused to consider the marriage unless it should be recognized by the royal court. Miss Fay was recently honored by the Prince Regent with the title of royal Bavarian chamber singer.

ACTRESS MARRIES PRINCE

Ola S. Humphrey, Who Played in Portland, Weds Khedive's Cousin.

LONDON, April 15.—Ola S. Humphrey, an American actress, and Prince Ibrahim Hassan, a cousin of the Khedive of Egypt, were married at the registry office in London today. The bridegroom is described as a bachelor, aged 32, and a Prince of the Ottoman empire.

Ola Humphrey was the leading woman of the Mordant-Humphrey company, which played for several weeks at the Cordray Theater, now the Grand, during the season of 1902. Later Miss Humphrey went to Australia and became successful.

LA FOLLETTE IS PRAISED

Roosevelt Speaks on Progress to Wisconsin Legislature.

MADISON, Wis., April 15.—An endorsement of the "forward movement" in Wisconsin, in which he mentioned the name of United States Senator

Robert M. La Follette, was the feature of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt's address before the joint Assembly of Wisconsin Legislatures today. What has been accomplished in Wisconsin, the Colonel said, had been of such quality as to effect a long stride forward in political, social and economic development as a Nation. He said:

"What has been accomplished in Wisconsin under the lead of Senator La Follette and under the direct inspiration of the men whom I am now addressing," said Mr. Roosevelt, "has been of such quality as to mark a genuine and long stride forward in our political, social and economic development as a Nation, and I come here not merely to congratulate you, but also because I desire in so far as possible, to call the attention of other communities, including my own, to what you have done in the State of Wisconsin. The progressive movement has been seen in Wisconsin."

A short address was made by Mr. Roosevelt to a large crowd in the university gymnasium on "Progressiveism" following his talk at the Capitol. Luncheon at the City Club, which was attended by state and university officials, concluded the programme.

Mr. Roosevelt said he found everywhere on the Pacific slope and in the Rocky Mountains that the ambition of each state was to follow Wisconsin as the wisest and most far-seeing progressive state and to secure the same cooperation in their states between the Government and their universities in rendering service to the state, which obtains in Wisconsin.

He then made a plea favoring the election of United States Senators by direct vote.

Colonel Roosevelt left for Chicago this afternoon to start on the last leg of his long Western tour.

SEA CAPTAIN APPEALS

SAUNDERS WOULD AVOID PAYING \$15,000 FINE.

Punishment for Seizure of \$65,820 Worth of Opium Under Law Enacted in 1799, Is Contested.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—(Special.)—Masters of Oriental liners and steamers plying between foreign ports and San Francisco are watching with keen interest the outcome of the appeal to the United States District Court by Captain John W. Saunders of the Pacific Mail liner Korea, who was fined \$15,000 by Collector of Customs Stratton for the seizure of 199 tins of opium taken from that vessel last January.

The seizure was the largest in the history of opium smuggling. The tins, then valued at \$1.50 a tin, but the price has gone up to \$80 the five-tin tin. At the present price of the contraband drug, the seizure would amount to \$15,870. At the time of the seizure, the opium on the Korea was valued at \$43,920.

The law under which the fine was imposed by the Collector of the Port was enacted March 2, 1799—shortly after the "Boston Tea Party." It was copied from the old English law and has never been amended, and is now known as article 1242 of the customs regulations. It follows:

"If any merchandise is brought into the United States in any vessel, whether from any foreign port without having a manifest on board, or which shall not be included or described in the manifest, the master of the vessel, with the master shall be liable to a penalty equal to the value of such merchandise, not included in such manifest, and all such merchandise not included in such manifest belonging or consigned to the master, mate, officer or crew of such vessel, shall be forfeited."

It is one of the few customs regulations which has not been amended or modified to meet the march of time and modern ocean transportation conditions.

Lumber Suits Argued.

ASTORIA, Or., April 15.—(Special.)—Arguments in the several suits against the Seaside Lumber & Manufacturing Company, which failed, were heard by Judge Eakin, of the Circuit Court today. These suits are to foreclose a mortgage given to secure the \$175,000 in bonds issued by the defendant and to recover on labor liens filed by former employees in the company's mill and logging camp. The testimony in the cases was taken several days ago.
