Commission Barred in Montana. BUTTE, Mont., May 6.—After several cities of the state have expressed themselves in its favor, discovery has been made that the constitution of Montana forbids the commission form of government. City Attorney Maury today quoted, in a signed article, section 36, article 5, of the constitution, which reads: "The Legislative Assembly shall not delegate to any special commission, private corporation or association, any power to make, supervise or interfere with any municipal improvement, money, property or effects, whether held in trust or otherwise, or to levy taxes or
