

# CANANEA TAKEN WITHOUT BATTLE

## Federal Garrison Surrenders Town and Marches Out Peacefully.

### CHEERS WELCOME REBELS

#### City Feasts Cabral's Army When It Takes Possession — Chlapas' Army Takes Arms and Will March to Nogales.

CANANEA, Sonora, Mexico, May 13.—All Cananea is tonight noisily celebrating the occupation by the insurgent army, and cries of "Viva Cabral" and "Viva Madero" fill the air. Cabral's men, having eaten their fill at spreads set in every restaurant in the city at 4 o'clock this afternoon, fraternized with the populace tonight, and every indication is that business will proceed without interruption or loss of possession of the town was gained by the insurgent force without loss of life to either side.

The federal garrison of 300 men under command of Colonel Chlapas, having surrendered with all the honors of war, filed out as the triumphant insurgents marched into the town at 2:30 this afternoon. Mayor Arnold and all other local as well as federal officials accompanied the federal troops, who, as the agreement allowed, took with them their arms and ammunition. Immediately on leaving the town, the federalists embarked on a train, and a 4 o'clock left for Nogales.

#### Cabral's Entrance Is Triumphant.

Cabral's entrance into Cananea was triumphant. The entire population trooped out to meet him, most of them on foot, while every available vehicle was pressed into commission and driven out to escort the rebel chieftain to his old home. Among the carriages, gaily decorated with flags and bunting, was one in which rode Juan Cabral, Sr., the insurgent leader's father, and other members of his family.

When the column reached the hall park, on the edge of the town, where the greater part of the population had gathered, Cabral was almost dragged from his horse by enthusiastic admirers and covered with wreaths of flowers, as were the officers of his command. The procession entered the town and marched to a vacant lot. Tents were stretched and Cabral established his headquarters there.

#### General Prevents Disorder.

Patrols were immediately established by the rebel commandants posted in front of all the stores, and at 6 o'clock the troops dispersed the crowds to prevent their enthusiasm from leading to a riot. Cabral gave orders that all shouting and gun firing be stopped and that all persons should be within their homes in an hour. The town immediately quieted down.

A civilian chief of police and a force will be put into service tomorrow, Cabral announced.

Cabral is only 35 years old and lived in Cananea until the federal government took cognizance of his pronounced revolutionary sympathies at the beginning of the outbreak, and he was forced to leave.

Among the federal officials of Cananea were three men, sympathizers of Cabral, who remained behind when the federal troops evacuated today. They are Dr. Borrero, city physician; Leopoldo Adilla, mineral agent, and Jose Ortiz, jailer.

#### CABRAL WILL SEIZE NOGALES

Surrender of Border Town Demanded—People Flee Across Line.

NOGALES, Ariz., May 13.—Juan Cabral, who today captured Cananea from Colonel Chlapas, the federal commander, has made a demand for the surrender of Nogales, Sonora, and his demand was refused. Cabral at once sent word he would attack Nogales early in the morning.

#### PEACE PACT IS PREPARED

First Draft of British-American Treaty Simple in Outline.

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The first draft of the proposed arbitration treaty between America and Great Britain practically is complete. The principal difficulty encountered was in the consideration of matters excepted from the scheme for general arbitration, but it was found that the desired object could be attained satisfactorily by the exchange of notes between the two governments explanatory of the plan and scope of the treaty, leaving the convention itself very simple in outline.

## MUTINY IS QUELLED

### Resignation of Cabinet Demanded by General.

### NAVARRO'S LIFE IN DANGER

#### Rebel Mob at Juarez Shouts for His Life and Madero Takes Him to Safety—Madero and Orozco Join Hands as Friends.

was captured, and, after a brief explanation, conveyed Navarro to the river front, where the latter waded the river and soon was safe on American territory.

#### Danger to Navarro Avoided.

"As I feared that some ill-advised soldiers might commit an outrage against General Navarro, I took him from the beginning to my house, but I could not be at his side constantly and with what passed I began to fear that he would be injured in my absence. In order to avoid it, I took him personally to the bank of the river, so that he might pass over to American territory, where he would be safe as my prisoner of war under his word of honor."

"In honor of Orozco I should say that he simply proposed to me that we should act in this manner from the beginning and even Villa himself, when I told him my intention to grant Navarro his life, told me with all submission that what I did was well done. Consequently, it is not true that any of the officers have demanded his life of me, as not even the soldiers have attempted to do it, although I have heard that and there some one expressed that opinion, but it is not the general desire of my soldiers, who are brave in battle and magnanimous in victory."

#### Madero Explains Fracas.

Madero tonight gave out the following explanation of the day's events: "Orozco, excited by the victory, probably from the adulation and bad advice of persons interested in causing dissension among us, committed a fault which fortunately had no consequences. He complained that the troops did not have sufficient provisions and wanted to lay the fault upon the persons designated by me to provision the army, but the truth is that in the storehouses we have more than enough provisions, so the fault is with the provider of his corps, who has not attended to his duty."

"He told me also that he did not like the persons whom I had designated as cabinet officers, but I answered that it was not by his should tell me whom I should appoint."

"There being present a considerable number of soldiers at the place where we met, it appeared to me opportune to address them and explain to them what was transpiring. They all showed that they were well disposed and accord, and in order to terminate the small and disagreeable incident before them, Orozco and I clasped hands and swore everything that I took into account that, although it was true that he had just committed a fault, on the other hand, he had given good service to the country."

"This incident, in itself disagreeable, has furnished me with more data to assure me that I can count on my soldiers in any case whatever and that the officers, although they may go astray for a moment, never attempt to disobey my orders."

### PEACE TALK STILL CONTINUES

#### Limantour's Statement Gives Hope of Success at Last.

JUAREZ, May 13.—Prospects for restoring peace in Mexico became brighter today, when the explanation given by Mr. Limantour in an Associated Press dispatch from Mexico City last night about continuing in power, was read by officials of the provisional government. Most of the leaders were surprised to find that Limantour's real intention was to stay in power, but a message by minister Limantour after the Diaz manifesto was issued, asking the rebels to

state in what terms they wished the Diaz announcement to be made. Rebel leaders declared that, had such a message reached their ears, peace negotiations probably would long ago have been resumed.

In El Paso, Francisco Madero, Sr., and Rafael Hernandez, one of the go-betweens, were conferring with Judge Carbajal, the federal envoy.

### CANADA GETS GIFT

#### Lumberman Says Reciprocity Donates Coast Market.

### EASTERN MARKET IN PERIL

#### Manager of Lumber Association Predicts Transfer of Oregon and Washington Trade When Panama Canal Opened.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, May 13.—Leon Bronson, of Chicago, manager of the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association, in testimony before the Senate finance committee today declared that if the Canadian reciprocity agreement is ratified and goes into effect, British Columbia lumbermen will wrest control of the California markets from Washington and Oregon lumber interests, and, upon completion of the Panama Canal, will cut deeply into the Eastern market, which these two states now dominate.

#### FEZ ATTACKED BY BIG ARMY

French Consul Reports Battle in Which Rebels Are Repulsed.

PARIS, May 13.—Jean Cruppi, Minister of Foreign Affairs, laid before the Cabinet Council today dispatches from Herz Galliard, the French Consul at Fez, under date of May 6, which said 10,000 rebels had attacked the city on May 4 but were repulsed.

#### Peabody Fund to Be Divided.

NEW YORK, May 13.—After 44 years the trustees of the Peabody Educational Fund Association are about to distribute \$2,300,000 balance and close the trusteeship. The fund originated two years after the close of the Civil war, when George A. Peabody, a Massachusetts philanthropist, gave \$250,000 to advance education in the South. The fund has since that time been devoted to the education of the South. Of this fund \$1,600,000 was in bonds of the states of Mississippi and Florida, afterward requisited. One million dollars of the money in hand will go to the Peabody Normal School at Nashville, Tenn., and the rest will be apportioned among institutions in the South devoting themselves to training teachers, white and colored.

#### Wickersham Will Speak at Yale.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., May 13.—Attorney-General Wickersham will be the commencement day orator at the graduation exercises of the Yale Law school, June 19. He will probably speak on a topic involving recent National Supreme Court cases. It is understood he will receive an honorary degree from the university.

#### Grief Causes Athlete's Suicide.

PRINCETON, N. J., May 13.—Hamilton Brown, the Princeton Junior who committed suicide in his dormitory room here yesterday, was a well-known athlete, and held the intercollegiate record in the half-mile swim. According to his classmates, Brown had been much depressed since the death of his father several months ago. His mental depression had been followed by attacks of illness and is believed to explain his act.
