

BIRDMEN TO FLY OVER LONG COURSE

Prize of \$100,000 Attracts Men From All Nations to Enter.

DISTANCE IS 1300 MILES

Vedrine, Winner of Paris-to-Madrid Race, Is Foremost Entry in Flight From French Capital to Goal at Turin.

PARIS, May 27.—Twenty-one entries have been made for the aviation contest over the 1300-mile course from Paris to Turin, which begins from this city tomorrow. The flight will start from the same field from which the Paris to Madrid race was inaugurated and the contestants are allowed time in which to make their departure.

Already prizes to the amount of \$100,000 have been offered to the winner and keen enthusiasm marks the beginning for the event. Pierre Vedrine, winner of the last contest, was foremost among those to enter. Aviation officials were busy today examining and stamping the machines of the competitors.

The course is outlined to cover three stages and the contestants are allowed any time from May 28 to June 15 in which to complete the course. It is not a race in any respect, the contestants being permitted to alight at any time and rest, by notifying the committee of the time they alight and depart. The only condition placed upon the fliers is that they report at fixed times.

Three Stages Laid Out.

The three stages of the contest are given as follows:

Paris to Nice, a distance of 865 kilometers (537 miles), the recording stations are the cities of Dijon, Lyons and Avignon.

The registering stations in the second stage, Nice to Rome, distance 400 kilometers (248 miles), are Genoa and Pisa.

On the last leg, Rome to Turin, 630 kilometers (391 miles), the official stopping places are Florence and Bologna.

Among the entries are: Jean Bieveland, of Peru; Maurice Tabataou, who won the Michelin cup for 1910; Henry Weymann, the American, and Roland Garros, who, after making many plucky efforts, failed in the Paris-to-Madrid flight, was forced by a series of mishaps to abandon the race.

In addition to the actual participants in tomorrow's flight, Lieutenant Penquin and eight other officers of the French army are under orders from the Minister of War to fly over the first stage of the course from Paris to Nice.

Bar Against Accidents Made.

In order to prevent all possibility of a repetition of the fatal crash Sunday at the start of the Paris-to-Madrid race, which caused the death of Minister of War Berteaux, no spectators will be allowed on the aviation ground during the commencement of the great air race from Paris to Rome, and thence to Turin.

TAFT INVITED TO SOUND

Jones Suggests Summer White House to President.

The President said he had not been able to give the numerous summer invitations serious consideration.

Indians Ask for Citizenship.

James, full blood Indians, representing the Tulalip and Samish tribes of Washington, are here to ask that members of their tribes be granted full citizenship with the same property rights as are enjoyed by white citizens. They are to have a conference with the Indian Bureau and Secretary Fisher.

Hawley to Inspect Forests.

In issuing the report that the heat wave will be broken within the next 24 hours, Forecaster Hersey, said:

"A series of thunder showers are now passing through the Dakotas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and the pan-handle of Texas. Southerly winds in the valley have caused the excessive heat in the lake region, but this will be dispersed by an eastern movement of the storm pressure."

Two Seized in Opium Den Raid.

PENDLETON, Or., May 27.—As the result of a definite campaign being inaugurated by Federal officers in Pendleton against smuggled opium, raids here resulted in the discovery of two elaborate smokers' layouts. Two arrests were made by Arthur P. Statton and J. M. Giesy, special inspectors of the United States customs service at Portland. O. K. Joe, a Chinaman, deposited \$250 to secure his appearance in Portland, and "Annie Doe" deposited \$100. The officers expect that the bail will be forfeited. The implements necessary for the use of the drug as well as a large quantity of opium, are being destroyed today.

Stockholders Must Pay \$958,133.

DETROIT, Mich., May 27.—After a battle of over ten years, Judge Henry H. Swan, of the United States District Court, has decided that stockholders and directors of the former Michigan Savings & Loan Association must pay Ralph L. Aldrich, receiver, \$958,133. The decree marks the end of the longest bankruptcy case ever fought in Michigan. In 1901, a voluntary petition in bankruptcy was filed by Edward W. Bishop, an Indiana stockholder. Two years later Aldrich discovered alleged improper accountings.

Elgin Improvements Progress.

ELGIN, Or., May 27.—(Special.)—The cement contractors have expedited quite a delay in construction of sidewalks on account of the rains, but have again resumed work. The walk alongside Otto Young's property on Front street is torn out and work will commence tomorrow replacing same with concrete. Many contracts were secured in the residence district for cement sidewalks, well from all appearances it will not be necessary for the Council to pass an ordinance compelling property owners to put in cement walks.

Raymond Would Send Many.

RAYMOND, Wash., May 27.—(Special.)—Planes are under way to send a record-breaking delegation from this city to the meeting of the Southwest Washington Development Association at Chehalis this week. A smoker is to be held next Tuesday evening to discuss final plans. Raymond has the distinction of having sent the largest number of delegates to any previous meeting of the association and the city aims to excel all others at the Chehalis meeting.

Lungguth Made Engineer.

SALMON, Or., May 27.—(Special.)—Martin G. Lungguth, of Portland, has been appointed chief engineer at the State Capitol by Secretary of State Olcott. Lungguth succeeds George Dunford, who was temporarily transferred from the position and will return to his position there. Dunford was sent to the Capitol from the asylum when Engineer Frisbie resigned several weeks ago. The new engineer, when the warm weather arrives, will entirely overhaul the steam engines which are now in a bad condition.
