Indian Wars to Be Theme of Reunion Inaugurated June 20.

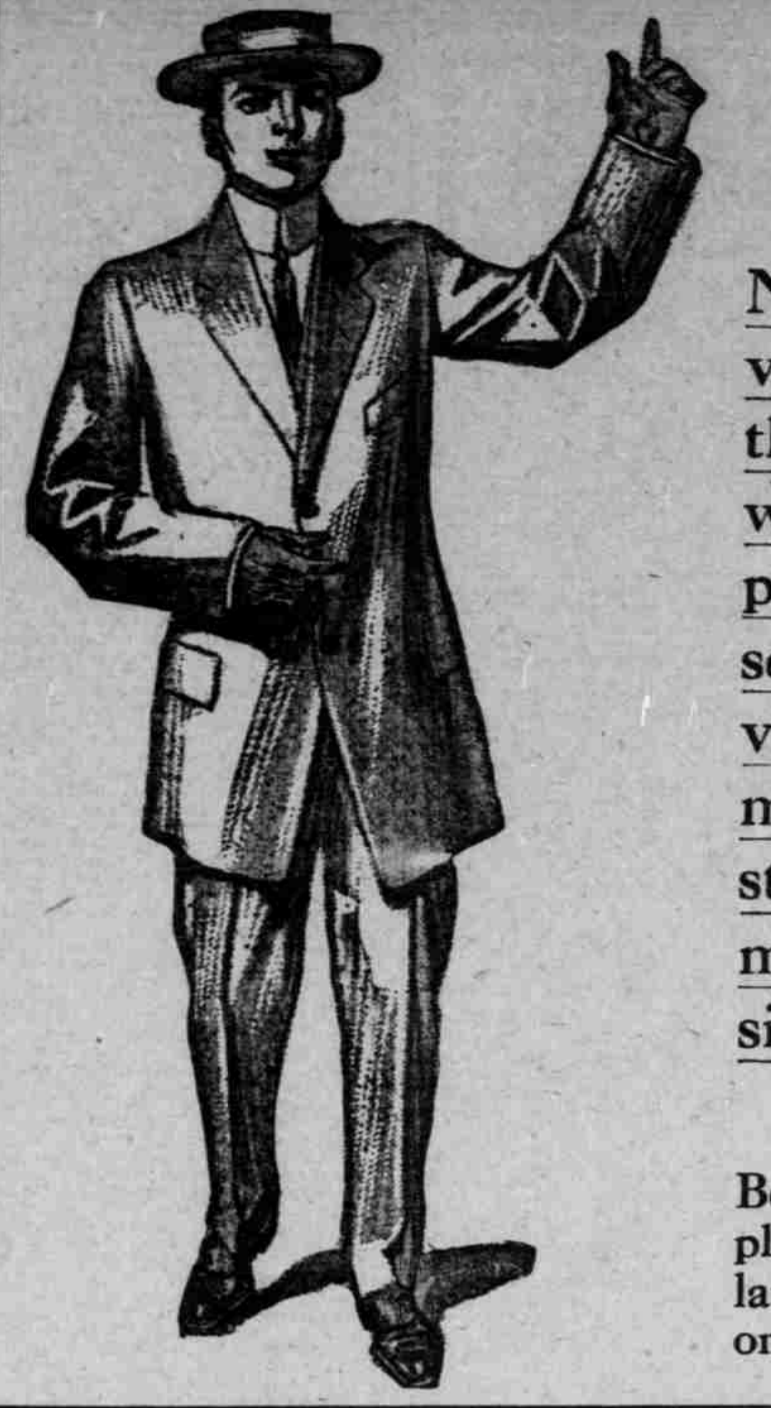

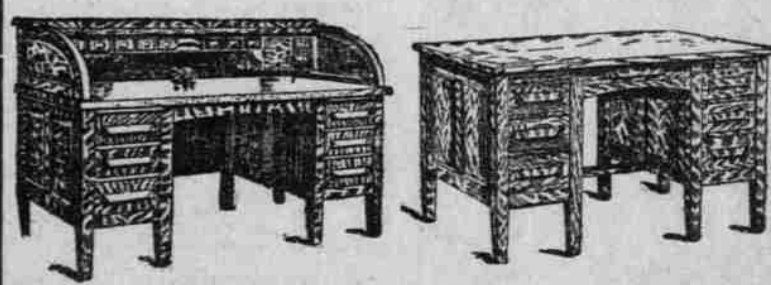
