SCORING CHANGES BEING SUGGESTED

Captain Sheehan Considers Batter in Hit-and-Run Play Is Injured.

CREDIT SHOULD BE GIVEN

Many Puzzling Questions Coming to Scorekeeper in Course of Game Can Be Eliminated by New Rules Being Adopted.

BY ROSCON PAWCETT. Captain Sheehan, of the Portland Beavers, one of the closest students of baseball in the Coast League, is out with a recommendation for a change in the scoring rules that really should have been brought about years ago. Sheehan believes that a batsman, who gets the sign to hit the next ball delivered to the plate, is as much entitled to a sacrifice if he fails to land safely as the man who bunts.

The hit-and-run play enables the an on the bases to get away on a flying etart, but the man at the ball is forced to blaze away at the hall no matter if it is a foot above his head or a foot the other side of the plate. In a measure, he is deliberately sacrificing himself, and the change seems only a matter of time.

Sheehan opposes a suggestion made by an Eastern magnate in advocacy of another change in the sacrifice applica-tion. This recommendation provides for an exemption from a time at bat for an exemption from a time at but for an infield grounder scoring a man from third, in the same manner as the sacrifice fly. As the rules stand now the batsman gets credit for a sacrifice if he hoists out a long fly and the man from third bests in the throw.

Justice of Rule Questioned.

The justice of this sacrifice-fly rule has often been questioned, but granting that some measure of reward in the score is due the player who helps his team by bringing in a run with a fly, why should not a similar reward go to another player who helps his team in the same way by hitting a grounder to some infielder? If there is any juatice in this arrangement, the discoverer would confer a general favor by point-

I don't think a man earns a sacrifice in that case," say's Sheehan. Perhaps not, but the same is true of the sacri-

One change brought about in the sacrifice scoring last Winter has legis-lated out of existence one of the most unjust features of official scoring. With

unjust features of official scoring. With a runner on first, for instance, the batsman lays down a perfect bunt and is thrown out at first, the runner advancing to second. The batter gets a sacrifice hit and is exempted from a time at bat.

But give the play a different turn. Suppose the pitcher or third baseman, who fields the bunt, thinks he has a chance to get the original runner at second and hurls the ball to that station for a force play, only to discover that the man beats his throw and both are safe. Under the old rules no sacrifice could be allowed the batter because nobody went out, and he was charged with a time at bat.

Batter Has to Suffer.

On the whole, not one baseball fan out of a thousand really knows much of the intricacies of correct babseball scoring. The distinction between a hit and an error, the giving of assists, crediting pitchers with victories, and marrifice hits and files—all these perplexities pop up a thousand times during every game at the Coast League

Assists and Errors Scored.
