

ROOSEVELT SNUB DUE TO KOHLSAAT

Information Given by Editor
Behind Incident of Ham-
ilton Club.

LORIMER DUAL CHARACTER

Home Life of Senator Ideal, Says
Witness in Hearing—Names of
Men of National Fame Ap-
pear in Testimony.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Many figures of National prominence were brought into the Lorimer investigation today for the first time, when Herman Kohlsaat, editor and publisher of the Chicago Record-Herald, testified before the Senate committee investigating the election of Senator Lorimer.

Kohlsaat's name was linked with the investigation when Mr. Kohlsaat testified that last August he told Colonel Roosevelt the entire story of the alleged attempt of Edward F. Funk to collect \$50,000 from Clarence S. Funk, general manager of the International Harvester Company, to reimburse those who had contributed \$100,000 to put Lorimer across at Springfield. The fact of secrecy was placed on the ex-President, but Mr. Kohlsaat testified that Colonel Roosevelt wrote him that he declined, because of Mr. Kohlsaat's information, to attend the Hamilton Club dinner in Chicago later in August, 1910, if Lorimer was to be there. The Roosevelt letter will be placed in the record of the hearing.

Senators Told in Advance.

The names of Senators Root, La Follette and Cullom were mentioned in a new light. Mr. Kohlsaat testified he had informed these Senators before the Senate passed on the Lorimer case of the conversation in which Funk had told him of his alleged attempt to collect money. Mr. Kohlsaat did not mention names because he considered himself under a pledge of secrecy to Mr. Funk not to do so. Mr. Kohlsaat mentioned Senator Cullom's name only at the close of the day's session.

Ex-Speaker Cannon and ex-Representative Tawney, of Minnesota, figured in the day's testimony. Mr. Haney, counsel for Lorimer, asked the witness whether Senator Lorimer in 1903 did not drop a legal suit against Mr. Kohlsaat because Cannon and Tawney told him it was feared that if such were not done, the Chicago Record-Herald would not support Roosevelt for President in 1904.

"That is no ridiculous thing at all," said Mr. Kohlsaat, "I declared Mr. Kohlsaat."

Pact With Deceit Denied.

He also denied the suit was dropped because it was made a condition of Governor Deceit's doing a favor to a "young man in trouble," who was Lorimer's friend.

The witness underwent a long cross-examination by counsel for Senator Lorimer. He was asked if he did not tell the Funk story to every newspaper in Chicago. The witness said that he could not remember if he had, although he had spoken of it, without mentioning names, to several persons. He was asked if he had not given it to every magazine that was friendly to him. Mr. Kohlsaat denied that he had done so.

"Didn't you give it to one of the editors of the Outlook?" insisted Judge Haney.

"No, sir."

"Didn't you give it to Theodore Roosevelt?"

"Oh, yes."

Conspiracy Declared Absurd.

He was asked if he had not told a Chicago detective, who came to his office to see if he had any work, that the newspapers of the country had organized to fight Lorimer.

"Perfectly absurd," declared the witness. He was asked if he did not refuse to give the name of his informant, when first called before the Heim investigating committee at Springfield, because he wanted to appear as a sort of martyr.

The witness straightened up, looked at Judge Haney and said:

"If there were not ladies present, and then, as he sank back in his chair, added, 'I would quote one of Eugene Field's poems to you.'

"Suppose you answer the question first," suggested Judge Haney.

"No, sir, I was not playing to the gallery."

Private Life Different.

Judge Haney asked the witness if he did not think it was a condition of giving to take information secretly to Senators who were to judge Senator Lorimer, without giving the State of Illinois, Lorimer or his family a chance to defend themselves against serious charges. He said he did not, and distinguished Senators from members of courts in relation to giving the information. Several times in the course of his examination Mr. Kohlsaat declared he absolutely believed what Mr. Funk told him. Another striking feature of his testimony was repeated statements that he found much to admire in Senator Lorimer's private life. He referred to the Senator's life as ideal.

"He is a dual character," declared Kohlsaat. "In his private life I admire him. He has beautiful children, and his home life is ideal. When I have been fishing for 25 years in Lorimerism, 'Lorimerism' he defined as an 'affiliation and co-operation and cohesion of Democrats and Republicans for party pelf, for private pelf.'"

AIRMAN DIES IN SNAKE

PORTLAND BALLONIST'S PARA-
CHUTE DROPS IN RIVER.

R. J. O'Donnell, Known as Dick
Miller, Seized With Cramp, and
Sinks at Weiser, Idaho.

WEISER, Idaho, June 24.—A balloon-

ist known by the name of Dick Miller, with the Miller Amusement Company, giving a street carnival in this city, was drowned this evening in Snake River, about one mile from where he ascended. He dropped successfully with his parachute, but the wind carried him to about the middle of the river.

He got clear of the parachute and started to swim, but had gone but a short distance when he threw up his hands, cried for help and sank. Efforts are being made to locate the body. The river is very high and the water cold, and it is presumed he was attacked with cramps, as he is said to have been a good swimmer and had been in the habit of swimming the river daily since the show has been here.

Dick Miller's real name is R. J. O'Donnell.

He is a Portland man, having been born and raised here. About three years ago he moved to Spokane, where his brother is employed by the Western Union.

O'Donnell is well known among amusement people, having formed the Miller Amusement Company in Portland last winter. He left this Spring for a tour among the smaller cities of the Northwest. About 10 years ago he made a Fourth of July ascension for John E. Cordray, now manager of the Oaks, at Vancouver, Wash., where his balloon fell into the Columbia and O'Donnell was with difficulty rescued.
