Rotary Club Delegates Due Here August 21.

SPECIAL TRAINS COMING

New York, Kansas City, Chicago, 3t. Paul and Minneapolis Will Be Represented by Delegations at National Convention.

Delegates to the second annual convention of the National Association of the Rotary Clubs of America, which will be held in Portland August 21. will come in special trains from the East. New York probably will send its delegation via the Canadian Pacific, Kansas City by the Union Pacific Chi-Kansas City by the Union Pacific Chicago by the Buriington and Minneapolis and St. Paul have already arranged for a seven-car special over the Soo-Spokane-Portland line. A beautiful itinerary booklet published by the Soo line has been received by Dwight Edwards president of the Portland club. It bears a cover design of roses and speaks of Portland in enthusiastic terms as "the flower city of America." The design on the other cover page gives a map of the United cover page gives a map of the United States with all lines leading to Port-land. The Minneapolis and St. Paul clubs have distributed these booklets widely throughout the East.

Receptions Are Planned.

The special from Chicago will leave August 15, over the Burlington route, selected by the transportation committee for clubs east of the Rocky Mountains as the official route for the delegates. Receptions will be given by chicago and by clubs in cities between Chicago and Vancouver. B. C. and the Eastern delegation will be excorted from Vancouver to Portland by the Seattle Botary Club. San Francisco and other southern cities will also send many delegates.

All of the meetings in Portland will be presided over by Paul P. Harris, the originator of the Rotary idea, and president of the National organization. Beginning August 21, the business sea-sions will continue until Wednesday, August 22.

"Although the roster of official delegates," says Mr. Edwards, of the Portland association, "probably will not exceed 280, there will be many members of Eastern clubs who will follow the regularly appointed delegates West, largely for the sake of the trip.
