

LAURENCE'S NEW PARLIAMENT

Volubility of Opponents of Reciprocity Stilled by Dissolution.

PEOPLE TO DECIDE ISSUE

Campaign of Next Two Months Will Be Bitter, All Concede—Absence of Cloture Rule Makes Proceeding Necessary.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 29.—The 11th Parliament of Canada passed out of existence today and upon the political complexion of a new one to be elected September 21 will depend the fate of the new reciprocity bill.

Premier Laurier decided to ask for an immediate dissolution at a meeting of his Cabinet this afternoon and at an adjourned session of the House.

Formalities Dispensed With.

The refusal of the Conservative minority of the House to close the debate on the Government's reciprocity resolution and permit a vote on it, which would mean its adoption, and the probability of a change of their attitude resulted in the Government's decision that it was useless to keep Parliament another day.

This is the first time a session of the Dominion Parliament has been closed without the appearance of the Governor-General in military state at the state chamber to give formal prorogation.

Although the appropriations for the year have not been voted, the government figures that it has funds enough to suffice until a new Parliament has been elected and assembled to vote the remainder.

It is generally agreed that the two months' campaign before the country will be bitter. Reciprocity probably will be the sole issue, although the Conservatives in Quebec may seek to inject the naval issue into the contest.

It has been suggested to the department that the outcome of the Harriman merger suit might have some bearing on the great holding company which, it is believed, the Government has a good chance to win.

SHEEP DATA SHOW PROFIT

Tariff Investigator Sees \$1.81 a Head Margin for Raiser.

OGDEN, Utah, July 29.—W. C. Barnes, representing President Taft and the Tariff Board in checking up the information gathered by special agents of the Government on wool and sheep industries, arrived in Ogden early today after visiting four of the largest sheep states of the West.

He says the data obtained prove sheep can be raised and wool clipped and marketed and lambs disposed of with a profit of \$1.50 a head, the annual revenue from which, with wool at 12 cents, totals \$1.51, leaving a profit of \$1.31 a head.

OLD CAPITOL IS RAZED

ASH HEAP MARKS SITE OF WASHINGTON STATEHOUSE.

Heated Conflicts for United States Senatorships Staged in Once Famous Building.

OLYMPIA, July 27.—(Special.)—Just a heap of ashes, and an old water pipe wrapped in an ancient carpet mark the spot where stood the first legislature building in this state.

When the last legislature appropriated \$250,000 for the erection of a new Temple of Justice and determined that the capitol of Washington is to remain in Olympia for all time to come, the Capitol Commission ordered the old grounds cleared.

WILDE WARRANT ISSUED

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—(Special.)—Deputy Sheriff Leonard, of Portland, at 12:30 o'clock today received from Governor Johnson the state's warrant against the party of exploiters sought by Governor West, of Oregon, for Louis J. Wilde, and Wilde's arrest and return to Portland for trial are only a question of taking Wilde into custody.

Wilde left San Diego this morning for this city. The party will leave today morning on the Shasta Limited.

No ceremony marked the final action on the part of the Governor in issuing the state warrant that returns to Oregon for trial a personal friend and an appointee of the Johnson administration.

Attorney-General Webb today denied that there had been received "thousands of letters from Oregon" demanding the return of Wilde upon threat that if he were not returned to Oregon the support of Oregon to the Panama Exposition would be withheld.

MEXICANS NEED EDUCATION

Peons Hard to Persuade Property Should Not Be Divided.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—The verbal reports that the Ambassador to Mexico, Henry Lane Wilson, has made to the Secretary of State regarding conditions in Mexico are on the whole said to be encouraging.

It has been somewhat difficult for the provisional government to reconcile the peons to the fact that their land cannot be a wholesale sequestration of private lands and a division among the populace.

The long need of the Mexicans is a larger measure of public education, Mr. Wilson believes. It is understood to be the policy of F. L. Madero, Jr., should he be elected President, to urge upon the Mexican Congress an immediate enlargement of the present system of state schools.

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HOUSE HOPS KEY TO TARIFF TANGLE

Democrats Hostile to Compromise Involving Increase in Wool Schedules.

SPEAKER IS OPTIMISTIC

Other Leaders Inclined to Believe Taft Will Veto Any Measure Resulting From Democratic-Insurgent Combine.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Democratic leaders of the House adopted anything but a conciliatory tone on the wool tariff situation today.

Chairman Underwood and Representative Harrison, of the ways and means committee, and other prominent Democrats, expressed themselves tonight in friendly terms toward a compromise with the Senate that would mean an increase in the rates of the original Underwood bill.

Meanwhile President Taft is accredited by those who talked with him today as being determined to veto the bill when it reaches him.

Solution Rests With House.

The situation in the House is the key to the entire tariff tangle in Congress. Upon the action of the House early next week rests the possibility of further tariff legislation at this session.

Another faction, of which Representative Harrison, of New York, is the leader, demands that the raw wool duty shall not be above 20 per cent.

Two-Thirds Vote Lacking.

In the event the President should veto the final conference wool bill, the Democratic leaders will begin calculations as to whether or not they will pass the bill by a two-thirds vote.

House Democrats expressed the view today that if the President is to veto the bill, and he is expected to do so, they will prefer to have him veto a Democratic bill, rather than an insurgent Republican-Democratic compromise measure.

It is clear that the House will not be in a hurry to ask for a conference. The Senate wool bill, when it is taken up in the House next week, will be promptly rejected and sent back to the Senate.

STANDARD OIL GAINS TIME

Final Dissolution Put Off Until December 21, or Even Later.

ST. LOUIS, July 29.—A decree modifying the original order for the dissolution of the Standard Oil Company has been filed in the United States Circuit Court here today.

The modification extends until December 21 the dissolution of the corporation, and the privilege of asking more time, if necessary, is granted.

The original decree of the Judges of the United States circuit court, affirmed by the Supreme Court of the United States, gave the company 20 days in which to dissolve, and prohibited its managing in interstate commerce during that time.

CORNER IN BARLEY SEEN

Independent Buyers Believed Trying to Grab Lewiston Crop.

SHIPPER COMBINE PLAN

WESTERN INTERIOR ORGANIZATION SEEKS ABSOLUTE RATE.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 29.—(Special.)—Organization of all Western interior shippers to secure from the next session of Congress an absolute long-and-short-haul clause, to apply to all Eastern interior points, is advocated by Attorney H. M. Stephens.

Such a clause would give Spokane terminal rates, not only from St. Paul and Missouri River points, but from Chicago, the Mississippi River and points as far East as Cincinnati and Detroit.

Commissioner Lane's holding in the Nevada and Arizona cases is to the effect that there is no water competition in the Chicago-St. Louis territory, notwithstanding the fact that section states that they are unable to state that water competition does not have any effect upon rates from Chicago and St. Louis.

"I have always insisted that there is no evidence of water competition farther West than the Buffalo-Pittsburg line, and the Commission has practically found that there is no such competition from Chicago and St. Louis, hence I am of the opinion that an absolute long-and-short-haul clause provision from territory where there is no water competition or no water shipments of material consequence would be legal unless the carrier can show that the reduction would result in confiscation of the railroad property. This, I am confident, they cannot show."

VICTORIA, July 29.—The Pacific Coast Steamship Company's tourist steamer Spokane, which was wrecked in Seymour Narrows last month, has been successfully floated and is on her way to Seattle to undergo repairs.

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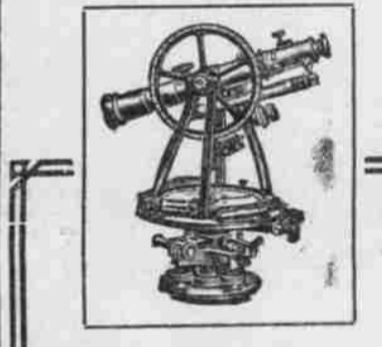
