

## TARIFF REVISION PLANS EXTENDING

Democratic-Insurgent Combination to Press for Further Schedules.

## TAFT'S VETO IS EXPECTED

Farmers' Products to Be Eliminated From Free List—Wool Compromise to Be Made on 30 Per Cent Basis.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—The fight of the Democratic-Insurgent Republican coalition for broader tariff revision gained ground Friday and it was confidently predicted in both houses that a conference compromise wool bill, the farmers' free list bill, and possibly the cotton bill with steel, sugar and other schedules, would be passed. Meantime the indications are stronger than ever that President Taft will exercise his veto power on tariff legislation prior to the submission of the tariff bill report in December. The cotton bill probably will pass the House next Thursday. Democratic leaders say that if the present programme is carried out there is nothing to prevent a movement about the middle of August.

The plan contemplates a compromise wool bill on a basis of 30 per cent ad valorem duty on raw wool. This measure will go to conference next Monday and Tuesday.

## Bailey Amendment Will Win.

The free list bill, instead of being handicapped with the sugar, wool, steel and other schedules as riders, is to be changed only by the Bailey amendment, which strikes out the provision placing farm products on the free list. This amendment is necessary to insure the Republican insurgent vote.

Democrats of both houses expressed certainty that the free list bill will be put through the Senate next Tuesday by the same combination that put the wool bill through.

The intention of the free list bill as a whole, as the insurgent Senators regard it, is to compensate the farmer for the loss supposed to have been inflicted upon him by the acceptance of Canadian reciprocity, and they will not consent to any extension to other countries of the free import provision in the products of the farm. Virtually all the opposition to the bill on the Democratic side will be because of this amendment.

"We are not going to try to put any of the big schedules on the free list bill, as was at first contemplated," said one insurgent Senator. "We want the President to have an opportunity to say whether he is willing to do anything to recoup the farmers of the country for the loss occasioned them by forcing the passage of the reciprocity bill, and we shall not give him the excuse for a veto that he might find in a cotton or a steel schedule."

The wool bill will be sent to conference Monday or Tuesday. It will be called up in the House, then by Democratic Leader Underwood will appoint conferees.

## W. G. SOUTHER ARRESTED

Portland Real Estate Dealer Accused by Woman of Fraud.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—(Special.)—After waiting five months at San Francisco, a real estate man of Portland, under arrest on a charge of embezzlement, was released today on a charge made by Mrs. Caroline Dunlap, who alleged that he misappropriated part of the income of her property left in his trust.

The "no surrender" movement is dying of ridicule, its leaders not daring to publish the names of its alleged adherents. Lord Lansdowne, leader of the opposition in the House of Lords, on the other hand has received written pledges of support from more than 300 peers in his effort to save the bill.

## SAILOR IS EX-BANK HEAD

Man, Starving in Cheap Lodging-House, Wants to See Wife.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—Rising from his "flop" in a waterfront lodging-house here tonight, Carey A. Man, informed the proprietor that he

had been a fugitive from justice since 1908, having looted the Bank of Pearl, of Pearl, Ill., of which he said he was president, of \$45,000. He said he was starving and asked to be turned over to the police.

Man, who is 55 years old, said he had been in nearly every city in the country and wanted food and a place to sleep. "I want to see my wife and children," added Man.

His clothes were worn, but immaculate, and he walked erectly with an officer out of the sailors' lodging-house on his way to the city prison. "Thirty-five thousand dollars of the money which I took was gambled away in stocks," he said. "I made a desperate attempt to cover the shortage in my accounts and stole \$10,000 more. As the result of my embezzlement, the bank failed and I fled the state."

Man came to San Francisco from Portland a week ago. Since his arrival here he has sought work as a waiter in waterfront eating-houses, and has lived from free lunches given him at saloons.

He informed James Hartman, proprietor of the lodging-house, he had a wife and three children in Pearl.

He was relieved at learning Miss Clark's whereabouts and was anxious to see her at once but the police told him he must wait a conference with Mrs. Baldwin today.

Delaney says he and Miss Clark have exchanged many letters and photographs and that the girl is as anxious to wed him as he is to make her his wife. He declares that his aged grandmother in Paducah has given her consent to their marriage and approved of Miss Clark's trip to Portland to be married. Delaney sent the girl the ticket, he said.

"I am a poor, hard working man and wanted a poor girl," said Delaney, last night. "My parents died when I was a baby and when Miss Clark wrote me that she was an orphan, she appealed to me. She was living with her grandmother, who is poor."

## GIN SERVED IN DEATH JAR

Thirsty Men Dump Out Ashes of Yellow Fever Victim to Use Urn.

NEW YORK, July 29.—"There were five or six of us and we were awfully thirsty—wanted a ginricky. We did not have anything to make it in so two of the men went into the warehouse and got a bottle of gin. They brought it back and we all drank it. The man who got the gin was Colonel Warrington. He had died of yellow fever, on his way up from Cuba. I threw the ashes out, made the ginricky and we all had a drink. Arthur Denys, who worked at quarantine until three years ago, started Governor Dix's special commission to investigate against the gin. New York quarantine station by relating this story on the stand today. Records show that Colonel George E. Warrington, Jr., who was known as an sanitary engineer, died of yellow fever on a steamer coming from Cuba, October 23, 1893.

## WALSH'S FREEDOM NEARER

Quashing of Indictments Paves Way to Banker's Parole.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—The only obstacles that would prevent John R. Walsh, the ex-Chicago banker, from being released on parole from Leavenworth prison in September were removed today when word came from Chicago that the remaining indictments against him had been quashed. Walsh's application for release, if he makes one, will be taken up by the board of prison directors on September 12. By that time he will have served one-third of his sentence of five years. President Taft recently pardoned Walsh on the condition of sentence to Walsh. At the same time he refused clemency to Charles W. Morse.

## BULLETS RIDDLE DOCTOR

Pratt's wound is believed to be fatal.
