

FAMOUS ARCHERS SPEND FEW DAYS SEEING THE SIGHTS OF OREGON

Harry B. Richardson, Champion of World, and H. Z. Jackson, at Forest Grove, After Hunting With Bows in Canada, Tell of Their Pursuit After Big Game.

FOREST GROVE, Or., Aug. 12.—(Special.)—The champion archer of the world, Harry B. Richardson, and H. Z. Jackson, a prominent lawyer of Atchison, Kansas, who have just returned from a four weeks' hunting expedition with their bows in British Columbia, spent Tuesday and Wednesday in this city, visiting and shooting with F. S. Barnes, maker of the famous Oregon yew bows.

When but twenty years of age, Mr. Richardson made his world record in the National Tournament held at Chicago last August with a score of 1113 points in the double york round, which exceeds any score recorded in the

last 50 years. Mr. Richardson is a medical student at Harvard, and expects to return there in the Fall. Mr. Jackson holds the record for night shooting, which he achieved two years ago. On their trip to British Columbia, they were accompanied by Will H. Thompson, leading bowman hunter of the world, and J. M. Chaille, a business man of Atchison, Kansas. The party went by launch into the Upper Sound country, visiting many of the small uninhabited islands where they found considerable wild game. Part of the trip was made in canoes. While floating along in a canoe one day, Mr. Richardson shot, from a distance of 60 yards, a wild cat, which was perched in a tree overhanging the water. The animal weighed over a hundred pounds and was the record kill of the trip. Grouse, squirrels and ground hogs beside other game were killed by the hunters. For the hunt the archers used twenty-eight-inch spear point arrows and bows of an eighty-pound pull. Mr. Richardson and Mr. Jackson spent several hours while here target shooting with Mr. Barnes on his range in the southern part of town. Both of the champions use bows made by Mr. Barnes. Mr. Richardson left Tuesday evening for a pleasure trip to Alaska, and Mr. Jackson returned Wednesday to his home in Kansas.
