

SCOFFER AT DEVIL IS CALLED HERETIC

Christian Advocate Editor De-
clared to Have Forced
Crisis in Methodism.

MIRACLES CALLED MYTHS

Dr. Burns, Accusing Dr. Stuart,
Says Faith of Young Theologians
Is Being Undermined and
Trial Is Demanded.

JOLIET, Ill., Sept. 28.—(Special.)—
Dr. Charles M. Stuart, editor of the
Northwestern Christian Advocate, official
organ of Methodism in Chicago and the
Middle West, and president-elect of
Garrett Biblical Institute, who was
elected a ministerial delegate to the
general conference of the Methodist
Episcopal Church, will be tried for
heresy by the Rock River conference
for his teachings and writings. If
charges made by Dr. William Henry
Burns are taken up by the conference.
For more than two years Dr. Burns
has been charging that both in the
classroom and in the editorial columns
of the Northwestern Christian Advocate
Dr. Stuart has been uttering
thoughts which are rapidly undermin-
ing the belief of Methodists to such an
extent that there is a real crisis.

Some of the specific charges of Dr.
Burns are:
"Destroying the primitive scriptural
foundation of morals by throwing
doubt upon the decalogue as a moral
code."
"Ruling out Sunday observance as a
moral obligation."
"Suggesting that an ecclesiastical
body and a legislature may deviate from
the scriptural standard regarding mar-
riage and divorce to suit special con-
ditions."

Dr. Burns adds:
"The conditions are absolutely alarm-
ing. Young men fresh from our theo-
logical schools are preaching the
"myths of miracles," denying the im-
maculate conception and the physical
resurrection of Jesus; preaching a sec-
ond probation and ridiculing as an-
tiquated such ideas as a "personal
devil" and the Genesis account of the
creation. All who maintain the old
doctrines are ridiculed as "old foggy
and moss grown." Thus many men are
carried away or kept silent."

LUMBERMEN DENY WRONG

Remonstrance Against Sales to Com-
petitors Defended in Answer.

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—The answer
of the Eastern States Retail Lumber
Dealers' Association and other defend-
ants in the Government's suit for the
dissolution of the lumber trust, com-
plained of as an alleged combination in
restraint of interstate trade and com-
merce, was filed today in the United
States Circuit Court.
The defendants assert that the acts
complained of amount to no more than
that the defendants had no more than
sales and quotations on lumber made
by certain wholesalers to retail com-
sumers in competition with defendants
and that defendants had tried to dis-
courage such sales by remonstrance,
withdrawal of custom and other lawful
means.

TRAIL OF BOYS IS FOUND

Commissionary Route Established for
Searchers on Mount Shasta.

SISSON, Cal., Sept. 28.—Searchers on
the eastern slope of Mount Shasta sent
in word today that they had stumbled
upon what they believe to be the trail
of Harry Hayes and Herbert Barr, the
two boys who have been missing since
last Monday. The track leads up Mud
Creek and is difficult to follow. This
is the first trace of the boys to be
found, despite the fact that 200 men
have been at work night and day since
they failed to appear.
A regular commissary route has been
established to forward supplies to the
searchers.

DEATH RIDES UPON FLOOD

Railroad and there the fire raged
fiercest. Many men were caught here
and it is believed that few, if any, es-
caped with their lives. The course of
the flood was through the business
center of the little village. A major-
ity of the buildings were of wood and
those which were not immediately
wrecked by the torrent soon were in
flames.

People Caught Without Warning.

So sudden was the onslaught of wa-
ter that many persons had no time to
flee to the hills, but others received the
warning and, believing there was a
fire, hastened to the center of the town,
only to be caught in the flood and
swept away.

The flood passed quickly. Houses
had been crushed and tossed about like
toys, while hundreds of bodies had
been carried down on the crest of the
torrent.

With the passage of the water, those
who had fled to the hills hastened to
return to their ruined homes in search
of relatives and friends. Here and
there bodies had been cast along the
path of the torrent and about 40 bodies
were recovered in a short time. Some
of them had been so badly battered by
the tossing debris that they were be-
yond recognition, while others had been
carried along with no apparent injury.
Many were caught in burning build-
ings and it will be days before the real
extent of the calamity will be known.
It is expected that no fewer than 400
persons perished, and some estimates
are higher.

Hotels All Swept Away.

The dam was built of concrete and
was situated on the Sinnamahoning
creek. The water caught a draft of freight
cars near the station and they were
carried down the valley with the
wreckage of the railroad buildings.
The hotels in the town were de-
stroyed and, as they were directly in
the path of the torrent, no one is
thought to have escaped from them.
The fire started in the ruins of a ware-

house and communicated to a row of
houses which had partially escaped the
flood.

GOVERNOR ORDERS RELIEF

State Police, Food Supplies, Tents
and Blankets to Go Promptly.

PITTSBURG, Sept. 28.—Governor
Tener, who is here tonight, telegraphed
orders to Harrisburg to have the state
health officials, Adjutant-General
Stewart and as many state police as
can be gathered sent to Austin. Gov-
ernor Tener also telegraphed the
State Board of Charities to send repre-
sentatives to the scene.
Tents, blankets and food supplies
will be on the road within a few hours.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 30.—Adj-
utant-General Stewart tonight ordered
tents and rations to be sent to Austin
as soon as possible and the entire force
of the state arsenal has been ordered
on duty to prepare the shipments. It
is hoped to get some of the tents
started before morning.

MADERO HAS GOOD LEAD

LARGE MAJORITY FORECAST IN
TODAY'S ELECTION.

Five Candidates for Vice-Presidency
Make Lively Contest—De la Barra
Calms Fears of Reyes.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 28.—Everything
indicates that General Madero will have
an overwhelming majority at to-
morrow's election. Although Francisco
and Emilio Vasquez Gomez are still in
the race for the Presidency, the former
being the candidate for the bolting anti-
re-electionists and the latter named by
the Liberal party, their followings are
comparatively small.
The real contest will be for the Vice-
Presidency, for which there are five
candidates.
President De la Barra, in a telegram
to General Reyes, at Havana, declares
that the Reyes' fears of violence in
Mexico were unfounded, since the gov-
ernment expected to give him complete
protection.
