RE-ELECTION OF MR. TAFT UNDOUBTED

Republican National Committee
man Says We Live in
Fault-Finding Era.

MUCH MONEY AVAILABLE

John W. Blodgett, of Grand Rapids,
Mich., Says Public Opinion is in
Favor of Lumbermen Ac-
cused by Government.

"We seem to be living in an era
of fault-finding and back-biting, and until
we settle down and pull together there
will be no great change for the better,"
said John W. Blodgett, of Grand Rapids,
Mich., at the Hotel Portland yesterday.

"There is an abundance of money
available for investment, but the in-
vestor is so uncertain that there is
little indication of much ex-
pansion. This condition is due largely
to protracted tariff agitation."

Mr. Blodgett is a member of the Re-
publican National Committee, but he
denies that his visit has any political
significance. He is interested in lumber
and owns timberland in Lane and
Klamath counties. He will visit these
properties before returning to Michi-
gan, in about two weeks.

"In his address at Waterloo, Iowa,
yesterday, President Taft furnished a
splendid text which should be adopted
by every Republican who believes in
party solidarity and party success,"
said Mr. Blodgett, President Taft said:

Co-operation Necessary, He says.

"It is not a progressive policy, in
any true sense, to be hostile to the
prosperity of any part of the country.
We are all in the same boat, all tossed
about by the same wave. Let there be
good business in one section and that
prosperity will quickly spread. Busi-
ness is halting now. There is doubt
and distrust among investors, due to a
fear of blind unity toward successful
enterprises."

"This has been the great trouble in
tariff legislation in this country. If
the tariff is essential to one industry
it is essential to all. We find the
farmers protesting against the tariff
on agricultural implements. At the
same time dealers in agricultural im-
plements are inveighing against the
tariff on agricultural products. This
is all wrong. We should pull together.
As a lumberman I feel that a tariff on
lumber is of no virtue except with an
equal measure of protection on all
American industries and American
products."

"The general business situation is one
of halting and uncertainty. Every in-
dustry affected by the tariff is neces-
sarily on very uncertain ground on ac-
count of the very general tariff agi-
tation which prevails. The railroads
are having their troubles and, like
every other consumer, are buying only
what is necessary to supply their actual
needs. The railroads are the largest
single consumers in many lines and a
curtailment of their purchases has
either a direct or reflex action on all
kinds of business."

Taft's Re-Election Certain.

The nomination and re-election of
President Taft, in the opinion of Eastern
people, said Mr. Blodgett, is a fore-
gone conclusion. The insurgents are
not developing the strength that was
expected and will have a slim representa-
tion in the Republican National Con-
vention. Mr. Blodgett is of the opinion

that the insurgent movement was
helped by the Canadian reciprocity pact.
This was particularly true in some of
the large agricultural states, including
Wisconsin, Iowa, Kansas and Minne-
sota.

"This was due to the fact that the
reciprocity pact virtually put the
farmers' products on the free list," he
explained.

"This aroused a more or less vindic-
tive feeling against Eastern manufac-
turing interests whose protective duties
were largely retained in the Canadian
treaty. I hope, however, that before
another election the agricultural inter-
ests of this country will see that their
interests lie in helping to build up and
maintain the regular organization of
the Republican party."

Public Favors Lumbermen.

Referring to the criminal prosecu-
tions recently instituted by the Govern-
ment in New York, Chicago and Denver
against retail lumber dealers for an al-
leged violation of the Sherman law, Mr.
Blodgett said public opinion favored
generally the accused dealers. Deny-
ing that he was a member of any of
the organizations included in the Fed-
eral investigation, Mr. Blodgett said
the retail lumber dealers in various
of the Middle Western states had
organizations similar to those main-
tained by retail grocers, hardware and
other products, and retained in their
employ a salaried secretary.

"Whenever a lumber manufacturer
sells lumber to other than the retailers
and in this territory," he continued,
"I am told the secretary advises other
members of the association. The result
is that the manufacturer is discriminated
against by the retailers. It is possi-
ble that in some cases the manufacturer
is blacklisted."

"This action, I am informed, has been
complained against as being in viola-
tion of the Sherman law. I think the
public generally sympathizes with the
dealers, as they would with the retail
grocer in case a wholesaler would un-
dertake to sell his goods direct to cus-
tomers. As I understand it, this is the
basis for the criminal indictment of the
officers of the Lumber Dealers' Asso-
ciation."

CHILD AND SCHOOL BENCH

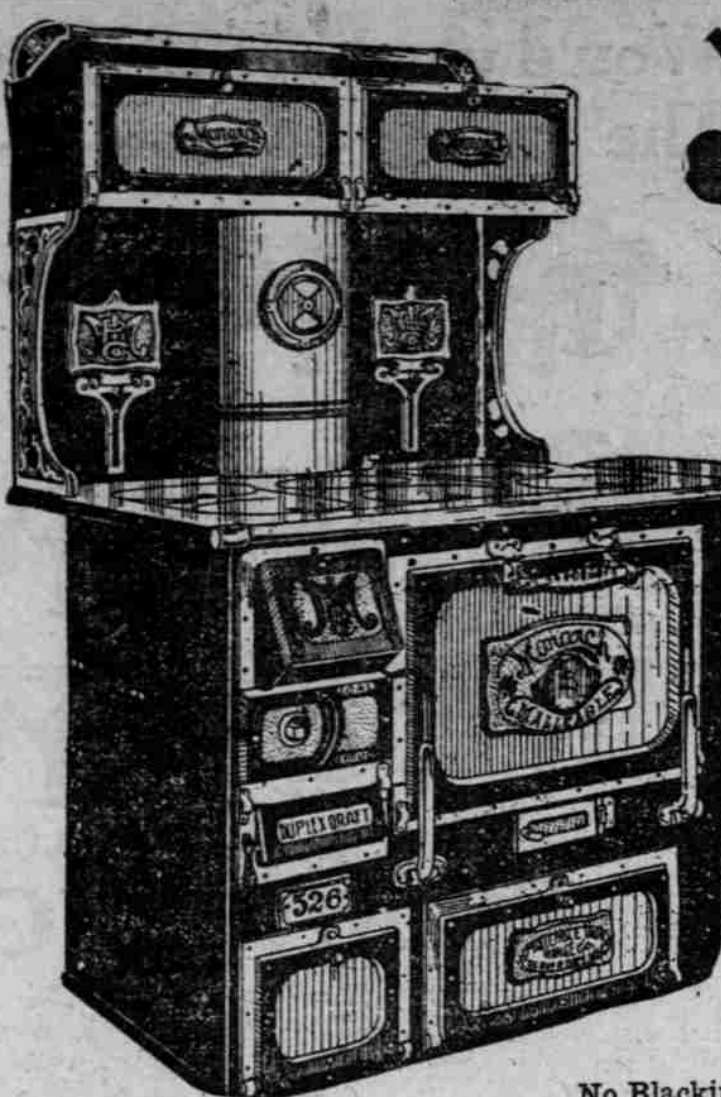
One Cause of Lateral Curvature of
the Spine.

The commencement of the annual
crippling process of our children will
begin before many weeks have passed.
The schools will take from their beau-
tiful outdoor play the youngsters—
whose vertebrae are made up to a con-
siderable degree of cartilage, and are
therefore soft and easily pushed out of
shape—and put them in ill-arranged
seats, forcing them to keep compara-
tively still, while the superimposed
weight of the upper parts of the body,
combined with the faulty positions as-
sumed, does its work of destruction to
an extent, as regards number, not even
guessed by the general public. Statis-
tics show that a very large percentage
of school children have scoliosis. As
Dr. Royce Whitman says in his Or-
thopedic Surgery: "Lateral curvature
of the spine is one of the most com-
mon of deformities," and it is increas-
ing in direct ratio as the school cur-
riculum is becoming more exacting.

A decided change for the better can
be made in our schools. The sessions
should be shorter, and the periods of
prolonged sitting should be broken up.
Department always bulks large in the
school report, and one of the main in-
fringements against "good deportment"
is that of simple moving about in the
seat, especially when the pupil turns
and looks toward the back of the room,
thus healthfully twisting the spine.
This enforced quietude—at just the
stage of life in which every animal,
including the human, is meant by God
to be most active—is horribly perni-
cious.

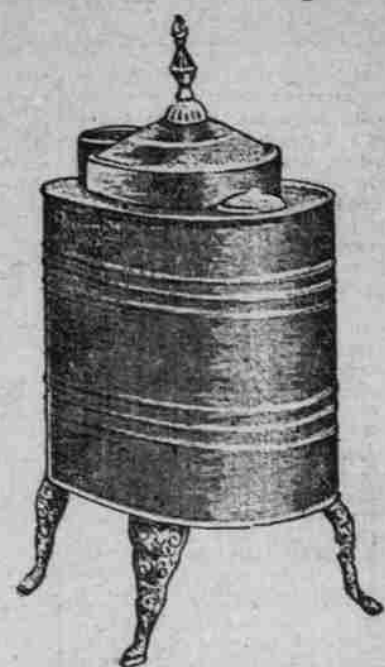

VIADUCT BIG PROJECT

STEEL ENTRANCE TO EAST-
MORELAND 1400 FEET LONG.

Cost of Elevated Structure Will Be
\$70,000—Work to Be Com-
pleted in 60 Days.

Construction work on the elaborate
entrance to Reed College campus and
Eastmoreland, consisting of a viaduct
of structural steel and concrete, began
last week. The project will cost \$70-
800.

The viaduct is to be located on Rybee
avenue and will extend along the full
width of the thoroughfare from Twen-
ty-second street in Westmoreland to
the intersection of Crystal Springs
boulevard and Rybee avenue in East-
moreland, covering a distance of 1400
feet. The contract for the construc-
tion of the viaduct has been let to the
Pacific Bridge Company. According to
the terms of the contract, the work
must be completed by December 1. To
insure the rushing through of the work
within 60 days, the contractors have
agreed to keep shifts at work 24 hours
a day and in addition to carry on sev-
eral different sections of the construc-
tion simultaneously.

The viaduct has been designed to
meet not only the requirements of the
present, but the demands from year to
year for the next quarter of a century.
Massive concrete abutments and the
heaviest type of railroad bridge con-
struction will support two streetcar
tracks as well as driveways for auto-
mobile and team traffic. For the orna-

LOSS OF MONEY FOR EDUCA-
TION OFFSET BY FRIENDS.

Letter to Mother in Portland Tells
of Fraud to Miss Clemens in
Berkeley Lodging-House.

Friends of Mildred Clemens, the Port-
land girl who was defrauded in Berke-
ley, Cal., of \$248, which she had saved
after two years of work, for a college
education, have started a public sub-
scription, and expect within a few days
to forward to the girl the full amount
of her loss.

The first contribution was \$50, which
was placed in a local bank to the credit
of Miss Clemens' mother, Mrs. Renshaw,
who lives at 1565 Minerva street, near
St. Johns. Other small contributions
have been made, increasing the amount
to \$150. Arrangements were made yester-
day for the receipt of contributions
at the restaurant of B. H. Moore at 148
Fifth street.

As soon as the required amount is
raised it will be forwarded to Berke-
ley. Mrs. Renshaw yesterday received a
letter from Mildred in which an ex-
planation of the fraud by which she
was robbed was given. She said that
at the same boarding house as Miss
Clemens and other students and had
learned that she had about \$250 in
money. He made a proposal to her to

FRUITGROWERS TO MEET

Adaptability of Apples to Yamhill
County to Be Studied.

SHERIDAN, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special).
The Hyland Fruit Growers of Yam-

hill County will convene in Sheridan
October 14, when important topics re-
lative to fruit and soils will be discussed.
State horticultural experts will be present
and a county-wide attendance is
expected at the meeting.

Every fruit-grower and rancher is
being urged to prepare exhibits of
products and especially of apples, for
which the Sheridan country is chiefly
noted. The exhibit will be important
from the fact that the decision as to
the best variety of apples adapted to
this soil and climate will be studied.

In addition to the apple, all other
fruits and farm products will be judged
as to their adaptability in the Sheri-
dan country, and a complete under-
standing regarding their culture will
be sought by the Sheridan culturists
and horticultural heads of Oregon.
