

SAGE ROMANCE LASTS 3 YEARS

Lulu Glaser Now Seeks Divorce From Ralph D. Herz, Alleging Cruelty.

STARS' HOPES SHATTERED

Musical Comedy Folk Play in Same Shows for Year but Financial Results Fail to Prove Success—Separation Follows.

CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—(Special)—Another stage romance shattered, and this time it is that of the beautiful Lulu Glaser, known in private life as Mrs. Lulu Glaser Herz, who today brought suit for divorce in this city against Ralph C. Herz, himself an actor of no mean ability in musical comedy roles for the past few years.

Lulu Glaser has long been prominent behind the footlights and popular in front of the footlights, and has played in musical comedy for the past ten years and it was while playing in New York City that she met Herz, then playing a leading role in musical comedy and the couple were married on May 23, 1907.

For a season they played together but this system was found to be unprofitable from a financial standpoint for either the Herz family or their manager and the couple took to different shows in 1909. Mrs. Herz playing again as Lulu Glaser, as per the programmes.

Trouble Brews in Summer.
It is said here that the first troubles between Herz and his actress-wife began to brew in the summer of 1909 and Mrs. Herz in her papers filed here today declares that her husband beat and choked her until she was black and blue, and on another occasion threatened to kill her.

It is the belief among the theatrical friends of Herz here that he will not contest the suit, as he has been separated from his wife for almost a year, having left her November 14, 1910. It is said that the case will not go to trial, as he would have good grounds, owing to the allegation made often by Herz that his wife "was too fat" and with her leading man during the seasons they have been separated and that he would have good grounds for a counter suit if he cared to bring it.

Miss Glaser has been known more to theatrical fame through her beauty than her ability to sing, particularly in recent years.

Mrs. Herz is now rehearsing her new play, "Miss Dudelack," which will have its American premiere earlier than expected, next Tuesday night in Hartford, Conn., and will then go to its real "first night" in Boston on Monday, October 16.

HYDE GETS NEW JUDGE
Second Trial for Murder Will Be Before Judge Porterfield.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 7.—Lawyers for Dr. B. Clark Hyde clashed with Judge Latahaw today in arguing a motion for a change of venue and a direct issue of veracity was raised. The court, however, granted the motion and the second trial on the charge of murdering Colonel Swops will be held before Judge Porterfield, beginning October 16.

Trouble arose when Judge Latahaw asked Walsh if he had not said last summer that it was not the intention of the defense to seek a change of venue. Walsh denied he had said this.

Some of the Deputy Marshals attempted to extort money from him. Also they made frequent trips between the jury room and the private office of the court."

SHOTGUN COMPELS RIDE
NEGRO HOLDS UP TRAIN AND CLIMBERS ABOARD.

Supposed Oregon Convict Quickly Surrenders When Chico Officer Opens Fire.

CHICO, Cal., Oct. 7.—(Special)—A negro, calling himself "Lon English," and not yet 25 years old, supposed to be a convict from the Oregon Penitentiary, menaced with a shotgun a brakeman who refused to let him board a freight train at Tehama this morning. When the train started for Chico, he held it up by covering the engineer with the gun and making him stop. The conductor telegraphed Chico that the negro was aboard and when the train reached here several policemen were on hand. The negro tried to get away by running, and after he ran half a mile turned upon the officers with the shotgun.

Officer Martin fired at him with a rifle and he immediately surrendered. He was well supplied with ammunition.
