

DR. LYMAN'S WIFE SEEKING DIVORCE

Escapades With Glovemakers' Daughter Made Basis of Suit in New York.

SPOUSE SLOW TO DECIDE

Cohn's Confession That He Received \$2000 From Miss Lehman to Aid Promoter Results in Filing of Action.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14.—(Special.)—Another chapter was added to the sensational story of Dr. John Grant Lyman's life today upon receipt of a dispatch from White Plains, N. Y., by United States Marshal Elliott to the effect that Mrs. Alice Lyman, wife of the fraudulent promoter, has begun a divorce action, the grounds of which are based on Lyman's escapades with Miss Maud Lehman, daughter of a millionaire glove manufacturer in New York.

The recent notoriety attained by Dr. Lyman, which followed his escape from Federal custody at the Providence Hospital in Oakland, revealed the get-rich-quick schemer's attention to Miss Lehman, who was his companion here at the Union-Square Hotel just previous to Lyman's original arrest on September 5. Mrs. Lyman was spending a vacation with her relatives at White Plains when the press dispatch informed her of Lyman's arrest and his devotion to Miss Lehman. Believing at first that there was some mistake, Mrs. Lyman later was informed officially by the Government authorities in this city of the proof that Miss Lehman was supplying the wily promoter with ready funds with which he bribed his fallers to escape his Federal guards.

Still skeptical as to her husband's infidelity, Mrs. Lyman refrained from any court action until she received word of the arrest of J. M. Cohn in this city Monday. Knowing that Cohn was an old associate of Lyman and learning that Cohn confessed to having received \$2000 from Miss Lehman to aid Lyman during his incarceration, Mrs. Lyman immediately consulted a lawyer and brought suit for divorce.

Mrs. Lyman's Family Wealthy. Mrs. Lyman, before her marriage to the promoter, 15 years ago, was Alice Brown, member of the wealthy Brown family of Pasadena. At the time of the wedding Dr. Lyman was a social favorite in the South, being possessed of an unusually pleasing personality and a large income, which it is now believed he misappropriated for the victims of his wildest promotion schemes. According to the information received by Marshal Elliott today from the East, Mrs. Lyman is determined to have nothing further to do with her husband. Miss Lehman, however, it is understood, is so enamored of the bland promoter that she will do everything in her power to assist him while his difficulty with the local Federal officials is pending.

SCHOOL ACCOUNTS SHORT

Spokane County System Blamed for Loss by Absconder.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Oct. 14.—(Special.)—According to the report of the State Bureau of Inspection, which has just filed a report on the Hilliard school district, T. C. Tyrell, a former clerk, has failed to account for \$387.52. The Spokane County prosecutor has informed the Bureau, however, that the alleged offense was committed in 1904, and as Tyrell cannot be found now he says there is no use in trying to find him, as letters addressed to him in Minnesota have been returned unclaimed. The report says that Tyrell failed to account for a balance of \$2500 when he quit and that several claims for which he collected the money were later paid by warrants. The Bureau places the blame for the trouble on the system of making out warrants for the clerk to pay small bills, instead of auditing all claims and having warrants drawn for them.

ROLPHS IN AUTO CRASH

WIFE OF MAYOR-ELECT OF SAN FRANCISCO INJURED. Big Machines Collide En Route to Golden Gate Park While Going Around "Blind" Corner.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14.—While en route to Golden Gate Park for the Panama-Pacific Exposition ground-breaking ceremonies this morning, a motor car containing the family of James Rolph, Jr., Mayor-elect and director of the exposition, was in collision with another car. Mrs. Rolph and other occupants were painfully injured. A passing streetcar, which caused the machines bound in opposite directions, to turn a blind corner too sharply, was the direct cause of the accident. The second machine, which belongs to Archbishop Riordan, was empty save for the chauffeur, who was unhurt. The Rolph car was turned over. Mrs. Rolph's neck was sprained and she received minor bruises. Her sister, Miss Jean Rolph, was painfully scratched. Of the two children, James Rolph III and Annette Rolph, the boy was the more seriously hurt with a badly injured ankle.
