

WORK ON CHARTER TAKES MUCH TIME

Framers Declare Inability to
Complete Task Before
November 1.

MUCH IS YET TO BE DONE

Six Weeks to Two Months Will Be
Required, It Is Thought—Sub-
Committee Makes Report on
Public Safety.

While the mass of the work on the new charter will be finished within the next three meetings, the members of the official charter commission last night were of the general opinion that it will be impossible for it to be ready by November 7, which is the date on which it should be submitted, if it is to be ready for a special election in January. A vast amount of revision and co-ordination of different sections will remain to be done that probably will require from six weeks to two months.

Last night's meeting was devoted to consideration of the report of the sub-committee on the department of public safety. With the exception of the places the supervision of the police and fire departments under a Commissioner of Public Safety, thus harmonizing the organization with the idea of the commission form of government, the provisions outlined in this sub-committee's report follow essentially the ideas contained in the present charter.

LINCOLN MEETS SPOKANE

HISTORIC HIDING PLACES ARE
BEING WALLED UP.

Theft of Da Vinci Painting Leads to

PARIS, Oct. 15.—(Special.)—It is nearly two months since Leonardo da Vinci's masterpiece, the "Mona Lisa," was missed from the Louvre, but the theft is still in the mind of everyone, and Parisians are constantly asking what is being done to prevent other thefts of valuable pictures.

Furthermore, the guardianship both by day and by night is being scientifically organized. The building has been divided into 23 sections, in each of which both day and night a special guardian is installed, continually making a round of inspection.

CONTROL COURTS CRIES ROOSEVELT

Jurists' Recklessness Will
Lead to Their Own Un-
doing, He Declares.

POWER HAS BEEN ABUSED

Majority of People Must Determine
What Is Best for Nation, Is
Assertion of ex-President

Before Civic Forum.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—The judiciary of the United States must be brought within the control and made answerable to the well thought-out judgment of the people, in the opinion of Theodore Roosevelt, who spoke last night on "The Conservation of Womanhood and Childhood," before the Civic Forum.

This control, in Mr. Roosevelt's judgment, should be exercised more cautiously and in different fashion than the control by the people over the legislature and the executive, but "the control must be there."

Control of Judges, Mr. Roosevelt said, was half-almost by far the more important part of a program which should be carried out for proper conservation of manhood, womanhood and childhood. The first half of the program, he said, consisted in placing upon the statute books of Nation and states, legislation to remedy existing defects.

The ex-President spoke at length of what he termed "certain persons connected with child labor." He urged working women to organize.

Experience in the last 25 years, the speaker declared, had shown that while the people might be aroused to sound and high thinking and their legislative and executive officers try to carry out their purpose, yet the whole movement for good might come to naught, "because certain judges, certain courts, are steeped in some outworn political or social philosophy and totally misapprehend their relations to the people and to the public needs."

Misrepresentation Is Expected.

"I am entirely aware," he continued, "that what I say assuredly will be misrepresented by certain persons with a deliberate purpose of misleading honest and conservative citizens into the belief that I am advocating something destructive of our governmental system and that I am making an 'attack' on the judges. But I feel that it is my highest duty to speak plainly on this subject so vital to our welfare."

Mr. Roosevelt said he had the highest regard for the judiciary.

Famous Jurist Chief.

"I criticize the decisions of judges," he asserted, "only by adopting as my own the language used about these same decisions by the highest judges in the land, and finally in the system and that I am making an 'attack' on the judges. But I feel that it is my highest duty to speak plainly on this subject so vital to our welfare."

People Have Rights.

In the last 25 years Mr. Roosevelt said the courts of New York once again have taken a step in the direction of that taken by Abraham Lincoln. "I most emphatically believe that we have been wise in giving great power to the judges, and I most firmly believe that like any other power this power can be abused and that it is a power from which the people have merely temporarily permitted themselves to be alienated."

Self-Control, Safety Valve.

"If the courts continue to use their power with recklessness that has too often been shown in the past, it is almost inevitable that efforts will be made to amend it."

"I believe that the only ultimate safety for our people is in self-control; not in control from the outside, but in control of the people themselves, who must ultimately control their own destinies and cannot surrender the right of ultimate control to a single man or to a legislative or an executive."

"One word in closing: What I have advocated is not revolution. It is not radicalism. It is the highest and wisest kind of conservatism."

It is the usual custom of speakers at civic forums to answer questions from the audience after they have finished, but owing to the lateness of the hour it was not done last night. Suffragists jumped upon chairs and the press tables shouting, "Warrior women! Votes for women!" and the speaker's retreat from the stage was made in the din of suffragist cries. One suffragist pinned a large rosette on Mr. Roosevelt's breast, with a streamer bearing the legend, "Women Want the Ballot."

HUNTER SHOTS HIMSELF

Carl Burgoyne, of Portland, Falls
Over Gun; Badly Wounded.

OREGON CITY, Or., Oct. 21.—(Special.)—Carl Burgoyne, son of John Burgoyne, a prominent fruitgrower of New Era, and brother of Herman Burgoyne, proprietor of the Burgoyne Hotel in Portland, was shot and seriously wounded this afternoon while hunting near West Oregon City.

The young man arrived over his gun, the charge taking effect in his left shoulder. He was removed to this city and given medical attention. Physicians said that the wound was not fatal.

Burgoyne's father and brother were summoned immediately after the accident and came with him to this city. The young man is employed by the Southern Pacific Company in Portland.

LODGE JOINS REALMS

NATIONS' LEADERS HIGH IN MA-
SONIC ORDER.

Friendship of President to Heads
of European Countries Sealed
by Ties of Fraternity.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—(Special.)—The Daily Telegraph says that by consenting to associate themselves with the English branch of the order as honorary members of the Lodge of King Solomon, the King of Denmark, past grand master of England, the King of Sweden, and the President of the United States have further cemented the fraternal bonds existing between England and the heads of foreign states, and their respective systems of Freemasonry.

King George V is not a member of the Order, but his father, King Edward, was a most enthusiastic Mason, and, as Prince of Wales, filled the office of grand master for upwards of 26 years, and was protector of the craft during the period he was on the throne.

The Kaiser, like the King, has kept apart from the fraternity, although his father also was an enthusiastic Mason. The Emperor's brother, Prince Henry of Prussia, however, associated with the order, and so, too, is Prince Henry of the Netherlands, and the Kings of Norway, Greece and Wurtemberg. The Emperor's son, the grand master of the German Masons during the last 30 years of his life, and that section of the craft in its three grand lodges has for its chief, Prince Frederick of Prussia, the Kaiser's brother-in-law, who was elected a past grand master of England in 1894. Napoleon III was a Freemason of the Italian rite, and endeavored to counteract the tendency of the French Masons to radicalism and republicanism, by getting his cousin, Prince Murat, appointed chief of the Grand Orient of France, but his efforts in this direction were doomed to failure.

WOMAN FORETELLS DEATH

Mrs. L. K. Adams, Astrologer, Dies
as She Predicted 15 Years Ago.

Prognostications of her own death, made 15 years ago by Mrs. L. K. Adams, a well-known astrologer of Portland, proved true last night, when after suffering more than a year, she died at her home, 181 Park street, Mrs. Adams and her son, Walter F. Adams, casting their horoscopes in 1896, foretold that when Walter Adams was 38 years of age either he or his mother would die, and that the death would be due to the death of the mother. Walter Adams was 38 years old this year, and his birthday found Mrs. Adams seriously ill from shock and a fractured spine received in a fall at a friend's house in Connecticut.

Efforts which she made to defeat the horoscope she had made for herself were fruitless. Knowing that the accident which she had predicted would be fatal, she carefully avoided anything that might have brought about the fulfillment of her own prophecy. Her predictions had told her would cause her death. On going East last August she hired boys to carry her suitcases and avoided all places where she might be hurt.

She was brought to Portland shortly after the accident and passed some time in Good Samaritan Hospital, finally moving to her home. The funeral will be held Sunday.

CHARTER TO BE REVISED

Oregon City Mayor Leads Move to
Adopt Commission Plan.

OREGON CITY, Or., Oct. 21.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the City Council here tonight it was unanimously decided to provide for the appointment of seven commissioners, who will draw up a tentative charter incorporating a commission plan of government.

George C. Brownell, Mayor of Oregon City, himself suggested the change in municipal affairs and named a committee to go forward with the preliminary work as follows:

Livy Stipp, H. C. Stevens, C. Schueler, F. Toose, George A. Harding and William Anderson. The members will meet next Tuesday to discuss the situation.

WASHOUGAL DEPOT ROBBED

Safe Resists Attempts Believed to
Be Work of Amateurs.

WASHOUGAL, Wash., Oct. 21.—(Special.)—The Washougal station was entered by robbers here last night and an attempt made to open the safe. The till was torn from its place and rifled, but contained only a small amount of money.

UMP'RE'S BAR INVADDED

RALPH FRARY'S LICENSE IS
REVOKED IN SPOKANE.

Wife, Who Smashed Plate Glass
Front of Place, Is Pursued in
Taxi by Detectives.

SPOKANE, Oct. 21.—Police Commissioner Hayden and Chief of Police Doust today recanted revocation of the license of the saloon conducted by Umpire Ralph Frary, of the National League. The commission tonight revoked the license.

Frary's wife, who smashed the plate-glass front of the saloon with salt lars last Saturday night, backs the charges that part of the building is used for immoral purposes, while Commissioner Hayden describes the saloon as a "hell hole." Attention was attracted to Frary last summer by his cool defiance of an angry baseball mob in New York.

Commissioner Hayden demanded that the place be closed permanently and the Mayor championed a compromise agreement with the attorneys of the saloon by which the place was merely to change hands, but continue business.

"The place harbors ex-convicts, sells whisky on Sunday and is a menace to the city," declared Mr. Hayden, at a Commission meeting. "I demand a revocation of the license." To order a change of ownership would mean the continuation of the present condition by dummies of the present proprietors.

Frary testified that the rooms above the Mecca bar harbored ex-convicts and other undesirable and questionable characters, and that liquor was sold there Sundays as a regular practice.

Hearing that Mrs. Frary was at the home of Mrs. McFarland, on York avenue, Detectives Edwards and Buchholz were sent out there to arrest her this morning.

Mrs. Frary escaped from the house in a taxicab. The detectives pursued in the police greyhound and finally caught the machine. Detective Edwards got into the taxi and was forced to drive to the home.

PAWN LISTS ARE WANTED

Ordinance Framed to Make Dealers
Report to Police Daily.

An ordinance which will probably be presented to the City Council for passage at its next meeting will be one compelling all pawnshops and second-hand stores of the city to furnish the police before noon every day an accurate list, with detailed descriptions, of all articles purchased or placed in pawn the day before. This, it is believed, will enable the police to check the operations of thieves and to recover stolen goods.

A request from the Executive Board that the ordinance be passed was read in committee yesterday. It was desired that the list be furnished every day before 9 A. M., but members of the committee, thinking this would work too great a hardship on the second-hand dealers, decided to set noon as the time for report.
