TOWNS WANT FAIR

Big Delegations Will Be at Arlington Convention.

PORTLAND MEN ARE TO GO

Forty Members of Portland Commercial Organizations Will Be in Party Leaving Here—Wild Goose Dinner on Card.

Competition among the leading towns of Sherman, More and Gilliam counties for the Tri-county Fair to be held next Fall will be keen, and all are planning to send big delegations to the convention in Arlington Tuesday. The date for the fair and the place where it will be held will be determined at this convention. Advice from the Arlington Commercial Club to the Portland Commercial Club say that between 120 and 175 official delegates from the three counties are planning to come. Heppner will send 42, Colvins 35, Ione 17, Wasco and Grass Valley 15 each, and the smaller towns have delegations of varying numbers from five to 10. The Portland crowd will total between 20 and 30. Representatives from all of the commercial organizations will be in the party, and owing to the unexpectedly large number of reservations called for, the Commercial Club has decided to have the railroad company run two special cars, instead of only one, as was first planned. The chairman of the reception committee in Arlington wrote yesterday to the Portland Commercial Club, saying that the wild geese were coming into the neighborhood in large numbers and that he is certain that the Hunt Club will be able to furnish the Portland visitors with the dinner of roast geese that had been planned. ARSON CHARGE TIES

Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Ulm Are Indicted as Firebugs.

FIVE ARE TURNED LOOSE

Two Youths Held for Alleged Contribution to Delinquency of Minors—Grand Jury Acts on Many Cases.

W. P. Ulm and Della Ulm, his wife, who are alleged to have attempted to burn the furniture in the Sacred lodging house at 245 1/2 First street October 16, were indicted by the grand jury yesterday on charges of arson. The Ulms had purchased the furniture of the rooming-house and had taken a lease on the building. Poor success in running the business, with the receipt of a telegram from a daughter in Los Angeles announcing her serious illness, are believed to have induced the attempt to burn the place. The lives of several lodgers were placed in danger when the furniture in several of the rooms was ignited. Fred Silcock, a young member of a prominent Portland family, was indicted on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. A second true bill, charging the same offense, was returned against L. B. Gile, a close friend and companion of Silcock. The juvenile court authorities brought out the indictments. Other Arrests Expected. Juvenile Court authorities also caused the arrest of W. J. Sullivan, proprietor of a woodyard, who is charged with contributing to the delinquency of minors. The grand jury will probably consider his case early next week. Two other men, it is understood, are to be arrested on similar charges. Sam Kraemer, a saloonman, accused by Jennie Friedman of having attempted to extort money from her for police protection, was the subject of two true bills. One charges the placing of his wife in a disorderly house, and in the other he is accused of having accepted the earnings of Pauline Kristal, a fallen woman. Kraemer is the man who gathered affidavits which caused Detective Carpenter to resign from the police department. Oliver Williamson, who is accused of having stolen a motorcycle from H. A. Gabbart, was indicted on a charge of grand larceny. Williamson, the officers say, rode the machine all the way from Portland to Oakland and was captured by the police of that city within a few minutes of his arrival. Detective Tom Swensen left last night for Oakland to bring Williamson back to Portland. Gabbart, says the detective, had the motorcycle, valued at \$310, for sale. He allowed Williamson to take it to try it before deciding if he would purchase it, and the prospective customer failed to return. Five Are Freed. Charles Pickens, who, under the name of N. R. 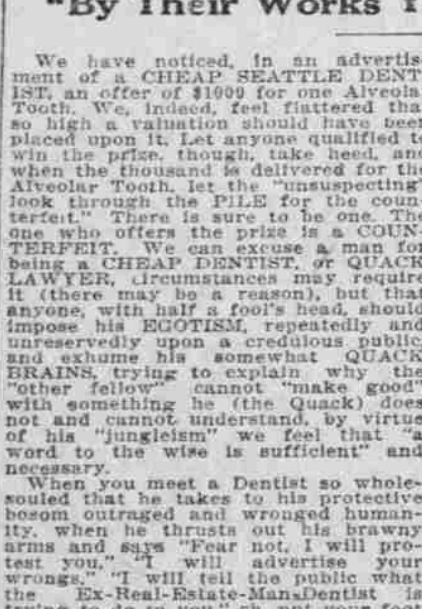
