She was born in Ancaster County, Province of Ontario. She is survived by three sons, J. R. Ralston, Columbia, O.; R. O. Ralston, City Clerk of Seaside, and A. J. Ralston, Toronto, Canada. Her daughter died in Portland last year. Mrs. Babcock lived in Portland for 13 years and at Seaside for eight years. Services over her remains were held in Seaside Friday, Rev. G. O. Oliver officiating.
