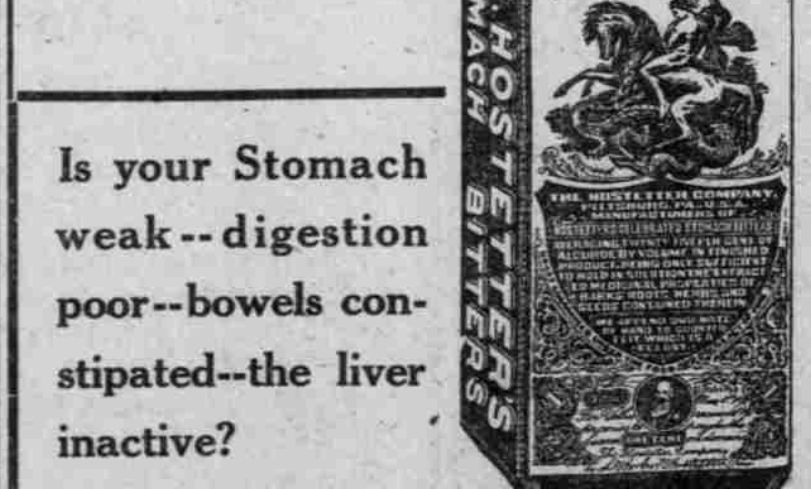

FOUR GENERATIONS IN PIONEER OREGON FAMILY.
JAMES E. ELKINS, MRS. E. ESTES, DAUGHTER, MRS. COUILLETTE,
GRAND-DAUGHTER, AND BABY GIRL, GREAT GRAND-DAUGHTER.
INDEPENDENCE, Or., Dec. 16.—(Special.)—James E. Elkins, of
this city, is one of the oldest pioneer settlers of Oregon. He was
born in Calpepper County, Va., June 1, 1822, and is a second-cousin of
Senator Elkins, of West Virginia. He came to Missouri when 22 years
old and across the plains to Oregon in 1845. In 1848 Mr. Elkins took
up a quarter's claim where the town of Monmouth now stands. In
1849 he went to California but soon returned to Polk County and
took up a donation land claim two and one-half miles south of Mon-
mouth. He built a little house on it, and in May, 1851, he was married
to Lucy G. Zumwalt. He retired from the farm 25 years ago and has
lived in Independence since. His wife died five years ago and he
makes his home with his daughter here.

Gypsum works, near Huntington, was
consummated today when 17 instru-
ments were filed with the Baker Coun-
ty Clerk, conveying the property from
Charles E. Ladd and General Charles
F. Beebe to the Pacific Lime and Gyp-
sum Company.
The articles of conveyance set the
consideration at \$1, but at the same
time a first mortgage, 6 per cent gold
bond for \$200,000 was recorded in fa-
vor of the Commonwealth Trust and
Loan Company, of New York. The fil-
ing fees of \$51 was one of the largest
ever received by the Clerk.
