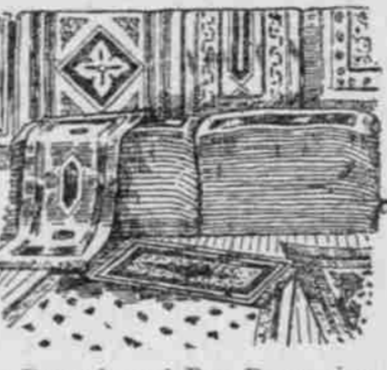

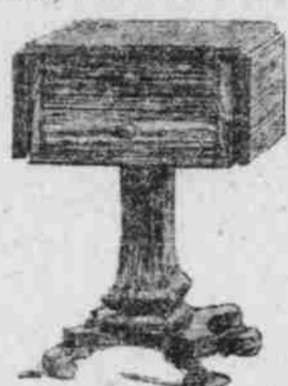

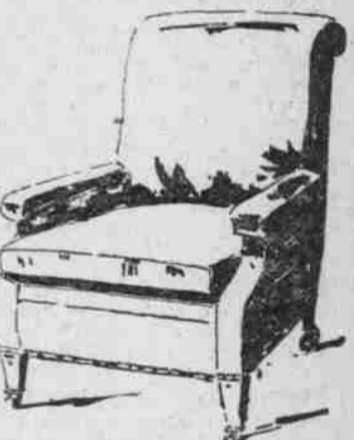

MEXICO IS ROCKED

Earthquake Shakes Country From Ocean to Ocean.

POPULACE PANIC STRICKEN

Woman Crushed by Falling Walls. Wife of American Dies of Fright. Madero Laughs at Sight of Terror of His People.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 16.—Mexico was rocked from ocean to ocean and from Guanaxtlan, on the north, and the isthmus of Tehuantepec, on the south, by an earthquake today.

An old woman was caught between the walls of a falling house and so badly injured that she may die. Mrs. Dora Chenoweth, wife of an American dentist, is dead as an indirect result of the earthquake. Fright caused an attack of heart trouble.

The disturbance was most severely felt in the State of Guerrero, especially in Chilpancingo. A few flimsy buildings were thrown down.

The quake caused a panic here. Hundreds of persons rushed to the Zoacala, where they ran aimlessly about or fell on their knees in prayer.

This was watched by President Madero with much apparent enjoyment, for he stood at a window in the National Palace, laughing. He was conferring with two of his Cabinet members when the first shock was felt and apparently without fear he walked to the window overlooking the Zoacala, where he remained until the tremors had ceased.

Telegraph and telephone wires were snapped and for a time this city was without light and electric power, but aside from the throwing down of a few adobe walls, no serious damage was done.

The first shock was felt at 12:40 and was continued for four seconds more than two minutes. The instruments registered an oscillatory movement from southwest to northeast.

Two slight tremors, with most imperceptible movements, were noticed after the main shock. One occurred at 1:16 and the other at 1:18 o'clock.

LABOR LEADERS ARE SUMMONED

Tveitmo and Johannsen Declare Innocence of Wrong.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 16.—Olaf Tveitmo, secretary-treasurer of the State Building Trades Council, and Anton Johannsen, an organizer for that body, arrived in San Francisco today from the East. Both were served in Sacramento with subpoenas directing them to appear before the Federal grand jury in Los Angeles.

Johannsen went immediately to his home in Corte Madera, where his daughter died recently. He said that he would attend the funeral and then go to Los Angeles, leaving probably tomorrow night.

Tveitmo said that he had business affairs that would necessitate his presence here for two or three days and that then he would go to the southern city.

Both men went East to attend labor conventions before the McNamara case confessed. Tveitmo and Johannsen talked freely and declared they had nothing to fear from the Federal or state investigation of the relations of labor leaders to the dynamiting of the Times.

"We will go into court or before any jury, Federal or local, and tell all we know about this or any other matter, but we know nothing that would in the least throw any light on that situation or any other in which violence has played a part," said Tveitmo.

"I never knew the McNamaras at all until I saw them in the County Jail in Los Angeles, and I was greatly surprised that they were guilty. I shall be glad to go to Los Angeles as soon as I bury my little girl. I shall tell everything I know freely and fully."

Several labor leaders, headed by Mayer McCarthy, Andre Gallagher, secretary of the San Francisco Labor Council, and Eric B. Morton, agent of the Millmen's union, greeted Tveitmo and Johannsen upon their arrival at the Ferry building. Morton is a friend of David Caplan, one of the men sought by the authorities in connection with the Los Angeles dynamiting, and was asserted to have been an accomplice of J. J. McNamara.

PERMIT NOT YET ASKED

HEARING WILL BE GIVEN ON COOS BAY BRIDGE.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Dec. 16.—Representative Hawley today inquired of the War Department whether the Southern Pacific Railroad had applied for permission to bridge Coos Bay from the north into North Bend, on the line of its proposed extension to Marshfield, but was informed that no such application is on file.

Inasmuch as the people of Coos Bay are divided as to the advisability of permitting this bridge to be built, the Army engineers assured Mr. Hawley that no permit would be granted until after a hearing at Coos Bay, at which

all interested persons could be heard. Mr. Hawley also inquired whether further authority from Congress would be necessary to secure an appropriation for repairing and raising the north jetty at Coos Bay that has materially deteriorated of late. The engineers believe this could be done under the appropriation for maintenance, if in the opinion of the local engineer it is essential that these repairs be made.

Mr. Hawley is informing the people of Coos Bay that they must secure a recommendation from the local engineer's office before the Department can recommend an appropriation for this purpose.

Postoffices' Grade Raised.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Dec. 16.—(Special.)—Two hold robberies occurred tonight. Ira Blinn and Lloyd Dyer, two postoffice employees, were held up near their homes by different persons. Blinn lost \$25 and Dyer \$18. The police have rounded up all hobos and are keeping a vigilant watch.
