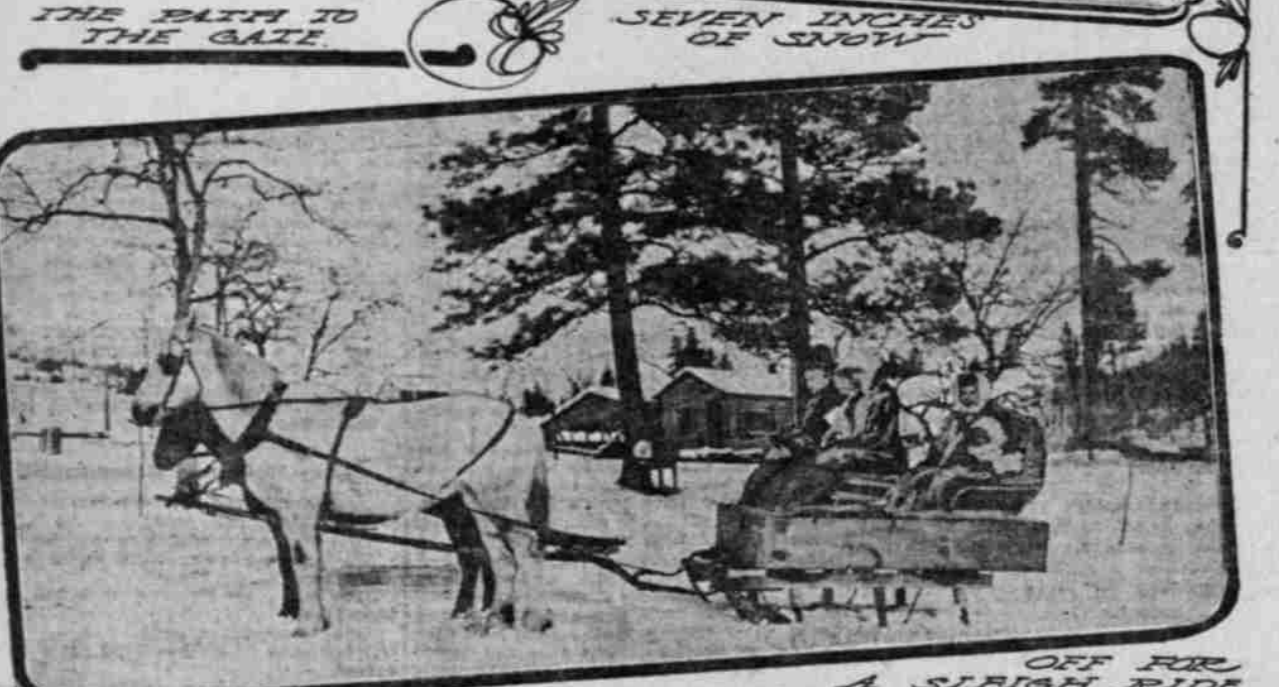


"BEAUTIFUL SNOW" IS MISNOMER SORROWFULLY SIGHS LYLE RANCHER

LITTLE MISSOURI GIRL IS HAILED IN LONDON AS SECOND TETRAZZINI

Felice Lyne, Who Weighs but 98 Pounds, Is Soprano Acclaimed by Critics as "Pearl Beyond Price"—Ola Humphreys, Who Married Egyptian Prince, Will Go on Stage, She Announces.



NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—(Special.)—Felice Lyne, a little American girl from Missouri, has created a furor in the city which first acclaimed Tetrazzini as a great artist. London critics hail her as a "pearl beyond price," and compare her with the greatest sopranos of past generations. She is a slender woman weighing only 98 pounds, and with a girlish demeanor which is unusual on the operatic stage.

Both of the daughters of Benjamin Knower, of Brooklyn, are now in the company of the "Havana" company. That company was noted for the beauty and general attractiveness of its young women. One of them became Mrs. Frank Gould and others achieved fame in other directions. Mollie Lorraine was the daughter of a Scotch clergyman. She came here five years ago and went on the stage. She was only 20 years old then. But the white lights of Broadway had no attraction for Mollie. She was not known in the ioter palaces, and her few friends said that her life off the stage was quite uneventful. She married Fred Simmons, an advertising solicitor, and it was in his apartment in Central Park, West, that she was found dead. The tragedy of her life was disclosed by the coroner's autopsy. She had died of acute alcoholism.
