Phonograph Is Used by C. C. Chapman to Aid in Publicity.

Returning from a four days' trip to Tillamook and the Nehalem Valley Friday afternoon, C. C. Chapman, of the promotion bureau of the Portland Commercial Club, found a stack of letters on his desk and telegrams from Spokane, congratulating him on a speech he had delivered before the Spokane Ad Club at its luncheon Tuesday, when he had been holding a development meeting somewhere near Bayview. Gilmore. For another two years he was leading man at the Liberty Theater in Oakland. It was there he met Miss Slosson, who was playing ingenue roles. After a courtship they were married. Mr. Underwood and Miss Slosson are also well known in Los Angeles, where they have appeared in stock. The return of these two favorites to Portland will be the signal for the attendance of former patrons of the Baker Stock Company to greet them during Mrs. Carter's stay at the Helig.
