dressing-room. Referee Acton gave him five minutes to return, lengthened the period and, finally, when Berg refused to wrestle, although he returned to the ring brandishing a roll of bills and

the ring brandishing a roll of bills and making a fruitless effort to talk, awarded the contest to Beell.

Whatever the technical points involved may be. Berg was universally condemned for refusing to continue the bout. He apparently had an equal chance with Beell, was in good condition, and the fans expressed their condemnation of his course in refusing to continue.

He carried the fight to the champion, but the won-derful agility of Beell prevented dan-gerous holds. After 40 minutes of seesaw work Berg managed to get on top, got a cretch and body hold and had Beell in a bad way for a moment, the first critical moment of the match and the only one Beell was enticed into.



ROYAL ASSENT IS GIVEN TO MINIMUM MEASURE.

Miners Voting on Return to Work Question and Favorable Action

Is Being Anticipated. LONDON, March 30.—The govern-nent's minimum wage bill became a law today when at noon it received the royal assent. Simultaneously the coal miners throughout the British Isles were voting to decide whether the strikers should return to work pend-ing a decision by the district boards, provided for in the bill, fixing wages

in the various coal mine districts.

While the result will not be known until next Thursday, there was prevalent everywhere a feeling of optimism that the vote would favor resumption and that meantime thousands of miners would return in anticipation of such a decision.

Thomas Ashton, secretary of the Miners' Federation, issued a statement tonight counselling the miners to re-sume work without waiting for the district board to adjust the minimum wage and his advice probably will have greater influence on the ballot than

that of any other leader.

The only stumbling block in the way of a speedy termination of the strike seems to be the attitude of the sur-face men, who still have some griev-ances unsatisfied. The national federation issued a manifesto today that there must be no resumption until the owners have conceded their demands. It is believed this dispute will be set-
