ACCUSED MAN WRITES LETTER TO SON OF ONE VICTIM.

Frank Bauervaerts, Held for Killing Mrs. Guyot and Miss Francols, Charges M. D. C. Putnam.

whom he is alleged to have murdered, Frank Beauervaerts, from prison in Riverside, Cal., has made a full statement of his side of the killing of Mrs. Harriett Guyot, of Portland, and Julia Francois, the 19-year-old girl who ac-companied the two to Imperial, Cal, on a mining expedition. The letter, which reached Portland Thursday, was turned over by Andre Guyot, the son, to Sheriff Stevens and Deputy Sheriff Leonard. In it Bauervaerts places the blame of the killing on M. D. C. Putnam, the old prospector who informe the police of Riverside, Cal., after a 50

mile trip, that Bauervaerts had killed the women.
In the letter Bauervaerts says that Putnam became infatuated with the widow and made advances to her, which were checked. Then, Bauervaerts says, Putnam borrowed the gun with which the murder was accom-plished and when the Belgian was absent, killed the two women. When Bauervaerts found out what had been done, he says. Putnam offered him a part interest in five mining claims in Imperial County, if he would bury the bodies and remove all evidence of the crime. This Bauervaerts says he did. Putnam then said that he would go to Riverside to get a third man to go with

nem to the claims, and there Putnam formed the police.

That the money which was found on That the money which was found on Bauervaerts and was supposed to have been taken from the woman, is part of a share in a fortune left him by the death of a relative in Belgium, is the statement of Andre Guyot, made formally last night and which will be used in the trial of Bauervaerts. Mrs. Guyot, who wanted to see the country and frontier and mining life, asked that the \$550 necessary be given to her by her son. He did so and she turned by her son. He did so and she turned it over to Bauervaerts. With it Bauer-vaerts bought the gun which killed the two women, among other supplies of the expedition.

Bauervaerts, secording to Guyot, had been the object of the family's charity from time to time from October, 1910, to January, 1912.

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
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
