## BATTLE NOT UNEXPECTED

Mexican Army of 3000 in Torreon Said to Be on Point of Making Expedition Toward Jiminez, 10 Insurrectionists.

JIMENEZ, Mexico, April 6 .- Concentration of rebel forces here and south along the route to Torreon is the next point in the programme of General Grozco, but it is not improbable that another battle will have to be fought in the weighborhood of Escalon. Un-officially it is reported that the government iroops are preparing another spedition into rebel territory from Torreon, where there are said to be some 1500 federals and approximately the same number of volunteers.

the same number of volunteers. The advance guard is said to be at Zavaiza. Unless an unexpected clash with the Federals alters his plans, Orosco probably will hold Jimenes as a general base of operations against Torreon for some time, since between here and there there is no suitable place, the region below Escalon being little better than a desert. General Salazar will be eccupied for a few days in his chase of Colonel Vil-la, who fied from Parral towards Ro-sarlo. Villa, however, is no longer feared, since it is known that he had such a small body of troops. Thomas Urbina, formerly with him, is believed to have united with General Trucy Au-bert. Hailway traffic with Parral will begin tonight. begin tonight.


