### TAKES PENTATHLON

#### Indian Captures Three Firsts and Two Seconds.

YORK, May 15.—Jim Thorpe, a versatile Indian school all-around athlete, won three and was second in two of the five track and field events at Eastern tryouts for the Pentathlon competition at Celtic Park today. Officials said he would be one of the American competitors for Olympic honors at Stockholm. Thorpe won the broad jump, the shot throw and 200-meter run and was second to the National champion, Brodd, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, with the javelin, while McLoughlin, of Brooklyn, beat him 10 yards in the 1500-meter race.

#### Athletic Official Quits Place.

WEST POINT, N. Y., May 15.—Major E. Pierce, who for several years has been president of the National College Athletic Association, has sent his resignation to the executive committee. His withdrawal is necessitated by a recent promotion to the rank of lieutenant and his assignment to a regiment in China. Major Pierce, while director of athletics at West Point in 1911, was instrumental in bringing about the organization of many colleges and schools to reform the game of football. Major Pierce has recommended the appointment of Colonel Edwin Hart, of West Point, to succeed him.
