

From Toldboden wharf here, where the royal jacht Danuebrog, escorted by Danish warships, landed, the coffin was borne by 12 officers to a hearse and conveyed through streets lined with troops and filled with silent crowds to the church of Christianborg King Christian X of Denmark and King Haakon of Norway, with other male members of the royal family. male members of the royal family, walked behind. 
