PIONEER OF 1852 CELEBRATES HER EIGHTIETH BIRTHDAY.



THE DALLES, Or., May 18 -(Special.) -Susan P. Angell, who crossed the plains with her huscrossed the plains with her hus-band in 1522, celebrated her 80th birthday Sunday, May 12, sur-rounded by her children, at the old family homestead on Eight Mile Creek south of The Dales. Mrs. Angell, notwithstanding her 50 years and the hardships of ploneer life through which she has passed, is in excellent health. The celebration was held on the old homestead, where more than 50 years ago Mrs. Angell and her husband built their home in a sparsedy settled land. 

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
