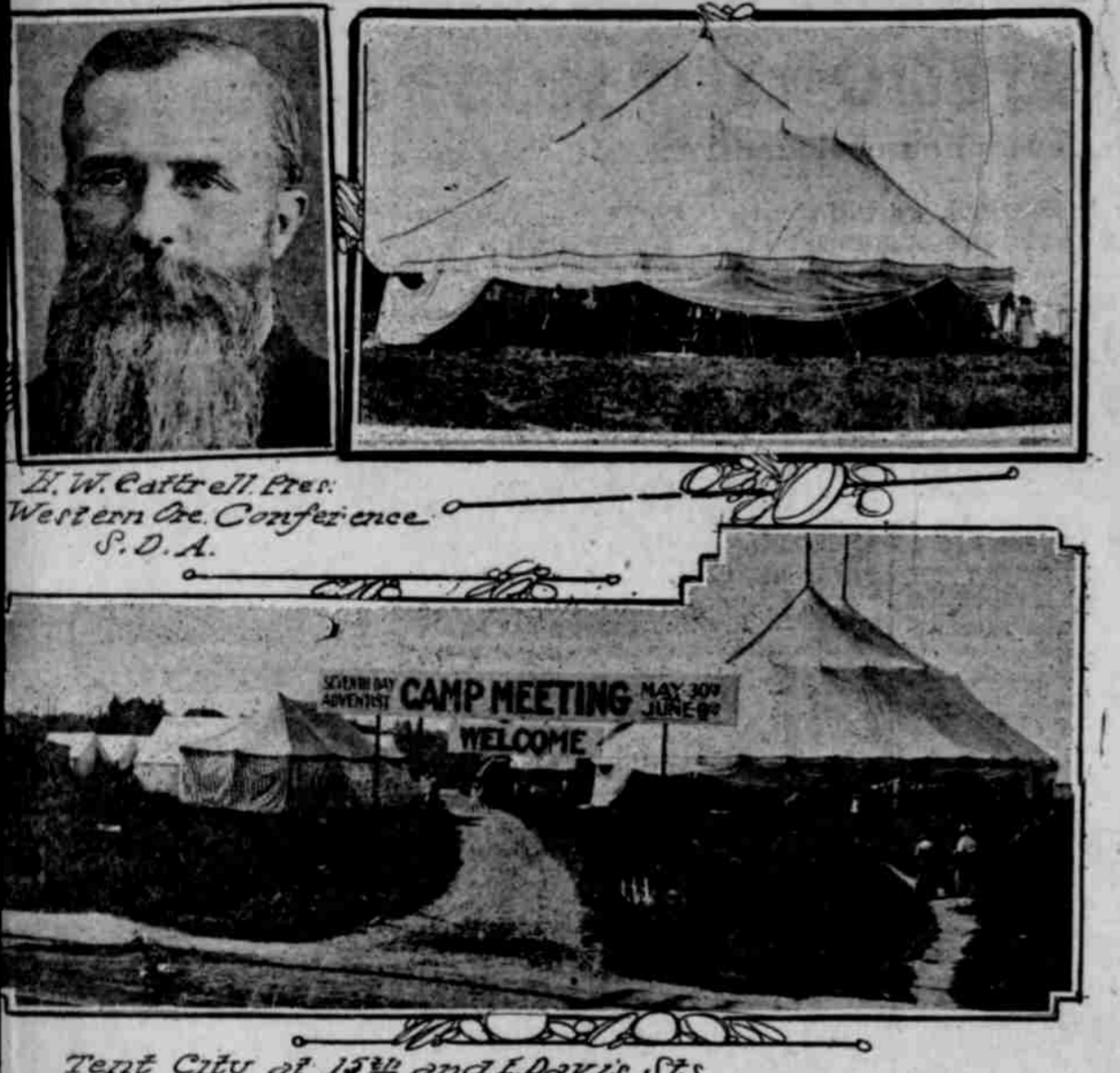


SEVENTH DAY ADVENTISTS BEGIN WORK IN ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Important Questions to Be Taken Under Consideration Tomorrow—Two New Churches Admitted to Conference. Attendance Is Large.

SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST ANNUAL CAMPMEETING AND PRESIDENT OF WESTERN OREGON CONFERENCE

The first business session of the annual conference of Seventh-Day Adventists in Western Oregon was held Friday, and by tomorrow important matters to come before the delegates will be well under way. Three standing committees were appointed today, as follows: Nominations, Dr. B. Holden, P. A. Hanson, G. F. Reed, Mr. Johnson; committee on plans, W. C. Catrell, W. H. Beatty, B. L. J. L. Kay, T. H. Starbuck and C. F. Martin; committee on credentials, C. W. Flais, T. H. Starbuck and F. Folkenberg. Two new churches were admitted to conference, those at Silverton and Brownsville. Both were recently organized. Large crowds attended the meetings today, and it is expected they will even larger today. Every facility has been provided for the accommodation of the public, including reception of automobiles, and the Seventh-Day Adventist Church has organized a little more than 60 persons, having at that time practically no facilities or institutions, and a few ministers and members. In a short time it has grown until today property is valued at \$10,635,266.71, the observers of the seventh day the week number 104,526. Of these, 585 are members of the 2769 organized churches of the denomination. In the others attend regularly, but are not sought or seen admitted to membership. These figures are given in the latest statistical report of the denomination. While the growth of the organized church is phenomenal, the per capita wealth of the contributions is even greater. The last report available shows an average of \$1.27 per year for every church member including children. The Northern Baptist contribution stood highest among the churches, followed by the Methodist. The United States census returns, with a per capita contribution of \$11.92 per year. The large contributions of the Seventh-Day Adventists are largely due to the fact that they adopted the tithe system when the church was first organized, every member contributing the same amount to the support of the ministry. This plan is also adopted by the Baptists. Another reason for the heavy contributions of the Seventh-Day Adventists is the fact that the denomination has a board for the adoption of a 10 cent a week plan of contributions to missions. Local and state churches voluntarily increased this year to 15 cents a week per member.

RIESLAND ASKED TO QUIT

Efforts are being made to induce Ben Riesland to withdraw as a candidate for member of the Board of Education in the annual school election, two weeks from tomorrow. Mr. Riesland admitted yesterday that "something had come up" that made it necessary for him to defer announcing his platform, which he had expected to make public yesterday. He also said the same "something" had been referred by him to his friends and that he would not know positively before tomorrow or Tuesday whether he would continue in the contest.

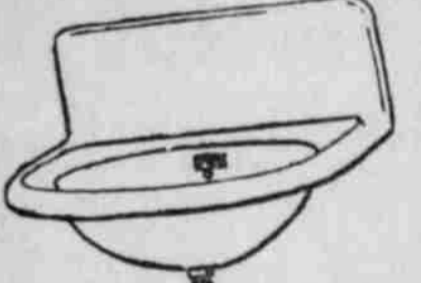

BANKERS TO MEET

500 Delegates to Institute at Salt Lake City.

MEMBERSHIP NOW 12,000

Portland Has 180 Members; Object Is to Instruct Growing Generation in Banking and to Standardize Whole System.

In suitable cities bank employees are organized in chapters for educational work in accordance with the correspondence method of instruction. The same system may be utilized in individual banks and other financial institutions. Outside of classes in chapters and individual institutions the correspondence system of instruction is employed. The correspondence method of study lacks the inspiration of social contact, but the personal relationship established between students and instructors stimulates ambition, and the fact that all lessons must be written insures thoroughness and thought. So far as actual acquisition of knowledge is concerned the advantages of the correspondence method of instruction fully offset its disadvantages. The complete course of study provided by the institute is so arranged that the lessons pertaining to banking and the lessons pertaining to law may be taken in two separate courses if desired, but such division is not advised, as it makes the work less systematic.

INDIANS FIGHT OVER GAME WHEN FIREWATER GETS IN ITS WORK

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 1.—(Special.)—Too much firewater was the undoing of two braves from the Yakima Reservation, who with berry picker tickets issued to their kioochmen, were holding a gambling feast on one of the principal streets of the Heights yesterday.
